## Tomato Story Unfolds in Area

As the summer weeks slip by, once again the tomato story is being written in the fields in the Bailey County area. Soon the story will come to a climax as the harvesters enter the field to start the product that the vines have produced, on the road to the canneries throughout the country. Playing an important roll in this story, are the many area farmers, who have toiled many hours in the planting, cultivating, irrigation, and harvesting, of this delicate product. There are an estimated 500 acres of tomatoes planted in the Bailey Area, an area which has produced this vegetable for almost 10 years, and added each year more and more pages to the tomato story.



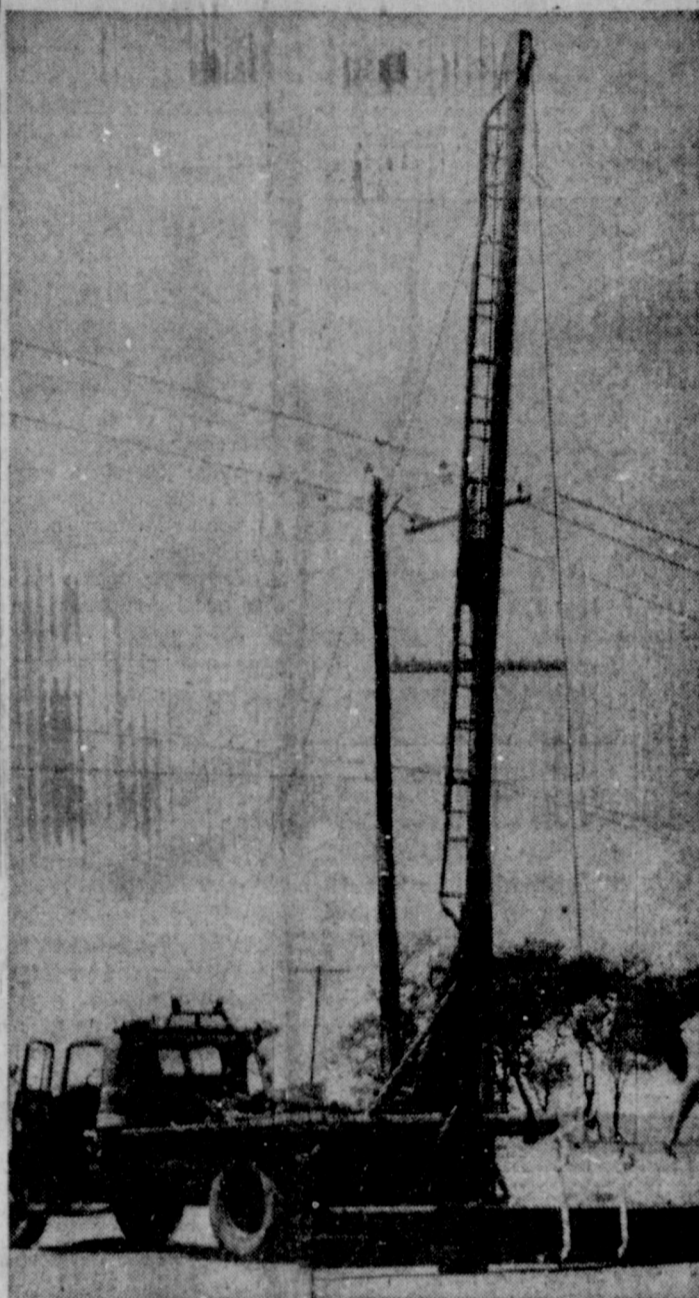
Elvon DeVaney and his son, Shannon, discuss and look over the fine tomato crop with Ed Little. Little has 30 acres of tomatoes on his farm east of Muleshoe. Of the two kinds of tomatoes, Little has 15 acres of each, Chico and Homestead.

Last year, the average production was 20 tons per acre and was considered to be a very good turn out for the farmers. The market price last year was \$30. per ton and it is hoped that there will be a similar price this year.

This reporter visited the farm of Ed Little, President of the Bailey County Farm Bureau, and was taken on a tour of Little's 30 acres of tomatoes. Little, this year is raising 15 acres of the Chico variety and 15 acres of Homestead tomatoes. The Chico and Roma Variety, a pear shaped tomato, used for making tomato paste. These varieties account for an estimated 80 acres of the 500 acres in this area. The Homestead tomato accounts for the remainder. The Homestead is rated as a good traveling tomato, as it is tough meated and will not break down and lose its juice. The homestead is a relative high production tomato.

