Pvt. F. H. King, Survivor Of U.S.S. Houston Sinking **Liberated From Japanese**

Saturday, September 1, the Glenn King family of Twitty received a message from the commandant of the United States marine corps advising them that their son, Pvt. F. H. King, has been liberated from a Japan prisoner of war camp.

The telegram stated that Private King arrived in India on August 29 and reported him in good physical condition. He had been a prisoner of the Japanese for three years and seven months. Captured following the sinking of the U.S.S. Houston on Feb. 28, 1942, King was at that time reported lost. It was 18 months later, September 1943, that his family was notified that he was in a prisoner of war camp.

Private King had been the first Wheeler county youth reported lost in action following the outbreak of World War II. He enlisted in the marine corps early in 1941, and left in September for duty in the Pacific. The 24-year-old marine saw action in the battle of Macassar Strait and in the Dutch East Indies before being taken prisoner.

THREE-YOLK EGG LAID BY FEBRUARY PULLET

Mrs. Lloyd Childress of Briscoe reports that one of her White Leghorn pullets recently laid an egg containing three yolks, something very unusual since an egg with two yolks is a somewhat rare object so far as the realm of cackle berries goes. Knowing the egg was a huge one, Mrs. Childress thought that it probably contained two yolks and did not measure it before breaking but by putting the pieces of shell together it was found to measure 31/4 inches long and 43/4 inches in circumference. The pullet was hatched in February . . . and purchased from the Lawrence Hatchery of Wheeler.
