The program is under the sponsorship of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and is receiving the active support of more than 200 cocporations and organizations that are interested in highway traffic safety.

Under the slogan "Check Your Driving, Check Your Car, Check Accidents," the program will stress safe driving habits along with the necessity for keeping automobiles in top mechanical condition.

The traffic problem is growing increasingly bad, according to police officials. In 1945, 28,500 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents, and nearly 1,000,000 sustained injuries. This was a 17 per cent increase over the previous

Statistics available for 1946 indicate even steeper increases than were seen last year. In January 1946, traffic fatalities were 49 per cent higher than the previous January. February's increase over the preceding year amounted to 15 pe cent. And in March, 1946, there were 39 per cent more deaths than n March 1945.

Veterans whose disabilities are service-connected may in adiition to hospitalization and domiciliary care receive out-patient medical, surgical, and dental services for their service-connected liseases or injuries. Treatment may be given at a Veterans Adminstration Hospital or be authorized o be given by a physician or denist in the applicant's place of resiience. Requests should be addressed to the nearest Regional Office of the Veterans Administration.

Q. Does the Veterans Adminstration furnish artificial limbs to

A. Artificial limbs are furnished eterans when required for a serice-connected condition or for an associated disease or injury held to I e aggravating the disability from service-connected disease or inury. Seeing-eye dogs are also furnished.

Q. Where should veterans go to eceive employment assistance? A. To the nearest office of the Inited States Employment Service or to the nearest Selective Service

Q. How can a veteran who is inerested in Federal employment find out about job opportunities?

A. Announcements of civil service examination, and the proper application forms, may be obtained at any first or second-class post ffice, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washngton 25, D. C. A veteran gets f point preference because of his service, and 10 points if disabled.






