VOTERS WILL DECIDE UPON AMENDMENTS

Texas will vote upon four amendments to the constitution Saturday, August 25. Official notice of the election has been issued by County Judge Geo. Hefley.

One amendment makes it possible for persons in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax, provided they are in service within 18 months of the time an election is held.

Another amendment provides a salary of \$3,650.00 a year for members of the legislature and state senate. They now receive salaries of \$10.00 a day for 120 days and \$5.00 a day thereafter.

A third amendment proposes a supreme court of nine members instead of three. The court now has two commissions of appeals that make reports to their three supreme court justices.

The fourth amendment is the noted H. J. R. No. 13 in regard to old age pensions. This sets a maximum of \$20.00 a month for state aid on pensions. Many pension leaders are opposing same as they believe that the state should provide more than this maximum.

All of the amendments apparently are controversial with various groups working for them and others opposing them.

Deadline for absentee voting on the four amendments and the county re-allocation of funds election to be held at the same time will be August

Of great interest to local residents should be the ballot designated:

FOR re-allocation of County Taxes. AGAINST re-allocation of County Taxes.

This election has been called by county commissioners to allow proper allocation of funds and to avoid having to transfer to depleted funds that do not have enough money set aside for them.

Early fall onions are produced by those attending the rodeo. There off quickly. Onions grown from sets used as early fall green onions. Onion m. Saturday, September 1, and at plants are not available until November or December. The home gardner therefore should make an early for storage. A third type of onion may be grown by using shallots, which grow throughout the fall, winter, and spring, but do not produce large onion bulbs at maturity like other types. A row of shallots in every home garden will furnish green onions almost the entire year 'round. Beans, mustard, leaf lettuce, and radishes will make good fall eating. Beets, swiss chard, and turnips planted soon will too. Do not plant spinach or head lettuce seed until the weather has cooled off. These will not tolerate high temperature.



#### LUBBOCK OPA OFFICE TO BE ABOLISHED Tentative plans call for the abol-

ishment of the Lubbock District office of OPA and combination of the 71-county territory with that of the Fort Worth district will become effective September 15, according to an announcement made this week by Earl E. Kerr, director of the Lubbock office.

Kerr said that action involving the Lubbock office was part of a national reorganization plan of the OPA which will result in the abolishment of 31 districts over the nation. Three of these district offices, Lubbock, Tulsa and Shreveport, La., are in Region Five.

Object of the move, Kerr said is 'to shift staff and resources in the field to the major points of population concentration and to key production and distribution areas, so as to make possible better service in the reconversion period to the largest number of businesses and to protect the greatest number of people with effective enforcement."

"So far as we know there will be no duty station in what is now the Lubbock District and unless personnel of the Lubbock office desire to be transferred to other points, their period of employment will be terminated September 15, the date now tentatively set for closing the Lubbuck office," Kerr said. The office employs a total of 128 persons. There will be no change so far as

local Boards are concerned. Kerr said, other than that they will work under the direction of the Fort Worth Office after the effective date of the change.


