# Capt. Clyde Fillmore **Arrives Back In Texas**

Capt. Clyde C. Fillmore of the 131st Field Artillery Lost Battalion, liberated from a Jap prisoner of war camp in Siam on August 31, was met yesterday in Ft. Worth by his wife who went there from their home in Wichita Falls to greet him and drive him to Ft. Sam Houston.

Capt. Fillmore, former Wheeler county attorney, arrived in New York Sept. 18 by plane.

Mrs. Fillmore and Mrs. Roe Green of Wheeler are sisters.

The following story, concerning Jap treatment of prisoners, appeared in last Friday's Wichita Falls Record-News.

One hundred thirty-three members of the Second Battalion, 131st Field Artillery of the 36th Division died while prisoners of the Japanese because of poor food and worse medical treatment, according to a statement made Thursday in New York by Capt. Clyde C. Fillmore to a representative of the Associated Press.

The death roll of 133 represented 22 per cent of the 456 Americans in the battalion when it was captured March 8, 1942, in Java. Members of the unit were imprisoned at Batavia, Java, and Singapore. Fillmore spent 41 months and nine days in Jap prison camps

Death usually was the result of ulcers, the young officer related. Prisoners were subjected to frequent mistreatment, both physical and men-He said they frequently were tal. slapped and beaten, but that even more difficult to take were means devised by their captors to impose mental suffering upon them.

Although forced to do heavy labor on railroads and other projects, the American prisoners were provided "terrible" food. Dirty rice, containing worms, was the best they received. They went into the fields, picking up leaves to put in a tasteless watery stew served them daily, so that they could swallow it.
