

M'LEAN CAMP SALE STARTS

William T. Blair, chief of the information division of the War Assets Administration of Dallas, has released the information that plans to dismantle the McLean Prisoner of War Camp and make the salvaged lumber and critical building materials available for building under the Veterans Emergency Housing Program, are now underway.

This construction is the first offering in this area under terms of the Lanham-Meade Resolution whereby surplus lumber and building materials from military camps

will become available for veteran housing, Blair stated.

The entire program is an outgrowth of arrangements made between Wilson Wyatt, national housing agency chief, and War Administrator Lt. Gen. E. B. Gregory to expedite veteran housing, Harry L. Holliday, Dallas regional director of War Assets Administration, explained.

Sale of the surplus materials will be handled as real property with government agencies, state and local governments and non-profit institutions being allowed to exercise their priorities in the above order for the first 10 days after the camp buildings are advertised for sale.

The facilities being offered for sale are approximately 225 buildings, barracks, guard towers, quarters, messhalls, storehouses and warehouses.

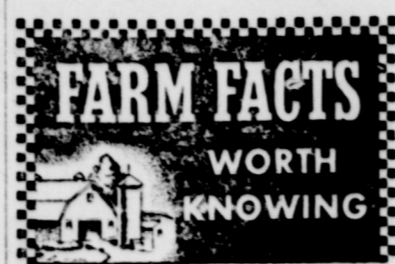

FARM FACTS

Q. How often should eggs be gathered?
A. During warm weather they should be gathered 4 or 5 times daily and less often during cool weather. As soon as the eggs are gathered they should be cooled to remove all animal heat.

Q. Do dairy calves show a greater rate of gain when fed on a dry feeding program or when fed on whole milk?

A. When fed on a dry feeding program. Records at the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm show that calves raised on a dry feeding program consistently averaged from 25 to 50 lbs. heavier at four months of age than calves raised on a whole milk program at good college and private dairy farms, according to weights reported in Missouri Bulletin 338. Furthermore, this Purina dry feeding program actually costs only about half as much as whole milk feeding.

Q. Do rabbits require salt?
A. Yes. Rabbits require more salt than the quantity normally present in the grain and roughage part of their ration. Salt spoils should be available to them at all times.

Q. In a dressed broiler, is a light or dark yellow skin preferable?
A. The only preference is a consumer preference. Most purchasers prefer the darker color, but there is probably no nutritional difference in the meat.

Q. Will college and university students be permitted to participate in meat judging contests in the near future?

A. Yes. The National Livestock and Meat Board announces that it will again sponsor the intercollegiate meat judging contests at the livestock exhibitions this fall. Teams of animal husbandry and home economics students from colleges and universities will again have the opportunity to put to a practical test the knowledge they have gained in their meat courses.

**TIPS GIVEN
ON CANNING**

COLLEGE STATION — In selecting peaches for canning or other methods of preservation, color and texture of skin are sometimes misleading, for the best tasting peaches ripen from the seed out. Gwendolyn Jones, food preservation specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says that peaches of finest quality have a fresh appearance and when broken open are thoroughly ripe around the seed as well as under the skin.

Care must be exercised with ripe peaches, as they deteriorate quickly and should be canned as soon as possible after picking. If they must be kept for several days, cold storage at 36 to 40 degrees F. is the best method for holding them.

A standard bushel of peaches weighs about 48 pounds and should yield about 30 No. 2 cans or pint jars, or 20 No. 3 cans or quart jars. This bushel of peaches, if a light syrup is used, will need about three pounds of sugar. For a light syrup, to each 3 cups of water, use one cup of sugar. Corn syrup or corn sugar may

ARE YOU A QUALIFIED VOTER?

A qualified voter is defined by the Election Laws as follows:

Any person who has attained the age of 21 years, is a citizen of the U. S., has resided in the state for at least one year preceding the election, has resided the last six months within the district or county where he desires to vote, and who has paid the county and state poll tax, is allowed to vote

Persons more than 60 years of age, or who are blind or deaf or dumb, or permanently disabled, or have lost a hand or foot, or is a disabled veteran of a foreign war (where the disability is 40 per cent or more), may vote without payment of a poll tax.

Also exempt from payment of poll taxes are veterans who were discharged not more than 18 months prior to the date of the election. No exemption certificate is required for such veterans, and it is not necessary that they show their discharge papers if voting in towns of less than 10,000 population.

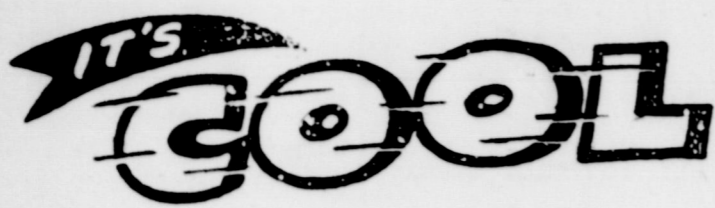
