Veterans News

(This official veterans' information service is prepared by the St. Louis branch office of the Veterans Administration.)

National Service Life Insurance "term" policies can be converted to permanent insurance only through the Veterans Administration, and not through a private, commercial insurance company. And once it has been converted, the insurance has several valuable advantages over the "term" policy.

Converted insurance has a cash surrender value, which increases as long as the veteran pays premiums on the policy. Converted policies also have a loan value, which means that the veteran may borrow up to 94 per cent of his policy's cash value, at a 5 per cent interest.

If he wishes, the veteran may surrender his permanent policy and have the Veterans Administration issue him a completely paid-up policy for a smaller amount. For example, a 25-year-old veteran who took out a \$10,000 policy on the 30-payment life plan would pay \$197.70 a year in premiums. If he decided to drop the policy at the end of one year, it would have a cash value of \$123. This \$123 is enough to purchase \$340 in paid-up insurance, and he could have VA issue him a fully-paid policy for that amount.

Another advantage of converted insurance is its "extended insurance" value. If the veteran stops paying premiums, he can have the cash value of his policy applied against future premiums, thus extending the life of the policy. In this case the policy keeps its full face value, but expires when the "extended" period is over. A 30-year-old veteran who has paid premiums for five years on his 20-payment life policy, for instance, can have the policy extended for 13 years and 195 days without paying any additional premiums.

Insurance converted to one of the permanent plans offered by the government has all the valuable features of the "term" insurance carried by veterans while in service. There are no restrictions as to travel, residence, occupation, or military or naval service. Proceeds of the policies are not taxable, and payments made to beneficiaries are not subject to claims by creditors of the veteran or beneficiary, except that the Federal government may make such claims.

HANDICAPPED YOUNG PEOPLE LEARN CRAFTS

COMMERCE—A sheltered workshop, where handicapped young people of Texas can learn crafts and trades that will make them self-sustaining, has been established in Dallas, according to an announcement by Dr. Sam H. Whitley of Commerce, President of the Texas Society for Crippled Children. The workshop was financed through the sale of Easter Seals which the Society annually conducts.

"Rehabilitation of the crippled is one of the main objectives of the Texas Society for Crippled Children," Dr. Whitley pointed out. "It is vital that they be equipped for trades that will make them self-

sustaining citizens. In New York, Chicago and other cities where sheltered workshops have been in operation a number of years, the products turned out by the handicapped are in great demand and command prices equal to any comparable merchandise. We have a great opportunity in Texas for the development of this work.

In the sheltered workshop, children and young people will weave,

make wood carvings, costume jewelry and other handicrafts to which the director, Mrs. Clyde W. Myers, finds them adapted. All profits, beyond cost of materials used in the manufacture of the items, will go to the handicapped makers. In addition, spastic children of pre-school age will be given training in muscular re-education and speech correction.

The director, Mrs. Myers, was the

first occupational therapist in France during the first world war. Her introductory work was largely responsible for the establishment of handicraft rooms in veterans' hospitals. She later did organization therapy work for Hull House in Chicago, worked with mental patients in the government hospital in Panama and inaugurated pottery making classes for a leper colony in the Caribbean.

State headquarters of the Texas Society for Crippled Children are now located at the workshop, 700 Worth St., Dallas.

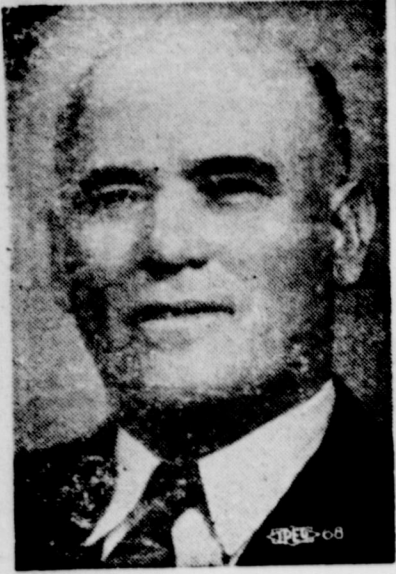

CULBERSON IS UNOPPOSED FOR SECOND TERM

Olin Culberson, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, has formally announced his candidacy for a second term as Railroad Commissioner basing his candidacy on his record of economical administration, his hard fight to conserve the Texas natural gas supply and his consistent drive for the removal of the freight rate discrimination against Texas farmers, fruit and vegetable growers, ranchers and other producers.

