

Woman Killed When Hit By Car On Highway 83; Driver Held Blameless

Mrs. Ruth Humphreys, 46-year-old resident of Sapulpa, Okla., died in a Shamrock hospital Sunday afternoon shortly after being struck by an automobile on U. S. Highway 83, about six miles south of Wheeler.

Mrs. Humphreys whose car was stopped beside the pavement while a tire was being changed, stepped into the side of a passing car being driven by James McGregor of Perryton. The door handle of the car struck Mrs. Humphreys in her side, inflicting fatal injuries.

Sheriff Jess Swink, driving to Shamrock, was directly behind the McGregor car, and County Judge George Hefley happened on the scene within a few minutes. Both said Mrs. Humphreys blindly stepped into the path of McGregor's car and that the driver was entirely blameless.

Mrs. Humphreys was taken to Shamrock in Sheriff Swink's car. The accident occurred about 3:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Humphreys was traveling with her husband, E. P. Humphreys, and their daughter and son-in-law. They had been in Pampa visiting a daughter and were going south when one of their tires went flat. It was while the men were changing tires that Mrs. Humphreys wandered onto the pavement.

McGregor was driving his wife and baby to Shamrock at the time. They were grief stricken at the tragedy.

Mr. Reid, brother of Levi and Leonard (mention of this fact is The Times' idea, not his) left Wheeler 10 years ago after putting up with the yams of local fishermen for about 20 years. COUNTY FILES FORMAL BID ON VETS' SCHOOL

Acting on instruction from the Wheeler County School Board, Allen Kavanaugh, county superintendent of schools, this week made formal application for a Wheeler County Vocational school for war veterans, to be conducted in cooperation with the Distributive Education Division of the State Board for Vocational Education at Austin.

Kavanaugh submitted a detailed plan of organization for such a school, including a suggested course of studies, in a comprehensive brief to the State Board for Vocational Education.

Application was made after the county superintendent had devoted several days intensive study of the new G. I. educational set-up and had made a trip to Austin where he conferred at length with A. O. Willman, chairman of the State Veterans Approving Committee, and B. C. Davis, area supervisor of Vocational Education.

The Wheeler County School Board, through its president, H. M. Wiley, authorized application for the school on recommendation of County Superintendent Kavanaugh who said he saw in its establishment an opportunity to offer practical instruction on a part-time basis to veterans who might not be able to avail themselves of further formal education.

The application was the result of a meeting held recently at Wheeler when representatives of Mobetie, Wheeler and Shamrock went into details of establishing a veterans school with Ray Chappelle, head of the department of agricultural education, Texas Tech.

Courses offered would include agriculture, distributive education (wholesale and retail businesses), trade, industry and home-making. The Veterans Administration defrays costs of the school up to \$50 per month per student, and pays veterans enrolled \$65 or \$90 per month, depending on whether they are married. The school is similar to one-the-job training as far as subsistence to veterans is concerned.

Fifty-six counties in Texas have similar schools at this time, most of them having been put in operation in the past few weeks.

Albert Cooper announced this week the sale of one-third interest in The Wheeler Times to J. C. Howell, recently discharged Wheeler county war veteran, who was an employee of Cooper's for seven years before Howell entered military service four years ago.

Howell has assumed editorship of The Times and will be manager of the property which is now undergoing a remodeling and expansion program.

The new editor has already moved his wife and baby to Wheeler and established a home here.

The Army Takes Over As Third G. I. Moves Into Wheeler Times

Albert Gunter of Wheeler, is a new employee of The Times. Albert started to work this week as an apprentice under the Veterans on-the-job training program.

Albert was discharged from the army last October after 63 months service. The son of Mrs. M. L. Gunter, he is almost a native Wheelerite, having spent all but four years of his life in this city.

Incidentally, The Times claims the distinction of being an almost 100 per cent G. I. institution, having its three principal jobs filled by former war veterans. J. C. Howell entered Cooper's employ 11 years ago, following his graduation from high school and was with him at Shamrock continuously until the outbreak of the war. He served successively as reporter, office supply manager, advertising writer and assistant publisher. His experience has been thorough in all departments of newspapering.

Cooper said business matters required him spending considerable time in Shamrock but that he plans to be in Wheeler two or three days a week. He said he has learned by experience of the past seven months it is a physical impossibility for him to try to personally handle the details of publishing two newspapers and that in fairness to the people of Wheeler and vicinity he is selling an interest in The Times and turning its entire management over to a well qualified young newspaperman who will be a fulltime resident and booster for Wheeler.

