"All sorts of schemes masquerading under patriotic costumes will be used by solicitors to colllect funds for "labor" or "fightcommunism" prospects, as well as for war memorials and books listing America's fighting men. The vigilance committee of the Ad Club will attempt to separate the worthy from the unworthy.'
