Three Wheeler county officials, two of whom were running for their second elective terms, were voted out of office

in Saturday's Democratic Primary election.

They are: County Treasurer Lillie McClain who was defeated by Palmer Sivage; District Clerk Ollie W. Beene who was unseated by Chris McClain, war veteran; and T. L. Gunter who lost to T. J. Daughtry, a newcomer in county poli-

Sheriff Jess Swink who was re-elected to a third term without a run-off in a three-cornered contest, was the only public official to survive Saturday's balloting. Swink polled 1,336 to 1,108 for W. Z. Baker and 120 for J. D. Frye. There will be a run-off between Roy Gossett and A. C. Wood who led the list of write-in candidates for county surveyor.

> Rogers, popular district attorney who conducted the most intensive Price Daniel's 1015 in the attorcampaign of any Panhandle candidate seeking election in Saturday's primary, carried Gray county 3,061 to Goodrich's 1,344.

Figures furnished Goodrich by supporters in the four counties gave him an overall lead of 401 while tabulations compiled by the Pampa News, Rogers' hometown newspaper, showed less than 250 votes separating the two men.

In a statement expressing his appreciation to neighbors who went to bat in his behalf, Goodrich credited his election to the amazing lead given him in his home county, and to friends who actively supported his candidacy from the start in Gray, Lipscomb and Roberts counties.

Goodrich, a former Thirty-first district attorney for six years, and a former City attorney of Shamrock, received strong backing from ex-service men in the four counties. He has been employed as Wheeler county Service Officer following his discharge from the navy several months ago. He saw action in World War II as a petty officer, being awarded a Presidential Citation.

Goodrich has announced he will

♦ W. E. Mason, seeking a third term as County commissioner in precinct 2, will run it off in the August Primary with S. B. Davis, high in the three-man race with 188 votes. Mason polled 139 and Jess Crowder, 112.

Albert Williams and Charley Wells wil go into a run-off in the County commissioner's race in precinct 3. Williams polled 171, Wells 156 and Robert Terry 134. Justice of the Peace T. E. Burkhalter of precincts 3 and 4, was another victim of the "vote 'em out" trend, losing to John H. Templeton, 584 to 943. Constable John Cox who did not have an opponent on the printed ballot was victorious over Write-In-Candidate Art Godwin by a majority of 216 votes.

Elected without a contest Saturday were: County Clerk Harry Wofford who led the county ticket with 2,717 votes, County Judge G. W. Hefley, County Attorney Homer Moss, County School Superintendent Allen Kavanaugh, County Commissioners Lloyd Anglin of Precinct 1 and H. S. Sims of Precinct 4, Justice of Peace A. C. Wood of Precinc 1 and Constable Bill Eisenmenger of

A. B. Crump was named Democratic County Chairman without opposition, as was R. H. Forres ter, committeeman of precinct 3.

A highlight of Saturday's election was the unprecedented majority given Lewis Goodrich in his race for district judge by his home county electors. Goodrich paced his opponent, Walter Rogers of Pampa, 5 to 1, going out of the county with 2,079 votes to Rogers'

Congressman Eugene Worley of Shamrock, and R. L. Templeton of Wellington, candidate for state representative, were unopposed and polled 2,605 and 2,606 votes. respectively.

Beauford Jester carried this county in the governor's race, polling 1,148 votes to Homer P. Rainey's 695. Jerry Sadler received 162 votes and Grover Sellers 155.

U. S. Senator Tom Connally was ziven 1.604 votes to 459 for his four opponents combined. Boyce House led Allen Shivers by 244 votes for Lieutenant Governor, George Sheppard, controller of public accounts, and Jessie James, state treasurer, carried this county. Pat Neff, Jr., polled 1142 to ney general's race. Railroad Commissioner Olin Culberson carried the county by a landslide.