"I have carried out my pledges to follow the 'open door' policy of honesty and friendliness in the Commission's Austin office, have abolished 'favoritism' in Railroad Commission oil-gas regulation truck, bus, rail and utility matters and have vigorously fought every attempt of Federal Control of oil and gas in Texas," said Mr. Culberson in his first re-election announcement.

"But the fight to make of the Texas Railroad Commission what Jim Hogg conceived it should be when he battled the special interests to create the Commission has just started. Governor Hogg saw it as guardian of the people's rights and the public wealth. Olin Culberson sees the Commission's duty in that same light today. The economic structure of our state is founded largely on our great oil industry and our natural resources must not be squandered now but must be conserved for the welfare of future generations as well as for the benefit of the present. The oil-gas and transportation industries are safe in the experienced hands of Olin Culberson.

"One of the prime projects of my first term has been to stop the waste of gas. I have also worked to check the heedless and unrestricted exportation of our natural gas into states having cheap coal. I am most proud of my record on the score," said Culberson.

Culberson's greatest single achievement was his steadfast refusal to agree in 1941 to put into effect at once a 6 per cent increase on railroad freight rates on the Interstate Commerce Commission. All 47 other states did put the increase into effect costing their people

plenty by doing so. A year passed during which time Culberson still argued and delayed the installation of the 6 per cent hike in freight rates in Texas, and then the interstate Commerce Commission suspended their order. The saving to Texas shippers was approximately \$5,000,000.00 proving that courage on the part of a public official pays great dividends when that official is devoted to the public welfare and is not afraid of political consequences when he fights for the people.

Chairman Culberson, nearing 60 and a veteran of World War I, was born in Coryell County. As a young man he worked in the Katy Railroad yard at Hillsboro as a switchman. He is truly the first railroad man to ever be elected Railroad Commissioner. He served Hill County both as County Clerk and then as County Judge before moving to Edna, Jackson County, in 1928 and engaging in the merchantable business and farming. Olin Culberson is a member of the Presbyterian Church, Lions Club, American Legion and is Secretary of the Texas Volunteer Firemen with organizations in 515 towns, which membership is composed almost in its entirety of veterans of World War I or World War II.

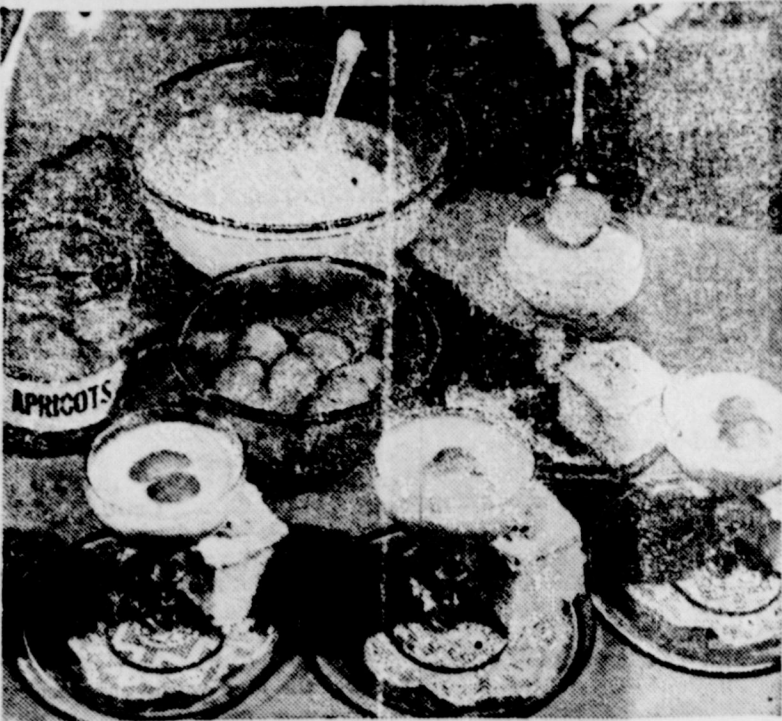

APRICOT CUSTARD DESSERT



Glassed apricots top a smooth, creamy custard for delightful texture and flavor contrast.