This crop is somewhat like the cotton crop in as much as the amount of time for it to produce. However, the added number of times it requires to be watered, along with it being more acceptable to disease, this crop is much more delicate. Also, the fact that this crop necessitates hand harvesting, adds more work to the farmer and more expense. The harvesting is done almost entirely by Bracer Labor. The harvest is expected to begin on the Chico tomato some time after the 15th of August with a full harvest expected to be underway about the 15th of September. The hands will go over the fields an estimated three or four times. Harvest will last until the first freeze.

Elvon DeVaney, Western Texas Farm Labor Association reported that although there are no contracted crops in this area at the present, several representatives of some of the larger canneries are in the area looking for crops to contract. DeVaney also stated that last year, the

## Clovis Man Dies Of Electrocution

In a matter of seconds, the life of a young Clovis man was snuffed out during the noon hour Thursday. Kenneth Ray Willey, age 21, was killed instantly when the truck with which he was working came in contact with a Southwestern Public Service High line running parallel with Highway 84, west. An employee of B and C Construction Company of Muleshoe and Clovis, Willey was holding a lead of steel sports steady on the winch line of a truck driven by Jack Owensby, also of Clovis, when the top of the winch boom touched the line carrying 7,200 volts. Owensby was injured slightly as the current danced about the truck before contact could be broken. The site of the accident was at the proposed

location of Johnson Furniture Co. located on West American Blvd. Russel Overdorf, a driver for United Transport Co. from Floydada, Tex. stopped his truck and assisted Sanger Ambulance attendants lead the victim and tried desperately to revive young Willey in route to the West Plains Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival. Survivors of Willey included his parents, M. S. Evelyn Willey, Clovis, Mr. Jesse Willey, Nederland, Tex., one sister, Mrs. Wayne Martin, Clovis, and one brother, Brvay

Wayne Willey, of the home. Willey lived with his mother and brother at 903 Cameo, Clovis.

## Two Probations Revoked, One Denied Bond in District Court

In Bailey County District Court Pedro Gusman was ordered to be remanded to the Sheriff of Bailey County, and to begin serving a four year sentence that had been handed to him October 12, 1963 for Breaking and Entering the Paymaster Gin here in Muleshoe. Gusman had been placed on probation at that time. Gusman was arrested last week in Littlefield by the City Police and charged with DWI and carrying a probated weapon. Gusman pleaded guilty to these charges. In his possession at the time of his arrest, were 14 rifles and a 22 pos-

tol, also 4 tires. It was learned later that the guns had been taken from White's Auto Store in Earth. The tires had been taken from the Shamrock station in Olton. In the course of testimony Friday morning (July 31) in district court, Gusman stated that he took the guns from a pickup truck that was abandoned, but later changed his story and admitted he did enter the store and take the merchandise himself.

Later in a statement to Sheriff Dee Clements, he stated that he broke into the White's store in Earth, the Shamrock Station in Olton and the furniture store in Earth, and the Bell Station in Muleshoe.

Gusman will be returned to Littlefield and charged in Lamb County for the breaking and entering charges after he completes his time for the Muleshoe of (See Probations Page 5)

## Sheriff Attends 86th Annual Crime Seminar

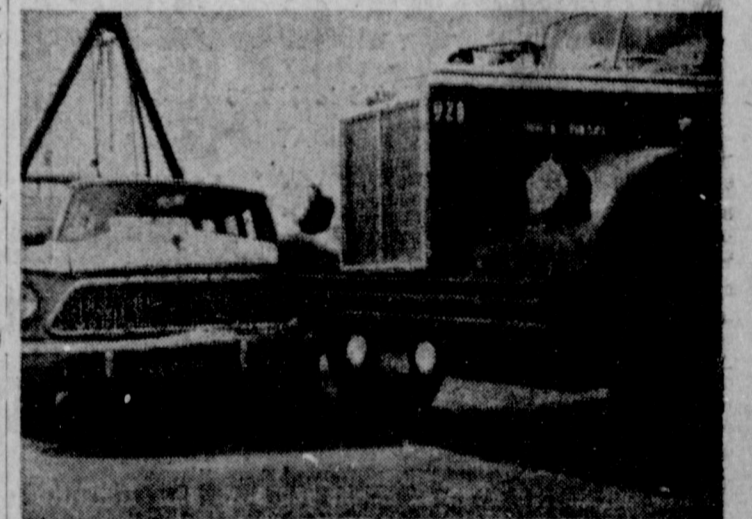
Sheriff and Mrs. Dee Clements have returned from Corpus Christi where they attended the 86th annual Conference and Crime Seminar held July 28 - 29 at the Robert Driscoll Hotel. During the Crime Seminar, Dallas Police Captain Will Fritz said that criminals from "all over" but particularly the East have flooded Dallas since the assassination of President John F. Kennedy last November.

