SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7


proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or compon-Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS-

TEXAS: Section 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of the said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

LATURE OF THE STATE OF

"Section 2a. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state. during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is term-

"Provided, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; and



Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the

There is hereby appropriatent part thereof, or the United States State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

At least 5,000 Lutheran church buildings, including church institutions, have been bombed or demolished in England, France, Norway, Finland, Denmark, Germany, Esthonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Hungary and Roumania, according to Dr. P. O. Bersell, Dr. Ralph H. Long, and Dr. Lorenz B. Mayer, American Lutheran leaders recently returned from Europe. "Millions of Lutherans are homeless," they report. "Starvation, disease, persecution and death have been and will be the lot of untold thousands. Congregations have been scattered, pastors killed or exhiled. There are 200,000 refugees in Sweden alone." In response to their report the Lutheran World Action fund of \$2,500,000 now being raised in America, includes \$1,000,000 for

Thirty-two Negro colleges in the United States-most of them churchrelated or church-founded institutions - are now carrying on a campaign to raise \$1,550,000 for their war-time and post-war needs. Thomas A. Morgan, of New York, is chairman of the national committee, and Winthrop W. Aldrich, the national treasurer. Much of the money will be used to provide scholarships for outstanding students. Of the total sought, \$500,000 has been assigned as New York City's quota; and half of New York's quota will be sought from business corporations.






