## Postage Increase Effective April 3

Today Postmaster Walker announced that a decision has been reached by the Board of Governors concerning the proposed increase in postage rates.

Effective April 3, 1988, the new rate for first class postage will be 25 cents. This is the first increase in postage costs in three years. Although no one welcomes an increase in postage, it should be placed in perspective. For example, in 1932 a first class postage stamp cost 3 cents. With adjustments for inflation, that same stamp would cost 25.5 cents.

The new "E" stamp, which will cost 25 cents, will go on sale March 23. The Post Office will also have an ample supply of 3 cent stamps and other postage to meet your mailing needs.

**Dear Editor,**

I would like to respond to an opinion written by Ed Nall in "The Capitol Review", March 24, 1988, which made several statements based on mis-information and half-truths concerning me and my professional experience in regard to my qualifications to be the next sheriff of Wheeler County. Reasonable men and women can disagree in their opinion concerning every subject under the sun and still be friends and respect each other. I do not care one iota what Ed Nall thinks of me personally, and frankly, a bad opinion held by him of me may be the best compliment he can pay me and my character. However I do not want him to mislead the voting public concerning my qualifications.

In the "Think About It" column published March 24, 1988, the editor inferred that I was only "a security guard at a department store" or a contractor who built a septic system. He also guessed that it would cost taxpayers \$5.00 per person in Wheeler County to train a new staff due to a change in the sheriff's department. Mr. Nall's statement is ambiguous and unclear as to what meaning is intended. Does he mean to infer that a whole new staff needs to be trained or that it would cost that amount to train each man? No facts were presented, just guesses.

**Fact:** I have a Criminal Justice Administration Degree after completing four years of college and 18 hours towards a Masters Degree in Criminal Justice Administration. I have nine (9) years experience on the streets of Amarillo as a policeman, where I investigated every type of crime in the books on crime reporting. I have made more arrests upon which convictions were based for felonies, drug possession and sales in one month than our local sheriff's department has done in three (3) years and three (3) months with none of mine being dismissed or turned down for faulty procedures or un-constitutional searches or seizures.

**Fact:** I am a veteran of the United States Army MP's and a sentry dog handler and NCOIC for a nuclear missile site with a crypto security clearance.

**Fact:** I was appointed City Judge of Wheeler for three years.

**Fact:** I am a certified Probation Officer and was employed by Potter County for one (1) year.

**Fact:** I was a security manager for Sears, Roebuck in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, 23rd and Penn, for three (3) years. (Contact Roy Teehee, South Store to inquire as to the details of what I did for security in the Penn Square Store.)

I employed ten (10) off-duty OKC police officers for store security with no turn over in employees.

**Fact:** I am a certified law enforcement officer possessing all certifications for standards and education in the State of Texas.

**Fact:** I am an instructor for law enforcement education classes for certification.

**Fact:** I am a General Contractor. I build steel buildings, pour large concrete slabs, sidewalks, garages, and install septic systems, paint houses, plumb, wire, and do just about anything needed to be done in the contracting area.

**ACS April Crusade Breast Screening**

The 1988 Texas Breast Screening Project will once again provide low-cost screening mammograms to symptom-free women for a limited period in the spring. The project's long-term goal is to increase awareness of the need for routine mammography for the early detection of breast cancer.

Last year's project in Texas set national records and prompted more than 60,000 mammograms. Early analysis indicates some 400 cancers have been found.

Hospitals and breast screening centers throughout the state will join forces with the American Cancer Society to offer low-cost mammograms to all symptom-free women, regardless of whether or not they are covered by health insurance. The total price of a mammogram during the project is not to exceed \$50.

Insurance companies in the state have been mandated by Texas law to begin coverage of screening mammograms, as of this year. Women who have insurance should check with their insurance carrier to see when during the year this coverage will take effect for them.

A baseline mammogram should be performed between the ages of 35 and 40. Then, women age 40 and older should have a mammogram every one to two years, depending on the advice of their physician. And after age 50, women should have a mammogram every year, according to ACS guidelines.

All women should practice breast self-examination every month and should have a breast examination by a physician every year. Mammography, which has an accuracy rate of about 90 percent, together with breast self-examination and a physician's exam offer the breast defense against breast cancer.

On a local level, the 1988 project is being led by physicians and other dedicated volunteers who have formed local task forces.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

Dear Water Supply Customers:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) set drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.50 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
2. if the home is less than five years old, or
- if you have soft or acidic water, or
- if water sits in the pipes for several hours

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder, or flux were used in your home plumbing.

The water of the Wheeler Water System falls below the lead content required by the EPA.

As new lines are laid and old ones repaired any lead that is found it is removed.

The City of Wheeler, Texas owns the Wheeler Water System. Frank Clymer is the water superintendent for the City of Wheeler. You may call the City office at 806 826 3222 for additional information.

