



PAUL BOSTICK LOST ON JAP **PRISON SHIP**

Sinking of a Jap Transport took the life of Pfc. Paul Bostick, son of M. R. Bostick of Mobeetie, and prisoner since the fall of the Philippines in 1942. The International Red Cross has received a list of the lost men from the Japanese government after a long delay and Mr. Bostick received an air mail letter June 20 telling him his son was a prisoner aboard the ship.

Pfc. Bostick was being taken northward with a group of American prisoners from the Philippine Islands when the ship was sunk October 24, 1944, the message stated, and in absence of any probability of survival, is presumed to have lost his life.

The vessel sailed from Manila October 2 with 1,775 prisoners of war aboard. On October 24 it was sunk by submarine action in the South China Sea, more than 200 miles from the Chinese coast, the nearest land. Five of the prisoners escaped in small boats and reached land. Four others have been reported picked up by the
