## Pharis Mrs. Laffin Victim of Fire

Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Laffin and daughters, Mrs. Earl Barnes and Virginia Marrs, attended the funeral services in Wichita Falls Monday for Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Harris who were fatally burned in an apartment house fire at Wichita Falls Saturday morning. Pharis, nephew of Mrs. Laffin, died of burns Saturday afternoon. His wife was found dead in the house when firemen arrived at 8:35 a. m., Saturday. The four-story apartment house was owned by Pharis. The fire which apparently started in the front apartment of the Pharis' apartment, was well advanced when firemen arrived. No member of the other families was injured.

## 1945 Cotton Loans Pooled October 1

All 1945 cotton still under loan by October 1, will be pooled by commodity Credit Corporation, according to V. B. Hardcastle, administrative officer of Wheeler County ACA. These loans matured July 31 and the borrower should be able to dispose of his cotton at profit above the loan and charge against the cotton.

In figuring the amount against an acre, interest is figured at 5 percent per annum, the insurance amounts to 1c per bale per month, and storage is approximately 20c per month for 6 months and 18c per month thereafter.

## Many Fires Can Be Prevented

(AN EDITORIAL)

A skyrocket, fired by a person or persons unknown, started what could have been a fire of serious proportions in Wheeler Tuesday night about 10 o'clock. The rocket was fired from the Highway along the north side of the City Drug Store building. It broke through a wire screen and window glass near the center of the building on the second story and set a curtain and mattress on fire.

Quick work on the part of bystanders in breaking through the north door of the building and extinguishing the blaze is all that saved a first class conflagration. We are informed that the practice of shooting fireworks has been quite prevalent in Wheeler for a long time. And it is reported that such practice on some holidays is continued until long into the night, sometimes until after midnight. If this recent fire had started at a late hour, when there were no witnesses, it could have resulted in the destruction of the business buildings along the west side of the square. Such a disaster could have destroyed over \$100,000.00 worth of property that would be hard to replace. It could have deprived Wheeler of a third of its business establishments. It could have cost the lives of one or more persons, and the economic loss and the increased cost of fire insurance premiums could have added another \$100,000.00.

We take this means of impressing upon the City Council the importance of taking steps to pass an ordinance against the sale or use of fireworks, at least in that portion of the city where a recurrence of Tuesday night's near disastrous fire could cause such heavy loss.

And we further suggest that such ordinance, when passed, be strictly enforced against both adults and juveniles.

## AUG. 31 FINAL ON INSURANCE

## "Puny" Jones Dies At Mobeettie Tuesday

Funeral services will be held at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the Mobeettie Baptist church for Justin Earl Jones, 33 years old, who died about midnight Tuesday. Born in Dallas county, Justin had resided in Mobeettie since he was three months old. He was the adopted son of J. E. Jones and was familiarly known as "Puny" because of his large size. "Puny" had been unable to work or take any physical exercise for two or three years.

## J. C. Moore Residence Is Destroyed By Fire

The residence of J. C. Moore, west of Wheeler, and all of its furnishings were completely destroyed by fire about 8:30 o'clock Friday night. Exact origin of the blaze has not been determined. The fire had gained such headway when it was discovered that efforts to extinguish it were futile.

There was no insurance on the residence or its contents.

## 4 IN NARROW ESCAPE WHEN TRUCKS CRASH

Four persons miraculously escaped serious injury when two trucks collided head-on on Highway 83, five miles south of Wheeler, about midnight Tuesday.

M. L. Sutton of Shamrock received treatment in the Wheeler hospital and was taken home Wednesday. The others escaped with bruises and minor scratches.

Sutton and his father-in-law, A. Smith, also of Shamrock, were hauling a load of watermelons, going south, when the steering gear broke and Sutton lost control of his truck. It headed into a north-bound truck in which Bernice Hubbard and his son, Charles, were hauling posts.

Sutton was pinned in the cab for more than an hour. He was given first aid by some women who came to the scene.

Persons viewing the crash scene would hardly believe no one was seriously hurt.

The faculty will be complete if Trustees can prevail on Mrs. R. Wm. Brown to come to their rescue as English instructor for another term. Mrs. Brown, against her wishes, has been pinch hitting during the teacher shortage, and trustees, unable to find a qualified instructor, are asking her to again make a personal sacrifice for the good of the schools.

Supt. Carrick has announced the following high school staff: J. E. Osborne, principal and social sciences; Miss Melba Wiley, science and public school music; A. C. Wood, mathematics; Mrs. Nadine Carrick, commercial, and Mrs. Bonnie Harmon, home making.

The grade school faculty will be composed of: Bertram Geeslin, principal and band director; Mrs. Ernestine Weeks, fifth; Mrs. Jimmie Fields, fourth; Mrs. Joe Hardcastle, third; Mrs. Ebb Farmer, second, and Mrs. Geo. Weems, primary.