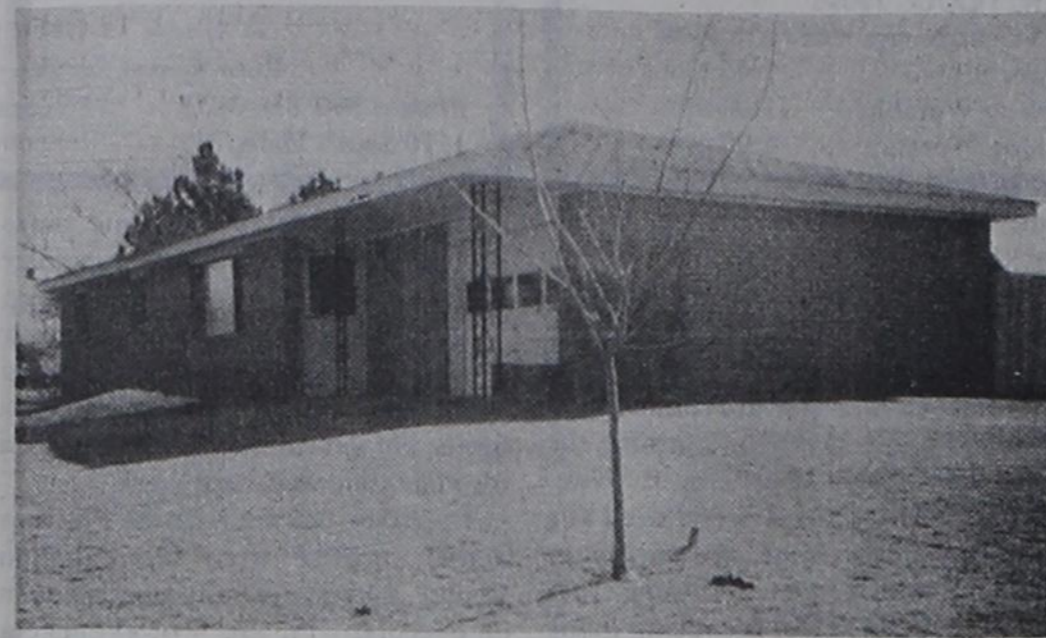

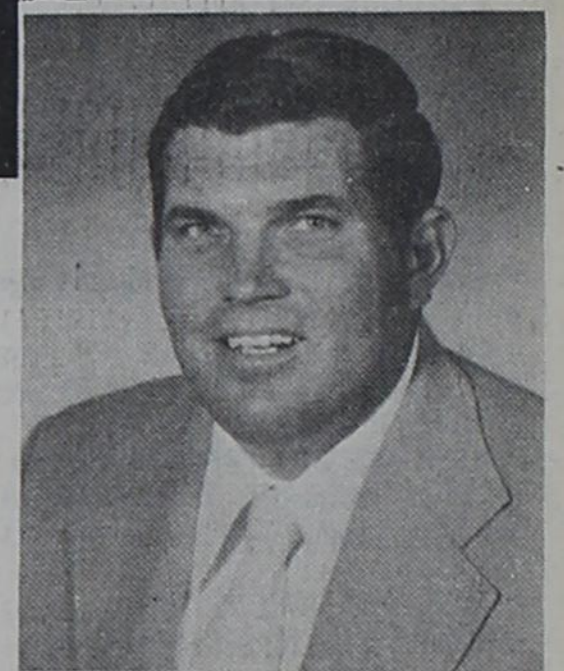

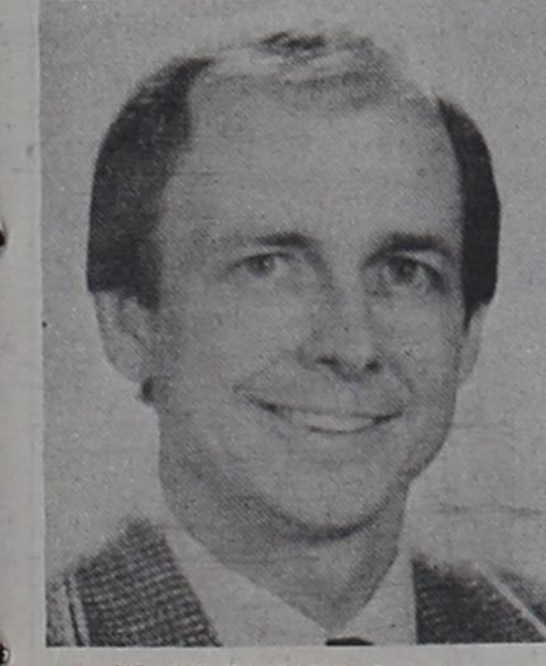
