The Wheeler Red Cross Chapter embracing the north half of the county officially opened its 1946 Fund Raising Campaign this week with an announcement from Harry Wofford, chapter chairman, that the quota is \$1,985. 


As the result of receiving additional information since the filing of misdemeanor charges earlier in the day, County Attorney Homer Moss said Wednesday night he had re-opened the investigation of Tuesday's fracas at Wheeler.

Acting on his own initiative, the county attorney filed charges of assault with intent to kill against Eugene Young and John Sloss of Borger, and telephoned Hutchinson county officials to pick up the two men and hold them. The case will be investigated at an early session of the grand jury.

Moss made this statement to The Times: "A recent case involving shooting at the Watson Hotel is being thoroughly in-vestigated. Recently assessed fines in Justice and County Courts were for misdemeanors, and did not and were not intended to close and preclude investigations or prosecutions growing out of the illegal hootings."

He has learned by experiment, according to the nationally circulated magazine, that it has a tendency to become root bound and should be broken up every few years. After breaking, the roots sprout quickly and the pas-
