Jones received an Abell-Hanger Foundation Scholarship in the amount of \$3,000 payable \$750 each semester of the first two years. The Abell-Hanger Foundation awarded 28 scholarships to students who have participated in the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet and who have compiled an outstanding record of academic and extracurricular achievement. Three of the scholarships were awarded to students who plan to major in nursing.

This year the TILF awarded 315 new awards and will renew approximately 220 awards for a total of 535 scholarships for 1998-99 with an approximate value of \$836,000. Recipients may attend any approved college or university in Texas.

Jones placed second in news writing at the 1999 UIL Academic State Meet. He also participated in UIL calculator applications, cross country, track and football. He was a member of National Honor Society, Student Council, Future Farmers of America, and Senior Class. Jones received the Academic Athlete award and was a state qualifier in the 1995 TSA Graphics Solutions and Production Systems. From The Minister's Desk:

In the July issue of his newsletter, Rush Limbaugh, the famous radio commentator, made some insightful comments about the United States Constitution. These comments were:—

"Too many of us think of the Constitution as some crumbling yellowed parchment under special glass in Washington D.C. We assume that words written with a quill pen are quaint, stale, and frozen in time. When someone talks about 'founding documents' our eyes glare over, and we think of long-dead men who wore powdered wigs. You know, those scenes in old paintings."

"But the Constitution cannot be contained in a museum display. Its words—especially those of the Bill of Rights—crackle with life. They are vigorous, muscular, direct, and devastatingly clear."

I think that these words are also applicable to the Bible. There are, sadly, many people who believe that the Bible is an antiquated book, suggesting that its words are only applicable to the readers of the first century.

The Apostle Peter would strongly disagree. He wrote:—"You have in obedience to the truth purified your souls for a sincere love of the brethren, fervently love one another from the heart, for you have been born again not of seed which is perishable but imperishable, that is, through the living and abiding word of God. For, 'All flesh is like grass, and all its glory like the flower of grass. The grass withers, and the flowers fall off, but the word of the Lord abides forever.' And this is the word which was preached to you." (1 Peter 1:22-25)