Supt. Carrick is hopeful of securing a piano instructor before the opening of school, to be paid by private tuition.

Work of improving the school grounds is progressing. Workmen are now sodding the grounds and laying concrete walks.

## W. C. T. U. Told Liquor Cost Per Capita \$61

## ANNOUNCING Change in Subscription Rates of Wheeler Times

To the Public:

Effective Saturday, August 24, the subscription rate of The Wheeler Times will be \$2.00 per year, \$1.25 for 6 months and 75c for 3 months to readers in Wheeler, Hemphill and Beckham counties.

The price to readers outside the three counties listed above, will be \$2.50 per year, \$1.50 for 6 months and 85c for 3 months.

We will accept renewals at the old rate of \$1.50 per year in Wheeler county and \$2.00 outside of the county, until August 24. Present subscribers may pay up for another year at the old rate regardless of when your present subscription expires, but no such subscriptions will be accepted for more than one year.

The increase is not the result of any government regulation but is made necessary to offset recent price increases of newsprint as well as higher labor and printing material costs.

The Wheeler Times is the last weekly of comparable size and quality, to raise its annual subscription rate to \$2.00. Many of them charge \$2.50 and \$3.00. The Times postponed any increase as long as it was possible, but now is forced by circumstances to join the procession.

## Wheeler Assured High Scholastic Standards As Tax Increase Voted

Wheeler property owners by a vote of 154 to 106 approved the proposed increase in the School tax rate from \$1.00 to \$1.35 in a special election last Saturday. W. B. Wolf estimated \$3,700 which the 35c hike will provide, will enable the Wheeler Board of Trustees to make needed adjustments in the teaching staff, make necessary repairs on the physical plant and add some equipment that is necessary if the local school improves its present standing.

Forty cents on the \$100 present tax rate is being paid on the interest and sinking fund of the district's bonded indebtedness. State aid on teachers salaries will remain the same under the new rate as it was, all additional funds brought in by the tax increase going into the local maintenance and operation fund.

If the Legion cannot make suitable arrangements by that date, the deal is off.

Floyd assumes his duties next Monday and the management joins him in extending an invitation for friends and customers to call and see him. Floyd will be in charge of the mechanical department and will assist Editor J. C. Howell in the general operation of the business.

**PARTY CONTROL**

It is argued that the Governor ought to have control of the party machinery in Texas. Perhaps that is correct, but why? National Committeeman Myron G. Blalock says that the reason is that there will be party harmony when the Governor is the high man at the party headquarters. Probably he is right about it to this extent—there will be more harmony if the control of the party is in the Governor's hands than if it isn't. But is party harmony what Texans like? Is it what they want? Apparently the principal business of the party machinery is to throw Democrats out of the Democratic party. And that seems to be its business, whether the Governor is in charge or not. The real trouble with the Democratic party in Texas is that the party is not the institution of the great mass of those who call themselves Democrats but rather

the institution of those who have an especial and at least semiprofessional concern in politics. The party gets its money from men in office and men who want to get into office.

If we had a party rule that no man who had ever held public office could hold a party office and that no man that ever held a party office could ever be elected to public office, it would be so revolutionary as to be positively bewildering. And if we made it unlawful for any candidate for office to contribute anything of value toward the expenses of his own or any other political party, whether for the conduct of a primary or otherwise, the Democratic party in Texas would be temporarily bankrupt.

We don't have harmony in the Democratic party because disharmony is the only way we can choose up sides and fight. And choosing up sides and having a fight is the Texas way of enjoying hot weather plus the scarcity of avowed Republicans. With practically no Republicans in sight, we just naturally have to scalp each other or else we don't have any scalps to tack up on the barn door.

Letting the Governor in on the Democratic State Committee is probably a good idea. But let's not have too much harmony. A lock-step march is a dull way to get from here to there. A democracy (with a small "d") is suspect when the loud and raucous voice of a (verbally) outraged minority is no more to be heard in the land. From Dallas Morning News.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

H. J. R. No. 49  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds and warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

**Questions and Answers**

Q. How can a veteran get assistance with his unemployment problems?  
 A. The veteran may consult a veterans employment representative in a local office or in the state central office of the employment service, a local service organization, a school or a community veterans center.  
 Q. If a veteran is unable to find work, where can he obtain specific information concerning unemployment allowances?  
 A. Inquire at the public employment office or the office of the unemployment compensation agency in the state or territory in which the veteran resides.  
 Q. Are there any penalties in case the veteran accepts readjustment allowances to which he is not entitled?  
 A. Any veteran who knowingly accepts an allowance to which he is not entitled shall be ineligible to receive further readjustment allowances. Also, the law provides for fine and imprisonment for anyone who fraudulently obtains payment or makes a false statement in order to cause allowances to be issued under the act.  
 Q. Does a veteran who is partially unemployed have a right to readjustment allowances?  
 A. Yes, a veteran who works less than his normal number of hours and who receives less than \$23 per week should inquire at the nearest public employment office of the state unemployment compensation agency as to his eligibility for partial readjustment allowances.  
 Q. Can a veteran have a loan guaranteed or insured to buy or construct more than a single-family home?  
 A. Yes, but one veteran cannot get a guaranteed or insured loan to buy or build more than a four-family home. If more than one veteran is buying, then the basic four-family home is allowed for the group and this may be increased by one additional family unit for each veteran participating; thus two veterans can buy or build a six-family home, three veterans a seven-family home, etc.