One of the finest dessert combinations is a delicately flavored custard topped with fruit—a delightful texture and flavor contrast.

A smooth, creamy custard is not difficult to make if two simple rules are followed. First, cook the custard in the top of a double boiler over hot, not boiling, water. And second, do not overcook.

Glassed apricots are called for in this recipe, although peaches or pears would be equally good. You're never at a loss for a good dessert combination when there are several duraglas jars of fruit on hand in the cupboard, ready to open and serve with this easy-to-make custard.

Chilled Apricot Custard (6 servings)

5 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups bottled milk, scalded
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1 jar apricots

Combine eggs, sugar and salt. Mix well. Add scalded milk slowly and stir until smooth. Strain into top of double boiler. Cook over hot, not boiling water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and will coat a metal spoon (about five minutes). Remove from heat and cool. Add vanilla. Chill thoroughly. Pour into dessert dishes and top with chilled apricot halves.

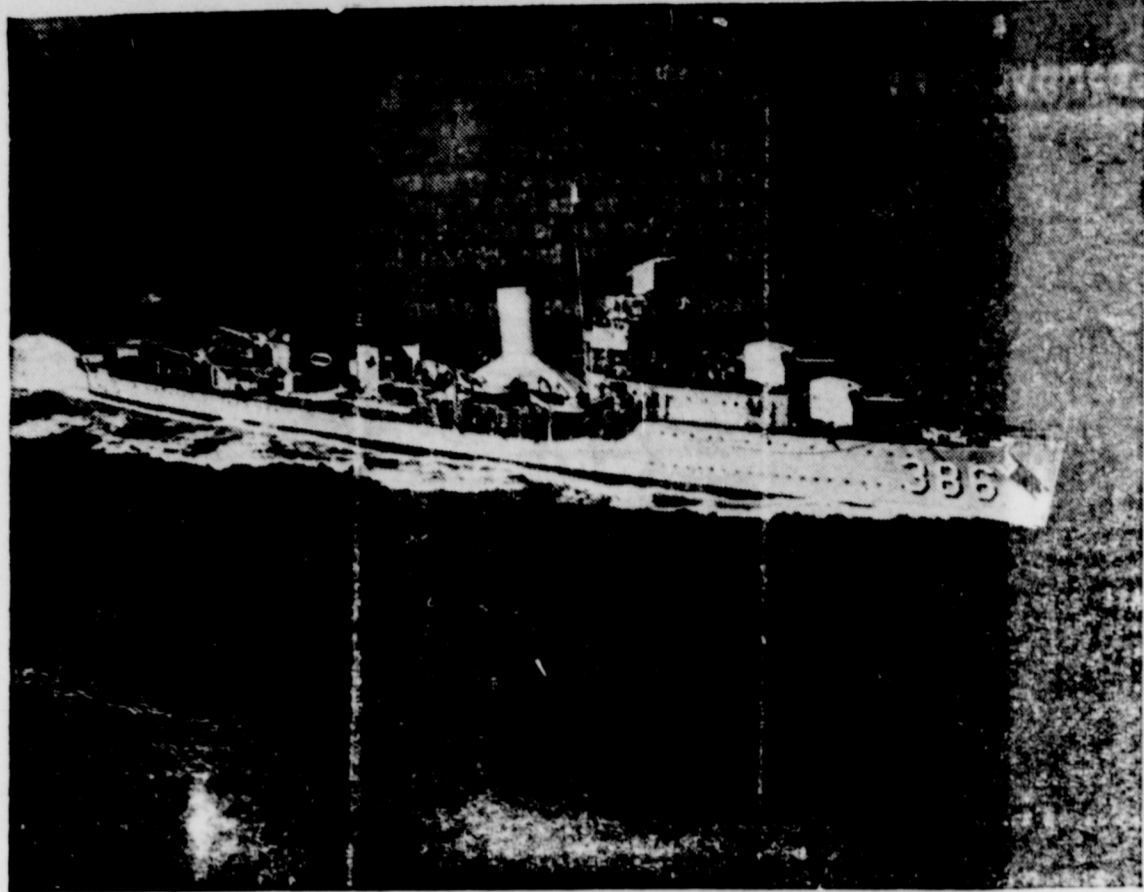

Nourishing Soup



A cup of glassed carrots is pureed and combined with chopped green onions in recipe for appetizing home-made soup.

Homemade Carrot and Green Onion Soup makes an excellent luncheon dish. All the ingredients used are brimful of nourishment. Serve the soup with a crisp fruit or vegetable salad, Melba toast or crackers.

Carrot and Green Onion Soup (6-8 servings)
 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1/2 cup chopped green onions
 3 tablespoons flour
 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 5 cups bottled milk
 1 cup glassed carrots, pureed

Heat fat and add onions. Simmer about five minutes. Add flour and seasoning, blending thoroughly. Stir in milk gradually and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add pureed carrots and heat thoroughly.

To puree carrots: Measure out 1 cup of drained carrots from jar. Mash through strainer or colander.

Veterans' News

Q Who may be designated as beneficiaries of National Service insurance?

