She has also pieced several quilt tops and helped quilt 37 quilts for the Red Cross.

Mrs. W. R. Pennington has knitted 50 sweaters and has made 2 afghans from yarn scraps during the past three years of her Red Cross work.

F. M. SHAWVER TO SUCCEED DYER AS SUPERINTENDENT

F. M. Shawver, superintendent of the Kellerville school for the past three years, was named by the Wheeler School Board Friday night to take over the superintendency of the Wheeler Schools effective July 1.

Shawver, who has his B. S. degree from NTSTC at Denton and has done work on his Masters at Texas Tech. succeeds Jesse J. Dyer, superintendent for the past two years. Dyer, for the time being at least, will be acting County School Superintendent, a position he held before he was named local superintendent. "I'm planning on being paid for not teaching," he says since he is completing 27 years in the teaching profession and is eligible for teacher's retirement benefits. During these many years, Dyer has missed being in the school room year a total of one and one-half days because of illness. His teaching career started at Center, in Johnson County, where he served the same district for 15 years. The remainder of his instructing has been in one other county, that of Wheeler. He holds B. S. and M. A. degrees from East Texas State College and a Masters degree from West Texas State College of Canyon. In addition to these, he has also been issued an Administrative Certificate from the Canyon College.



Of the editors questioned, 91 per cent say "NO." even though there were some who qualified this emphatic reply with the hope that government would be able to supply jobs for the unemployed. They do not want a "dole." They further this by stating that outright grants of money tend to kill a man's self-respect, to destroy his initiative. Past history has shown what happens to war workers and high wages and high living and wide spending with no thought for the tomorrow. We are dealing with men and women, not with irresponsible children, the editors remind. This issue which was brought before the weekly editor for consideration, only asks the question. It can't solve the problem. That will come up for discussion later, and
