

County Lagging Bottom Of List War Chest Drive

The National War Fund drive in Texas has been continued for one month, through November, E. K. Caperton, chairman of the Wheeler County War Fund, was notified last week by telegram, due to the fact that the state has failed to bring in its quota.

The message was signed by Gov. Coke R. Stevenson, honorary president and Judge Ben Powell, president, United War Chest of Texas, Austin.

The state has achieved only 62 percent of its quota, the message said. Caperton said Wheeler county had raised 51 percent of its quota.

The joint telegram to Caperton said:

"November XXX will settle the question of Texas leadership in two patriotic investment enterprises; namely, in war gifts and war bonds. Both are needed to conduct war job successfully. However, neither should interfere with the other. It is unthinkable Texas should put over bond campaign and fall in war fund effort.

"Yet there are unmistakable signs of National War Fund campaign will fall unless county leaders, workers and givers will take steps to re-organize, re-solicit and re-persuade Texas givers to support final campaign adequately."

Passons. The Silver Star is awarded to Lt. Passons for bravery on the island of Saipan where he died while leading his men on June 23, 1944.

James P. Passons was born at McKinney, Texas on March 5, 1921 and came to Wheeler County with Mr. and Mrs. Ira Passons in October of that same year. He attended the old grade school at Sandy Basin and completed high school at Wheeler, in the spring of 1937. He is a graduate of A. & M. College of Texas.

In the spring of 1942, Passons, then in his senior year volunteered for service in the Marine Corps and was assigned to active duty after graduation in November 1942. He served in the Asiatic Campaigns which culminated

The U. S. Marine Corps will award a Silver Star Medal with citation posthumously to Lieutenant Passons in a public ceremony in Wheeler next Wednesday afternoon. It will be presented the young man's parents in recognition of his bravery on the island of Saipan where he died while leading his men on June 23, 1944.

Sharing honor and recognition with the young veterans of the last war has been the policy of the American Legion whose membership until recently was composed largely of veterans of the first world war. There are now more veterans of the last war in the Wheeler post than veterans of the first war and the membership is growing weekly.

PATROL TO BE HERE TWO DAYS

A member of the State Highway Patrol will be in Wheeler every second and fourth Tuesday instead of on the second Friday, to renew and hold tests for driver's and chauffeur's licenses, County Judge G. W. Hefley has announced.

A patrolman will be here next Tuesday, November 13, and then each second and fourth Tuesday after that.

By spending two days a month at the countyseat the state officers will be better able to handle the large volume of license business that is expected in both private and chauffeur's permits. Knox Parr, district agent, who conferred with Judge Hefley and members of the Commissioners' Court October 27 on the appointment, said he expected Martin to make an outstanding record in Wheeler county.

As county agent of Martin county where he pinch-hitted for George Bond during Bond's service with the Armed Forces, Mr. Martin specialized in beef cattle production, 4-H Club work, crop improvement, farm organizations, and soil conservation.

Martin's record up Stanton way apparently assures Wheeler county of a high place in future district, regional and state 4-H club contests. Beef calves fed under his supervision took second honors at the 1944 Amarillo Fat Stock Show and won the grand championship there in 1945. A number of Martin County 4-H beef calves are now on exhibit at the Pan-American Hereford Exposition at Dallas.

Mr. Martin was born and raised on a stock farm near Dublin, was graduated from Texas A. and M. College in agriculture in 1937, and prior to his appointment as a county agricultural agent served as a teacher of vocational agriculture at Belton.

Quality Milk Production Is County's No. 1 Need



Getting more farmers interested in dairying as a business rather than a hit-or-miss sideline will contribute more to their financial well being and to the general prosperity of Wheeler county than any other one thing, in the opinion of speakers and milk producers attending the Top O' Texas Dairy Association meeting held at Wheeler Wednesday night.

This country offers natural resources for a thriving dairy industry, there will be a continuing demand for quality milk, and persons already engaged in the business are showing larger profits than farmers specializing in other agricultural projects, they said.

The problem is how to interest farmers in taking the milk business seriously.

Only a handful of milk producers from Wheeler county attended the session in the district court room Wednesday night and saw the film, "Scientific Milk Production," produced by Dr. W. E. Peterson of the University of Minnesota, nationally recognized dairy authority. The film dealt with breeding, housing, sanitation and the feeding of dairy animals.

V. B. Hardcastle, administrative officer of Wheeler County ACA and a director of the Top O' Texas dairy association, told those present that dairying would bring county farmers twice as much income as cotton this year, not including the calf crop or live animals sold.

He said milk and cream production alone would bring receipts of approximately \$250,000.

G. G. Heard of Pampa, dairy association secretary, spoke on the need of quality milk, declaring farmers must get ready to produce.

