Retiring Post Commander Homer Pitcock states that the Legion has purchased a supply of blanks which are to be used in applying for "unused leave" pay and he urges all World War II veterans, legion members or not, to be present and secure one of the forms. Pitcock said these blanks are supposed to be furnished by the government through local post offices but that it will be some time before these will be available; so, the Legion is taking this step to help the boys in securing their pay at an earlier date.

The Legion will also furnish some men to help veterans fill out these blanks in cases where they need help. "Claims For Settlement-Unused Leave" must be accompanied by a certified copy of the serviceman's discharge when it is submitted for payment,

## **WORK TO START KELTON-TWITTY** ROAD GRADING

The hard-surfacing of one of Wheeler County's farm-to-market roads came one step nearer a reality last week when the State Highway Department published a legal notice asking for scaled bids for grading and drainging structure on a 15.805-mile strip from Twitty to two miles north of Kelton.

#### SECOND PRIMARY VOTING

Since the Texas election law was amended to take effect in 1920, requiring a majority for the party nomination for Governor, a second primary has been necessary six times in the Governor's reason for requiring two trips to race. The question of voter turnout in the runoff election has always interested the candidates be tween primary elections.

Texas Democrats voted in the econd primary than in the first. But in 1926 in the least explainble voting record of the past quarter century, there were 54, 16 fewer votes in the second rimary, although this was the year in which the bitter Ferguon-Moody fight was waged. Mrs. Ferguson had trailed Dan Moody in the first primary, her supporters had probably given up She polled fewer votes in the runoff than in the first balloting. In 1930, another torrid contest, this time Ferguson - Sterling, there were 24,431 more votes in the second primary than in the first but two years later when the ame contestants were opposed cond primary votes were 16,-436 short of the first total, a fact that may have defeated Ross Ster-