**H. J. R. No. 62**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:  
 "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which

shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance of said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.  
 "In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the

opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.  
 "The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm or corporation.  
 "All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.  
 "The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.  
 "All moneys received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."  
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be sub-

mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:  
 "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."  
 Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:  
 "AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."  
 If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.  
 Sec. 3. The Governor of the

State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.  
 Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. 34-4tc.

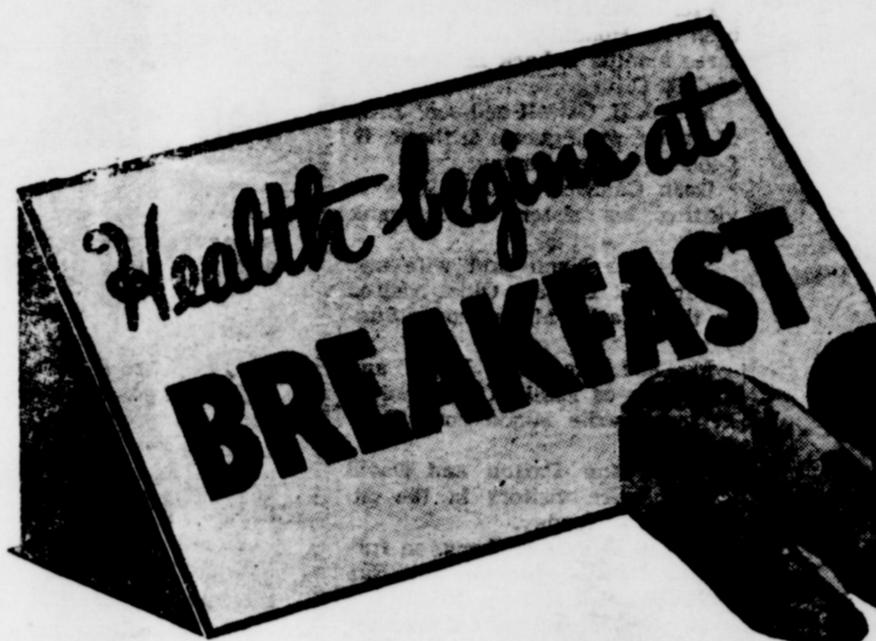

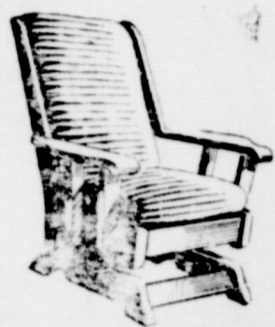

**2 COUNTY MEN ENLIST IN AAF**

Taking advantage of the new pay raise and educational benefits offered by the regular army, James A. Carmichael of Mobeetie and Willis R. Keelin of Kelton enlisted for three years in the Army Air Forces to serve in the Caribbean theatre.

The young men were sent to Enid, Okla., and from there reported to Fort Sam Houston for assignment.

The army recruiters are in Wheeler every Tuesday morning at the postoffice to answer questions pertaining to the army.

The recruiters pointed out that on July 1, a new pay raise went into effect for members of all Armed Forces. The new wage scale is: Private \$75.00; Private First Class \$80.00; Corporal \$90.00; Sergeant \$100.00; Staff Sergeant \$115.00; Technical Sergeant \$135.00; and Master Sergeant \$165.00.

The pay raise is only one of the advantages offered by the Army, the recruiters state. The family allowance is still in effect and the G. I. Bill of Rights is still good. When a married man enlists in the Army, he has the privilege of making an allotment to his wife. To do this, he forfeits only \$22.00 from his own pay, and the government adds \$28.00 to give his wife \$50.00 per month. Then there is \$30.00 for one child and \$20.00 for each additional child.

Men who are single but have someone dependent upon them for support, can also make this allotment. Men who are married and have dependents other than their wives and children, can have two allotments.

All men who enlist before October 5, 1946, will be eligible for all benefits offered under the G. I. Bill of Rights. But October 5, is the deadline for this advantage.

"If you are interested in a good job and an education, see us at the post office or leave your name and address there and we will be glad to come to your home or where you work. 'It's a pleasure for us to give any assistance we can,' the recruiters declared.

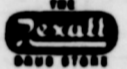
