#### Electrified Farming

New power lines across the prairies and plains are doing much to keep Texas boys and girls from abandoning country 1 life. On farms and ranches, electricity is eliminating much of the drudgery that once suggested escape to the city, with its bright lights and shorter hours. Now, with plug-in juice for the washing machine, the vacuum cleaner, the food mixer and other household equipment, the farm wife no longer has to acquire calloused hands and a furrowed face. Superintendent. Her husband, too, can get much more done in a day when he uses electricity to milk his cows, heat his chick brooders, grind his feed, help cure his hay and pump his water.





Remove from heat and stir in 3 thsp. flour, Gradually add 1/4 cup strong coffee, % cup milk and cook over low simmer flame stirring constantly until nicely smooth and thick. Combine 1/4 cup sugar, 4 egg yolks, gradually stirring these into cooked mixture. Add 3 mashed medium-sized bananas. Beat 4 egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold into banana mixture. Pour into 11/2 qt. soufflé dish which has been buttered on bottom only. Bake in slow gas oven (325°) 40 to 45 mins.

The most reliable buyer's guide to gas appliances for the home is the Seal of Approval of the American Gas Association Testing Laboratories. For example, nearly 600 tests and requirements must be met on a gas range before it can be produced and sold to the homemaker.

If your biscuits burn on the bottom and still remain rather pale on top, your baking sheet may be too large which tends to hold the heat from the burner to the bottom instead of radiating around the oven evenly. There should be at least one inch of space between the baking sheets and all four sides of the oven.

Hot butter and syrup makes a richer-tasting spread for waffles. Add 2 tbsp. butter to 1 cup extrasweet corn syrup, heat until butter is melted, then serve hot.

Mooseheart, Ill., the famed Child City owned and operated by the Loyal Order of Moose for children of its deceased members, became the recipient recently of a \$100,000 fortune, bequeathed by the late Herman J. Englehard, 78, a painter and decorator, of Chicago, Ill. Mr Englehard was well known in his own communty for his kindness to and love for little children. Although not himself a member of the Moose fraternity, he chose Mooseheart as the beneficiary of all the money he had saved as a hard working laboring man because, as he told his attorney prior to his death, "I want to help little children." Mooseheart is both a school and home for nearly 1,000 children. It is an entire city in itself, with 150 buildings spread over 1,200 acres of lush farm land in the picturesque Fox River Valley, 35 miles west of Chicago. 



"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration." Dr. Cox says, "but alcholic drinks should be avoided.