(Continued from First Page) duce grade A milk or quit the business. He predicted state health laws will soon forbid sale of milk below that grade.

"The milk business is not child's play but a he-man's work," said Heard. "The dairy business of today is a professional man's work. The old idea of turning cows out on the range and expecting them to find their own living, is definitely out. Producing quality milk that will make the kind of profits you are entitled to is a scientific business. The man who cares for his herd will make money, the man who doesn't, will not."

O. M. Hampton, representative of Purina Mills, co-sponsor of the film shown at the meeting, listed these four points of a good management program: start with quality breed, take good care of your stock, watch the sanitation, and maintain a good feeding program.

Mr. Jackson of Amarillo, field man with Borden's company, said Wheeler county is ideal for the

GRAFTERS ON THE LOOSE

Many cities and towns are tak-
ing steps to protect their business
men and citizens from fly-by-
night advertising racketeers and
"patriotic" solicitors who will be
descending in hordes, now that the
war has ended and money is flow-
ing freely. We can look for scores
of "Fighting Hero" promotions in
which war vets and their families
will be solicited personally and by
mail for photographs and write-
ups for one kind of volume or an-
other to be off the press soon.

Business men will be approached
by these grafters to take listings
in various "official" magazines
and year books which will be re-
presented as paying tribute to our
fighting men and women. And the
credentials and references of these
slick promoters will look authori-
tative on the surface.

Every town needs some sort of
a business men's "Vigilance Com-
mittee" like Wichita Falls has
formed. In that city the Ad Club
established a committee to investi-
gate and rout the persuasive
salesmen of such rackets.

The Times reprints from an
article in Sunday's Wichita Falls
Times:

"Wichita Falls' only protection
against fly-by-night promoters,
solicitors and one-issue publica-
tions was established by the Ad
Club in the form of the vigilance
committee. Now that committee
has dedicated itself to fighting
racketeers who prey on returning
servicemen, as well as fighting
those who swindle civilians.

"The vigilance committee is a
miniature better business bureau.

"In its first five years in Wich-
ita Falls, 342 racketeers and pro-
moters seeking funds for unsound
enterprises were exposed. Now
that more money than ever is in
circulation, a flood of solicitors
will be selling space in all forms
of "projects."

"All sorts of schemes masquer-
ading under patriotic costumes
will be used by solicitors to col-
lect funds for "labor" or "fight-
communism" prospects, as well as
for war memorials and books list-
ing America's fighting men. The
vigilance committee of the Ad
Club will attempt to separate the
worthy from the unworthy."

YES, PRICE OF PULLING FIXED

In view of the widespread opin-
ion around Wheeler that there is
no "federal law" governing ceiling
prices on farm labor, the Times
wishes to call attention to readers
to an interview given out in Wel-
lington last week by representatives
of the U. S. Department of Agri-
culture who were called there by
a situation similar to that existing
in Wheeler county.

The government men said that
the cotton picking ceiling of \$1.35
in effect here is a federal law, and
that local growers must abide by
it as such or become liable to
prosecution.

Roger Q. Evans of Vernon, with
the USDA, and R. B. Austin of
Childress, assistant wage stabili-
zer, were in Wellington to give in-
formation regarding the cotton
picking ceiling wage program and
to make it clear to cotton growers
the legal status of the ruling and
the penalties involved for its vio-
lation.

After discussing the fact that
only 21 Collingsworth County cot-
ton farmers were present when
wage ceilings were voted on Aug.
31, Mr. Evans said:

"Even though the farmers may
have been negligent in attending
the meeting that created the law
setting a ceiling of \$1.35 for pull-
ing cotton, the law is a federal
law. Even though a majority of
the farmers may be against the
program, it was legally voted and
approved by federal regulation
and will be enforced."

Mr. Austin added that investiga-
tors have been here for the pur-
pose of checking on violations, and
if these are brought to court, they
will be tried in federal court.

Penalty for violation of the cot-
ton wage ceiling regulation is
\$1,000 fine, one year in jail, or
both; or, if the grower pays in
excess of the ceiling, he will have
his entire cotton harvesting ex-
pense deleted from his income tax
deduction.

The penalty applies to cotton
pickers who receive wages above
ceiling as well as to the cotton
growers who pay them.

Mr. Evans declared that paying
15c per hundred for emptying
sacks, or pulling Johnson grass
heads, or any other subterfuge by
which the picker actually receives
\$1.50 per hundred for the cotton
he picks, is a deliberate evasion of
the law and will be prosecuted as

sister, Mrs. W. R. Wilson, of Ft.
Smith, Ark. They motored to
Wheeler last week. First Lt. Joe
B. Griffin is the only remaining
son in the service. He is on Luzon
Island, and the family has hope
of him being home by Christmas.