A The insured has the right to designate a beneficiary or beneficiaries of the insurance within the following classes: wife or husband, child, parent, brother or sister.

Q May a veteran called into service under the Selective Service Act, and discharged before December 7, 1941, receive a course of education or training under the G. I. Bill?

A Yes. Any person who served in the active military or naval service on or after September 16, 1940, and prior to the termination of the war is entitled to apply for a course of education or training at the school or college of his choice.

Q When a veteran gets married can he change the beneficiary of his National Service life insurance from his mother to his wife?

A The insured may change the beneficiary at any time by notice in writing signed by the insured and forwarded to the Veterans Administration.

Q Does the veteran's right to obtain guaranty or insurance on loans continue indefinitely?

A No, but guaranty or insurance may be had when obtaining a loan if within 10 years from the officially declared termination of World War II, so the right will continue for a long time.

Q How should a veteran pay premiums on his National Service life insurance?

A By sending to the Collections Subdivision, Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C., checks or money orders made payable to the Treasurer of the United States as the premiums become due. The veteran should include his policy number, otherwise his full name, rank or rate, service number, date of discharge and date of birth, along with his remittance.

Olean Bailey With U. S. Army In Tokyo

Sgt. Olean V. Bailey of Wheeler is among the men serving with the 1st Cavalry Division in the occupation of the Nippon capital. Overseas since June 15, 1945, he is assigned to the 8th Cavalry Regiment, which guards important buildings in the Tokyo area. Bailey wears the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon, the Good Conduct Medal, and the Victory Medal.

As a civilian, Bailey attended Mobeetie high school. He entered the army July 12, 1944 and took his basic training at Fort Riley, Kansas. After discharge, he plans to return to college. His mother, Mrs. Pearl Bailey, resides in Mobeetie.

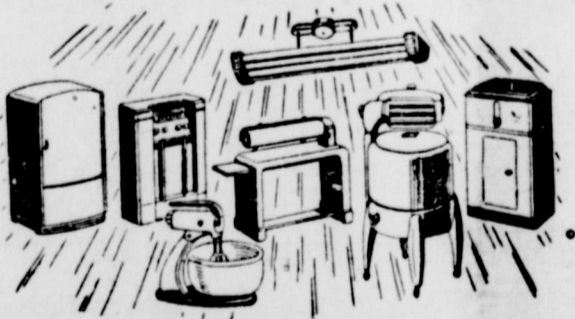
