



When President Truman said that the country as a whole was to blame for Pearl Harbor, he uttered a truth that should be emphasized and remembered. The sneak attack by the Japs was made possible by the wishful thinking of the American people. We didn't want war and we kidded ourselves into believing that a desire for peace was a means to peace.

Less than 90 days before Pearl Harbor, the house of representatives at Washington came within a single vote of abolishing selective service. The obstructionists and isolationists were perilously close to success in their effort to disband the army which was being created. Congress had grudgingly voted funds, not to increase the air force, but merely to replace the planes that had been destroyed in training or had become outmoded. Charles A. Lindbergh, with a Nazi ribbon on his chest, was proclaiming the virtues of the Nazi regime and the folly of opposing him, and there was some talk of running him for president.

Every move that Mr. Roosevelt had made toward preparedness and toward hampering Hitler had met with a storm of criticism. He was denounced as a war-monger on the floors of congress, and elsewhere.

It would be just as well to forget these things were it not for the fact that the forces which were largely responsible for our wishful indifference to danger in 1941 are still active. They are not noisy at present. but they are biding their time. They will be heard from again, soon enough. They will proclaim that all our occupation forces should be brought home, that our navy should be reduced to its 1933 status. They will try to keep alive all the preju-- anti-Semitism, for example

that were helpful to them before Pearl Harbor. They will abet all efforts to create dissension between this country and its allies. They will restore, if permitted, the same sordid state of mind that prevailed in national affairs after the first world

Because of them, this country must remember the days before Pearl Harbor. Otherwise, it would be better to forget. -Wichita Falls Record

Senders are also asked to place a note in the packages with their name and the name of the addressee and a list of contents. In this way it the mailing address is lost, the package can be opened and the owner identified.

No matter addressed to members of the army or other personnell, receiving mail through overseas post offices, shall be accepted as insured or c.o.d. mail.

Letters or packages containing money or other articles of value shall be refused registration except for valuable or important papers as small articles of intrinic value.

These registered articles must be sealed and bear the first-class rate of postage and be prepared adequately for overseas shipment in parcels not weighing more than eight ounces. Mailing of this type must be specifically requested by the addressee. Lewis pointed out that no overseas package will be accepted from the same person during the same week.

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
