City Saddened By Death Young Business Leader

Hundreds of saddened friends gathered at the First Methodist church Monday afternoon when burial rites were held for Raymon D. Holt, popular cashier of the Citizens State Bank, who passed away Saturday in Kansas City of a heart ailment.

Rev. Hugh Hunt, Methodist pastor, was in charge of the service, with Dr. C. C. Merritt and Judge R. H. Forrester assisting, the latter being in charge of Masonic rites. Hunt Funeral Home was in charge of burial in the Wheeler cemetery.

Raymon, popularly known as "Red" to hundreds of friends, was one of Wheeler's most loved young business men. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Lions Club, chamber of commerce, and served as chairman of the Wheeler County Ration board. There was no civic enterprise in which he did not take an active interest. He was a member of the Methodist church.



City Council Is Wheeler Cage Asked To Open Meet To Draw **125 Vistors** Wheeler Streets

At a recent meeting of the City Council a petition was pre-sented, signed by 68 different cit-izens and firms in Wheeler, asking that arrangements be made to open up the streets that have heretofore been fenced up by various property owners and to remove all obstructions in the said streets and have them graded.

After extended consideration of the inconvenience to property owners that might be caused by the opening of these streets and of the laws and court rulings governing platted streets and alleys in cities, the City Council passed a resolution that the petition would be complied with so far as it was within the power of the Council. The full text of the petition is herewith quoted:

"We the undersigned citizens of the City of Wheeler, in order to promote and encourage the building of more and better homes in our city, are firmly convinced that more building sites need be made available for such prospective construction:

And, in view of obtaining these much needed locations, it appears that such could be obtained, in a large degree, if all streets in the city were opened and graded, thereby making many now closed building sites accessi-ble to the general public.

We, therefore, petition the Honorable City Council, to open, grade, and maintain all designated streets in the corporate limits of the said City.
