AUSTIN-"Fires caused from hot the City of Wheeler, this 1st day crease since the beginning of the fall months," reported Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, in asking housewives to follow safety precautions in using them.

Hall said that 21 water heater fires during the three-month period from September through November, did damage totaling \$66.874.

"Heaters too close to walls and overheated plants have been the worst offenders," he disclosed. Of prime importance is the proper installation of the heater. Com-

missioner Hall believes. "Heaters should have adequate clearance from woodwork and other combustible material," he stressed. Woodwork subjected to prolonged heat becomes excessively dry and requires only a spark, or perhaps

a little extra warmth, to ignite it. This is likely to happen on a zero night when the apparatus is under forced pressure." Heaters should be rigidly supported, supplied with fixed plumb-

ing and should have proper ventng and piping connections. Hot water heating pipes should be so insulated that they cannot



Pollagra, although not a comunicable disease, is one of great meern to public health official Texas and other southern tates. The disease is caused by the lack of certain essential foods and as it comes on slowly, it may tot be recognized until the victi spos as dous smooth tomach trouble, and reddenil nd scalding of the skin.

When these symptoms appea the disease has been present for some time," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer. an individual has pe he harder it is to cure. It is ad an draite attractorizers stora indicestion and bur hands and feet, and if symptoms appear, treatmen should be instituted at once. In its advanced stages pellagra may be ome so severe as to not only ause physical suffering but seri usly affect the mind."

Pollagra is not contagious and i san be prevented entirely by in luding the right kinds of foods in the daily diet. These essential loods are milk fresh meat, whole wheat products, brewer's yeast and salmon as well as tomatoes and other fresh fruits and vegetables. Including these foods in the daily diet will prevent pellagra and as in the case of any disease t is much better to prevent if han to cure it.

The best way to remove score tains from cloth is to rub spots as soon as they are made with flute peroxide. For linens, use piece of cut onion.
