This interesting keepsake brings back to the pioneer the pleasant memories of the annual event when everyone took off a few days, loaded their wagons, hacks and buggies with plenty of grub and would take along their entries for the various contests. Premiums were offered for the best horses, mules, cattle, sheep, hogs, poultry, wheat, corn, kaffir, mile, peas, sweet potatoes, watermelons, apples, dozens of other agricultural items, as well as prizes in fine arts, written educational work, horse

Sugar - Stamp No. 36 is good for lbs. sugar through August 31. Stamp No. 35 will expire June 2. Meats and Fats: Book IV, red tamps E2 through U2 are good for points each. V2 through Z2 become valid June 1. Y5, Z5, A2, B2, C2 and D2 expire June 2, and E2, F2, G2, H2 and J2 expire June 30.

On the trip the men, together with Quentin Williams, district soil conservationist, county agents and several farmers and ranchers of Donley, Wheeler, Gray and Collingsworth counties, viewed the grass seeding and brush mowing work that has been done by the government on a 1,000 acre plot in that area.

The men were greatly impressed with the reclamation of the badly eroded lands of the area visited where 15 plots had been seeded to various grasses including weeping lovegrass, native sand love grass, little blue stem, side oats gramma ing love grass which has proved the better for the worst eroded hills in the area. The native grasses are more edible for cattle, however, and good growth is resulting from the reseeded sectors. A growth of from two to four inches in height was made by the grass in one year's time, three to six inches the second year and to a height of from eight to eleven inches the third year. The weeping love grass showed a fouryear growth of about eighteen inches.

What will be the future of these high school seniors who are graduating this year? There is an opportunity for getting jobs, of earning a living, that war measures have made possible. Especially is this true for the graduate qualifying for mechanical work. Manual labor has gained in popularity, one never knowing what education or social prominence is concealed in overalls. White collar jobs can't carry as much weight as in the old days when the chap who received the higher education put it to work with his head rather than his hands. But there are not many such jobs that Wheeler can offer the bill should pass. graduates, ones that offer high salaries for war work, desk positions that pay wages enticing enough to hold the local students at home. It is typical of most small towns in the country. A survey shows that 13 out of every 20 American high school students expect to leave their home towns and live elsewhere after completing their education. This is because of better job opportunities outside. Family ties and friends offer a reason for remaining in the home town, but not enough to keep the majority here. In one small midwestern town every student interviewed complained against the lack of recreational facilities and through boredom wanted to leave the town. With school out, we at least might help to make the vacation period interesting enough in Wheeler to keep our young folks home. 