It was from March 26 to May 7, 1945 that Adams was cited for the honor. The citation reads:

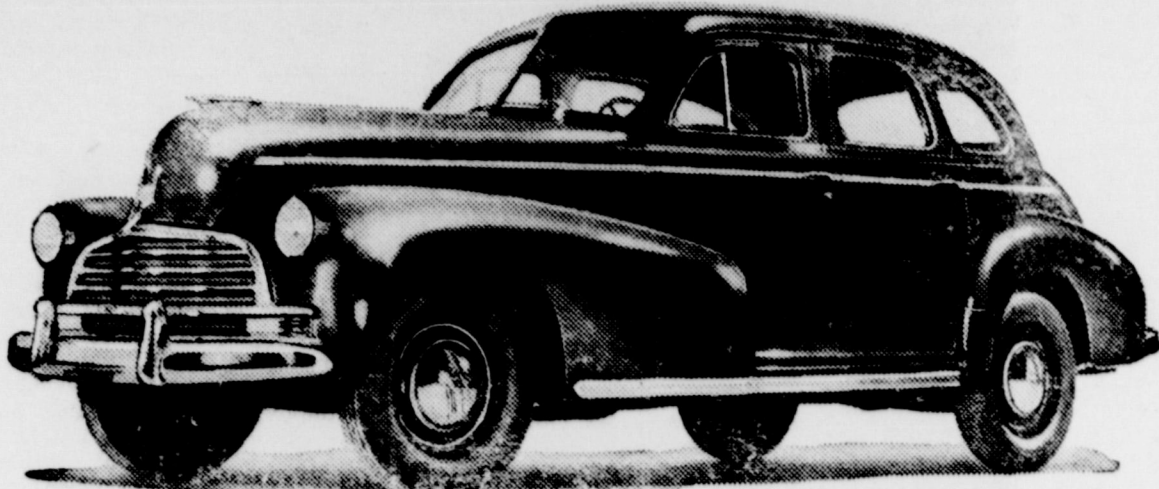

400 BALES ARE GINNED 2 WEEKS

Wheeler county cotton rolled in the rate of about 400 bales a week during the first two weeks of October.
A U. S. Census report shows that 940 bales were ginned in the county from the crop of 1945 prior to October 18, according to J. D. Walker, special agent.
Only 150 bales had been ginned in the county for the year, Walker reported recently.
The 940 bales ginned this year are almost 100 above the 1944 figure for October 18 when 844 bales had been ginned.
Favorable weather of the last two weeks of October is expected to reflect in further record ginnings. The crop for this year, however, will be away under last year's figure, many cotton men estimating it at half and less.
The grade and staple are commensurate with last year, but favorable wind and rain of two weeks ago tended to lower the grade considerably.

OFFICERS WANT CHECK ON GUNS

Employees of The Times office thought we were going to be "frisked" last week when Sheriff Jess Swink and Investigator Ralph H. Bratcher of the Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, made a business call on us.
But all they wanted was for us to carry a notice to the effect "it is mandatory that firearms of the automatic type, such as machine guns, sub-machine guns, or any type of gun from which a number of shot or bullets may be discharged with one continuous pull of the trigger, be registered with the Commissioner of Internal Revenue at Washington."
And now that we are over the scare, we will print the remainder of the notice the "coppers" wanted run:

"Many of these firearms brought or sent into this country from abroad by members of the armed forces and merchant marine, either with or without certificates signed by commanding officers, have not been registered. Persons having in their possession firearms of the types described should immediately contact in person, by phone, or mail, the nearest Investigator in Charge of the Alcohol Tax Unit, Bureau of Internal Revenue, United States Treasury Department, who for the State of Texas, is: Investigator in Charge, Alcohol Tax Unit, P. O. Box 5566, Bureau of Internal Revenue, U. S. Treasury Department, 583 U. S. Terminal Annex Bldg., Dallas, Texas.
"This official will furnish details relative to all provisions of the National Firearms Act and will provide Forms 6 (Firearms) and assist in the preparation thereof, as well as furnish information concerning the rendering of the firearms unserviceable, which is requested be done as a matter of public safety.
"It is illegal to transfer firearms of the types described except by the payment of the \$200 tax as provided by law. However, if the firearms are rendered unserviceable, they may be transferred tax-free as war trophies upon submission of the proper form to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C.
"The National Firearms Act provides a penalty of a fine not to exceed \$2,000, or imprisonment not to exceed 5 years, or both, in the event any person is convicted on a charge of violating any provision of the Act, which includes failure to register a firearm of the type described and transfer of such firearm without payment of the \$200 tax."

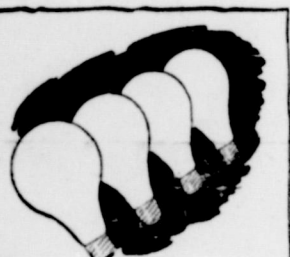