"The people of Wheeler and North Wheeler county are entitled to the undivided attention and services of their editor," Cooper said in announcing formation of the partnership with Howell. "When I started negotiations to purchase The Times I had in mind making just such a deal with J. C. Howell as I am announcing today. He did not receive his discharge from the service as early as we had counted on, however, and I have done the best I could under the circumstances."

"The public will find in J. C. Howell not only a splendid newspaperman but also a fine, clean-cut young man of the highest order. He and his gracious wife will be an addition to the community," said Cooper in turning management of the paper over to Howell this week.

The Times added a 4-page Cottrell newspaper press last week and it was necessary to tear a large hole in the rear of the building to move it in. The front of The Times building is being remodeled and painting of the building is expected to get underway next week.

Office fixtures and mechanical equipment will be permanently arranged after the painting is completed. While work is underway, production is at a low ebb and The Times takes this means of apologizing to its customers for delays in turning out work.

When the remodeling program is completed, The Times will not take a backseat to any small town newspaper in the county.

FORMER PASTOR HERE HONORED SCOUT TROOP IS PROPOSED

WHERE IS OUR BUTTER?

Many of us would be astonished to
 be told that we've already had our
 butter. Yet that would come very
 close to being the correct answer.
 True we haven't had it as butter.
 But we have had the butter, in the
 form of increased amounts of milk,
 and other of its products, points out
 the National Dairy Council. Last year
 the American people consumed about 16
 billion pounds more milk as fluid milk
 and cream than the average for the
 years 1935 to 1939. That amount of
 milk would make almost six pounds of
 butter apiece for every man, woman
 and child in the United States, and
 still leave as much milk and cream as
 was had in the years 1935 to 1939.
 Besides this 13 billion pounds more
 milk was made into cheese, dry-whole-
 milk, evaporated milk, and ice cream,
 than in those pre-war years. That
 amount of milk

accounts for almost another 5 pounds
 of butter per person. In the case of
 these concentrated milk products, it
 is only fair to point out that most of
 the extra production was shipped
 overseas for American armies, and for
 relief. The important point, in the
 opinion of the National Dairy Council,
 is that Americans are eating better.
 Those improved diets call for much
 greater quantities of dairy products.
 While American dairymen are produc-
 ing at an all time high, they haven't
 been able to keep pace with the
 demand, and until production and
 economic conditions are such, that
 they can catch up with this demand,
 consumers must realize that they can't
 drink their butter, and spread it on
 their bread, too.

Veterans News

(This official veterans' information
 service is prepared by the St. Louis
 branch office of the Veterans Admin-
 istration.)

Just before they left the service,
 most veterans were asked if they
 wished to file claim for pension for
 disabilities incurred while in the
 armed forces. But nobody wanted
 to linger around the separation
 center any longer than necessary,
 so many eligible vets passed up
 this opportunity. At that time,
 the precious discharge certificate
 was the immediate, all-important
 goal.

But these veterans may still apply
 for pension. Even if they once
 signed a statement saying they did
 not wish to file a claim, they may
 do so at any time.

All disability pensions are paid
 by the Veterans Administration,
 and not by the army or navy. To
 file a claim, the veteran should
 visit the nearest Veterans Admin-
 istration regional office, or one of
 the VA contact offices in small
 towns. Here he will fill out a pen-
 sion application, which is forward-
 ed to the regional office adjudica-
 tion division. The Veterans Admin-
 istration secures the veteran's
 medical service records, and all the
 papers go to a rating board. This
 board studies the case, and decides
 whether the veteran incurred his
 disability in service, whether the
 disability is sufficient to justify a
 pension award, and how much the
 pension shall be.

The amount of pension depends
 on the extent of the vet's disability.
 A veteran rated 10 per cent dis-
 abled is eligible for a monthly pen-
 sion of \$11.50, while one rated 100
 per cent disabled will receive \$115.
 In addition, further payments for
 certain injuries, such as loss of an
 arm, can boost the veteran's
 monthly payment as high as \$300.
 The number of the veteran's
 dependents has no bearing on the
 amount of pension.

If the veteran applies for pen-
 sion within six months after his
 discharge, he probably will not
 have to take a physical examina-
 tion. If an exam is required, VA
 will notify him when and where it
 is to be taken.

If he applies within a year after
 discharge, whatever pension is
 awarded ordinarily will be made
 retroactive to the date of his
 discharge. If he applies later, the
 pension will begin as of the date
 he applied.
