A- Yes. Both the base pay and the 10 per cent differential would be included as wages in determining the rate of subsistence allowance payable and accordingly must be reported by the veteran and the employer.

Q- Can my subsistence allowance be apportioned in event my wife and I decide to separ-

A- Yes. The subsistence allowance is subject to apportionment on the basis of 70 per cent to the veteran and 30 per cent for the wife. Further apportionment may be made in the case of children.
