Farmers To Keep Record Of Bulk Gas Deliveries

OPA officials have annuonced that eginning May 1, farmers will be required to keep a record on all deliveries of bulk gasoline.

Regular blanks for keeping such records are available at the local office of the ration board and may be obtained there by farmers. The supplier must fill in the required information for each bulk delivery of er whether the delivery is made on the farmer's premises, at a service with a heart attack. the farmer's premises, at a service station or bulk plant. If deliveries are made at a time when the record is not available, the farmer must obtain a delivery ticket from the supplier, address of supplier, type of coupons held, other evidence and signature of person making delivery.

SGT. JOHN BROWN IS LIBERATED FROM PRISON

First Sgt. John E. Brown, who was reported missing in action in Germany since Dec. 21, 1944, and later reported a prisoner of war, has been liberated and is in a hospital in

Mrs. Lola Brown of Wheeler received two letters from her husband Saturday and another one Tuesday. The letters received Saturday were dated April 10 and 12 and the one received Tuesday was dated April 13. On that date he reported he was able to go to the mess table for his first breakfast.

From the time he was taken prisoner until he was liberated on March 30, Sgt. Brown lost 60 pounds of weight. He said he was gaining weight slowly after arriving at the hospital in France.

His diet while in prison consisted of a cup of so-called tea for breakfast, grass soup for dinner and a small portion of bread and a little oleo for the evening meal.

Sgt. Brown was one of the many soldiers of the 106th Infantry of the First Army taken prisoners in the last major German offensive. He has been in the U.S. service for seventeen years and received his first year's training at Ft. Sam Houston. He was at Ft. Sill, Okla. for ten years. Prior to going overseas, he trained at Ft. Jackson, S. C., and trained through maneuvers in Tennessee before completing his training at Camp Attabury, Indiana.

His wife, son, Doyle, and daughter, Carmaleta, live in Wheeler.





STATE HIGHWAY PATROL IN BRAKE CHECKING PROGRAM

The State Highway Patrol is engaging in a brake checking program during the period from April 15 through June 1, it was announced this week by a local patrolman, who says that officers will check the brakes of all cars stopped during that period.

A brake check will be carried out on all passenger cars involved in accidents, in traffic violations in which cars are moving and on cars operated in a manner indicating faulty brakes.

The check is made by placing a wooden block one inch thick at the base of the brake pedal and pushing down the brake pedal. If it strikes George Topper of Sweetwater the object before the brakes begin to take hold, they are inadequate and may be in dangerous condition. Brakes which do not grip until the

pedal is within one inch or less of Signal Corps Photo the floorbroad require up to 60 feet War Art. Pvt. C. C. Branch paints to stop at 20 miles per hour. The legal stopping distance in most states is 30 feet at 20 m.p.h. If your brakes do not pass the check, they should be given immediate attention.

Because of shortage of help in the highway department, it will not be possible to make a check of every car on the road, but it is to the interest of every car owner to see that his brakes are in good condition.