Fritz blamed adverse publicity for what he terms "aflood" of

big and small - time hoodlums from other big cities - especially from the East and New England states.

"It's partly because of the bad image Dallas got during the days after the assassination," said Fritz, a veteran law enforcement officer.

Fritz's discussion topic was robbery and he cited a number of known offenders, some of whom he said apparently were attracted by the "bad publicity" (See Sheriff Page 5)

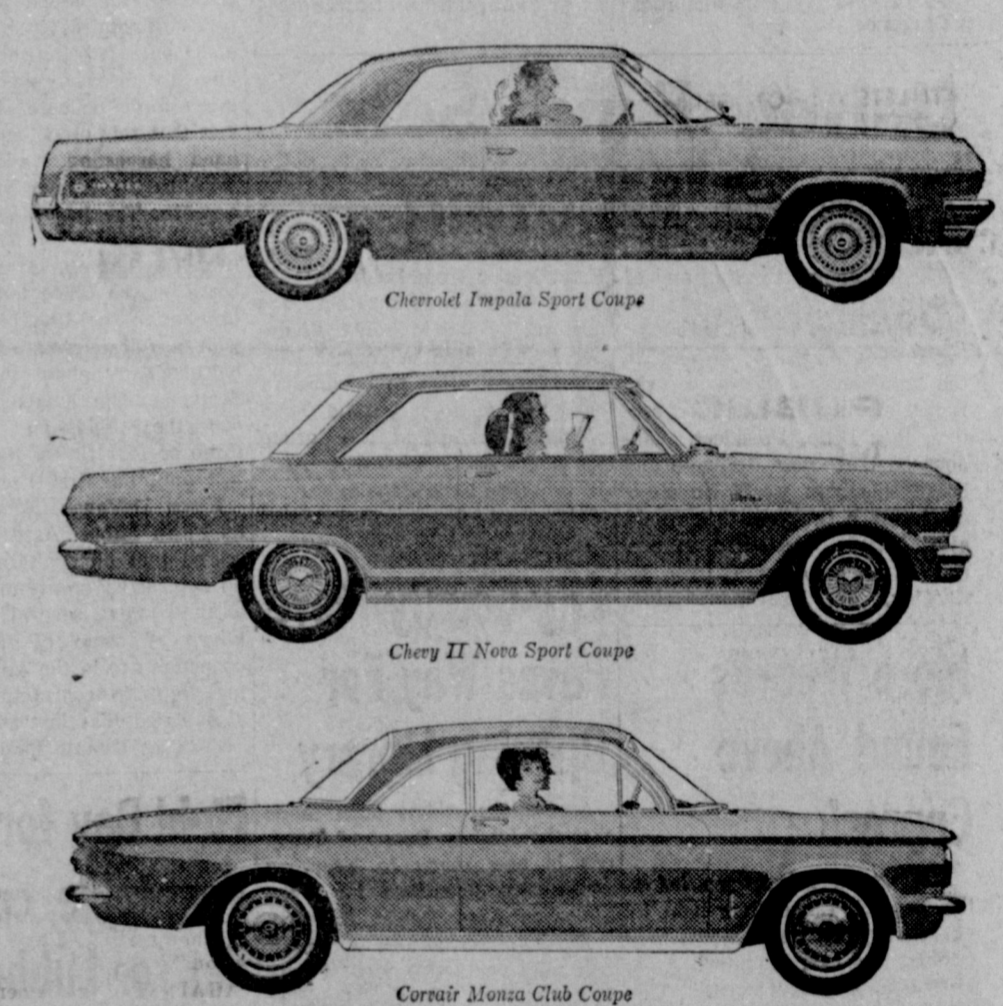

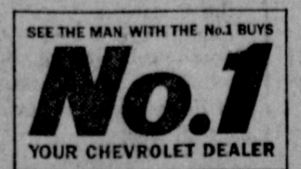

### PUBLIC NOTICE

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

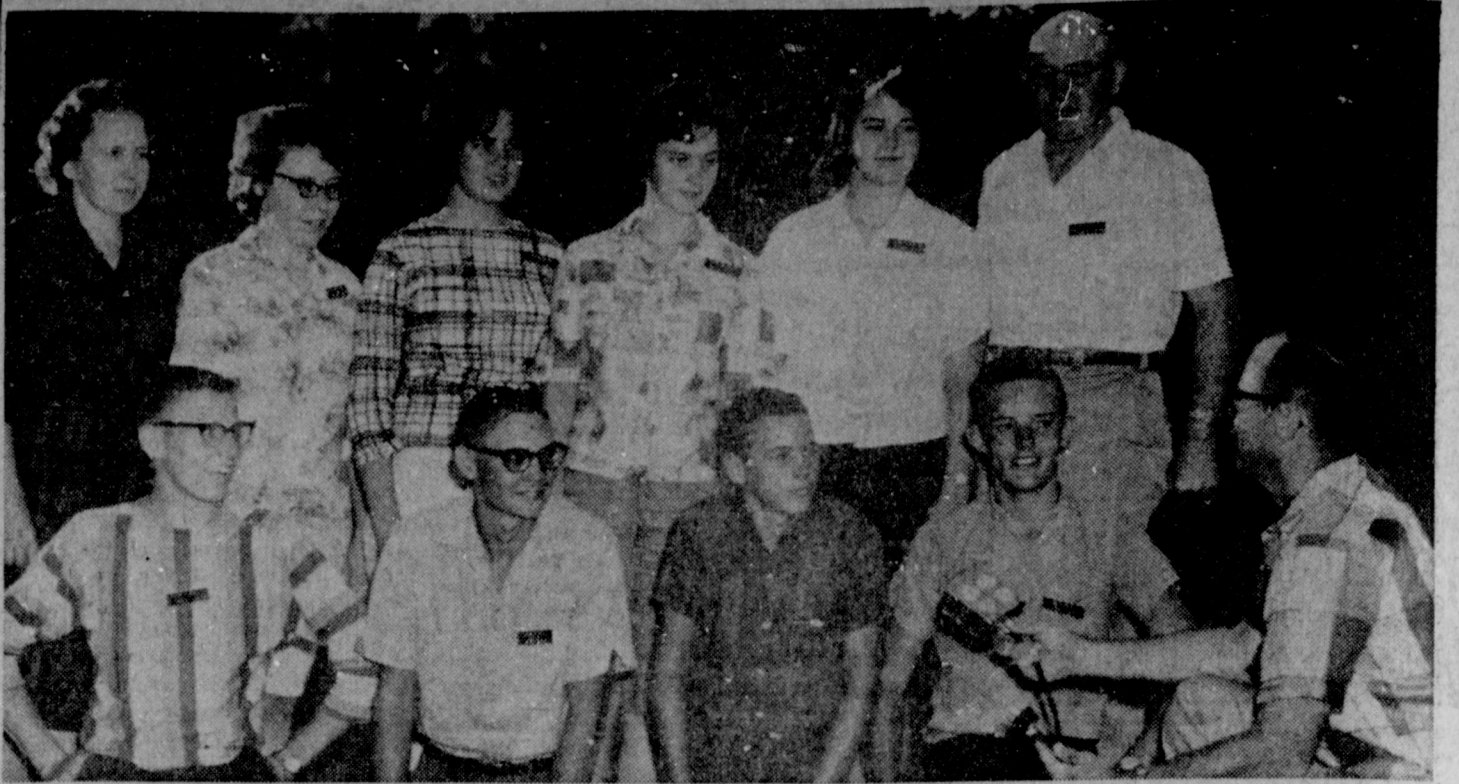
The crowds were large and there were hundreds of Boy Scouts everywhere.

and Garza, 3.2 per cent. Rummel says that weevil infestations have been found in at least 50 different fields above the Caprock in Crosby, Floyd, and Dickens Counties. Survey teams have reported several spotted weevil infestations