

MUSTANGS 8-0 FOR SEASON

The Wheeler Mustangs hosted Booker last Friday night in a district contest at Nicholson field. Booker came in with a record 2-5, 0-2 in district while the Mustangs headed into the game 7-0, 2-0 in district. This would turn out to be a game who many thought would not be close, but ended up being a scoring fest as both teams were able to light up the score board. With the north wind blowing about 30 miles per hour, Booker won the toss. They elected to receive, Mustangs would take the wind in hopes that it would effect the throwing game of the Kiowas.

and marched it down the field. It crosses pay dirt, to start the game as Brad Frame connects with Camacho for a 50 yard pass over the middle. Camacho's kick is good, Booker takes a quick 7-0 lead with 9:47 left in the first quarter. Obliviously the score made the Mustangs a little mad as they would come back and get pay dirt with 6 plays covering 72 yards as Caleb Finsterwald goes over from 5 yards out. Ben Dollar's kick is good, and the Mustangs tie the game 7-7 with 7:19 left in the first quarter.

The Mustang defense would come up big forcing a punt, a punt for minus seven yards, as the Kiowas punted to the wind. Wheeler would take over on the 12 yard line of Booker, and Brooks Brown would scoot right in on a 12 yard TD run. Dollar's kick is good, the Mustangs up the lead 14-7 with 5:53 in the first quarter.

The next offense possession for the Kiowas would result in a score as the Mustangs defense was trying to make some adjustments to counter the offense game plan of Booker. The running back heads up to the inside of the line which is closed by

Booker took the opening kick off the Mustang defense and bounces into the outside and out runs the defense of Wheeler 48 yards for the touchdown. The drive for Booker would take three plays and cover 77 yards the kick is no good, and Booker would cut the Wheeler lead 14-13 with 2:19 to go in the first quarter.

The second quarter would see Wheeler offense march down the field throwing in plays for 67 yards as Casey Childress gets a one yard TD run. The kick is not good as it flew into the north wind that was blowing 40 miles and hour the ball goes straight up and straight back down, basically. The Mustangs would increase their lead 27-13 with 10:50 left in the second quarter.

Again the Mustang defense would pressure Booker's quarterback forcing some bad passes, some incomplete passes and the defense would turn the ball back over to the offense. This time Caleb Finsterwald would get up 28 yards off left tackle, through a gaping hole. This completed a 9 play 88 yard drive by the Mustangs. Option pitch to Donny Phipps is good, and the Mustangs upped the lead 28-13 with 5:54 to go in the second



About Veterans on County Memorial

Women were the hidden army in the production war during World War II. Eventually 5 million women, more than half of them married, would go to work loading shells, operating cranes, painting ships, driving rivets and running lathes. They became welders, bus drivers, train conductors, bellhops, cowpunchers and mechanics. While Germany preferred to keep its women outside munitions plants, American women comprised a third of the wartime work force.

More than 200,000 women also entered special branches of the military services, including the WACS (Womens Army Corps) WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service) and WAFS (Women's Auxiliary Ferring Squadron). The women did a variety of tasks that freed male soldiers for combat, but they were not allowed to handle weapons or fight. The WAVES, in fact, were not allowed to go overseas until late in the war, and WAFS, technically Civil Servants and not in the armed forces at all, were restricted to shuttling planes from factories to air bases.

Many of the women served in the Cadet Nurse Corps and the Red Cross. Here are the stories of some of the women from Wheeler County and

how they served their country. LT. Vera M. McNeil Rogers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. McNeil of Briscoe. She was the wife of Joe D. Rogers of Amarillo. She graduated from Briscoe High School. Vera entered Cadet Nurse Corps. in 1943 and trained at San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center, and served in the United States. She was discharged in 1946.

LT. Geneva McNeil Snelgrooves, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. McNeil of Briscoe. She graduated from Briscoe High School. She entered Cadet Nurses in 1942 and trained at San Antionio. Geneva served in the United States. She was discharged

Director Frances Ovilla Wood, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Wood of Wheeler. She was a graduate of Bayor College and the University of California. She entered the Red Cross in 1942 and trained at Washington, D. C. Frances served in the USA and

the Phillippines. Pvt. Lillian Cox daughter of Mrs. Helen Lea Cox of Shamrock. She graduated from Shamrock High School and entered the Army in 1943. She trained at Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga., Lowry Field. Co. and Will Rogers Field, Ok. She served in the USA. She was awarded GC Ribbon and was discharged in 1944.

CPL Frieda Elaine Hise daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Hise of Shamrock. She attended NTAC, TSCW and Chicago Cons. of Music. She entered the Marines in 1943. She trained in CA. and N.C. She served in the USA and was awarded the Victory and G. C. Medal and was discharged in 1945.

The H. L. Hise also sent two sons to fight in the war.

Major Henry William Hise son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Hise of Shamrock. Attended NTAC, Arlington and U. T. at Austin. He entered the Marine in 1941. He trained in Fla. He served in Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Okinawa, East China Sea, Japan, Empress Augusta Bay, Phillippines and Australia. PVT. Robert Jerome Hise son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Hise of Shamrock. He attended NTAV. Arlington. He entered the Marines in 1944. He trained in S.C. and CA. He served in Hawaii and Guam. He was awarded the Purple Heart, Victory and G. C. Medal. He was wounded in Guam and was discharged in 1945.

All four of the Hise children served their country and safely returned in 1945 to continue their lives.

An exhibit of 24 color pictures by Austin photographer Charles Kruvand is currently showing at the Square House Museum in Panhandle.



Leafhopper Infestations

Heavy leafhopper infestations have been reported in wheat throughout the Texas Panhandle. The leafhopper species has not been identified. Very little damage, if any, has been associated with the leafhopper. The sheer numbers of this insect in the few fields have caused growers to inquire about it. As far as can be determined, leafhoppers have not ever been reported as an important pest of wheat, but we will continue to investigate the situation.

No greenbug, fall armyworm or beet armyworm have been reported from wheat fields being checked by the AgriPartner Farm Demonstration AsALLISON