near the Allmon and McCoy communities in Floyd County. According to Rummel, these infestations are further west than infestations found in the October survey of 1963.

Weevil infestations above the Caprock should be controlled at once to prevent a buildup and further spread of the pest, says Rummel. Anything which can be done now to prevent weevil spread above the Caprock will reduce the cost and improve the effectiveness of the diapause control program this fall.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
 Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:  
 "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinafore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian schools; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."  
 Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."  
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."  
 Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

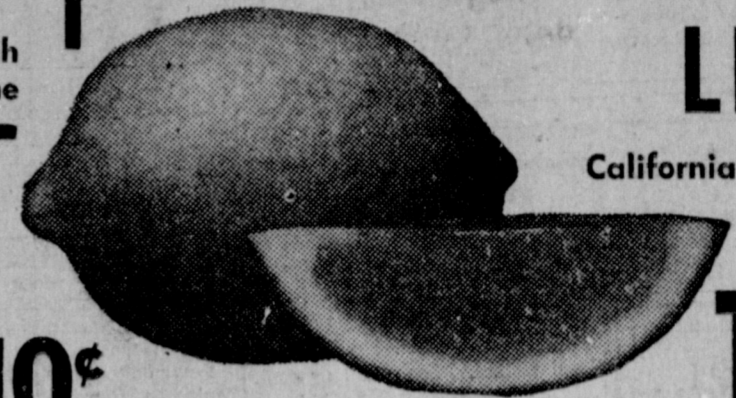
