## Copies of Marine Hymn Available At Amarillo

December marks the 100th birthday of the Marine Corps hymn, Earl G. Hopkins, Marine Corps recruiter of the Amarillo station announced.

Mystery shrouds the origin of the official marching of the leathern boots, but extensive research indicates that it was first sung in 1847. An unknown marine is believed to have written the lines "From The Halls of Montezuma To The Shores of Tripoli" shortly after the marines had stormed the palace of Chapultepec in Mexico City—The Halls of Montezuma, Sergeant Hopkins said.

Even the origin of the music is doubtful. It is believed to have been adapted from an old Spanish folk tune, although the melody also occurs in the French opera "Genevieve De Brabant" by Jules Offenbach.

## FARMERS VOTE TUESDAY FOR COMMITTEEMEN

A last minute call to all farmers of Wheeler County to vote in farm program election which is to be held Tuesday, December 9, was issued today by V. B. Hardcastle, Administrative Officer of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Association. Mr. Hardcastle urged farmers to make certain that their vote will be counted in the election of committee members and delegates to the county convention where the county agricultural conservation committee will be elected.

He said that too often farmers let other jobs and interests keep them from voting in these elections. But this year, with so many vital decisions and perplexing problems regarding current production and conservation, he stressed that farmers cannot afford to forego the opportunity to vote.

The Agricultural Adjustment Act provides that the administration of the farm program on the county and community level shall be in the hands of local farmer-elected committeemen.

According to Secretary of Agriculture, Clinton P. Anderson, "this approach, right down to the county and community level has proved itself the most effective organization yet devised for the administration of any national farm program. This country has never witnessed a finer demonstration of the processes of democracy in action than the committee system under the Agricultural Conservation Program."

The way to keep this organization strong and representative of the farmers is for all eligible farmers to vote in the elections when they are held in their community, Hardcastle said. Community elections are scheduled as follows: December 9, from 8 until 5, Kelton at high school gym; Wheeler at the AAA Office; Mobettie at high school gym; Pakan at Pakan schoolhouse; and Shamrock at the Chamber of Commerce.

## SOIL HEARING WELL ATTENDED

The County Agent's office said Monday that the Soil Conservation District hearing held at Wheeler Saturday by the State Soil Conservation board was a successful meeting, and that the large attendance was encouraging.

The Courtroom was practically filled with handowners and interested persons. Many questions were asked and favorable testimonials given following a discussion by Howard Goss (field representative of the State Soil Conservation board). Goss held the hearing, and discussed the formation of soil conservation districts, their activities and work, benefits of such a district, and the State law on Soil Conservation districts.

The State Soil Conservation Board will meet Tuesday, December 9 at Temple, Texas. At that time Mr. Goss will report results of hearing at Wheeler. Mr. Goss told County Agent Frey that shortly after the December 9 meeting, the State board would notify us as to next step to take in setting up our soil conservation district.

Nearly everyone present at the hearing expressed agreeable surprise at the good attendance and interest shown in the soil conservation problem.

## Chamber of Commerce Votes To Add More Lights This Year

Raymond Sayre, manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co., agreed to secure the additional lights immediately if they are available and his crew will put up the Christmas lights within the next few days.

Business firms in town will be called on for a small donation toward paying for the additional lights after the cost of same is determined.

## TRUMAN HELPS IN TB FIGHT

Deploing the "needless waste of lives" from tuberculosis, President Truman is urging Americans to join the fight against this disease by buying and using Christmas Seals.

President Truman opened the 41st annual Christmas Seal Sale of the National Tuberculosis Association and its 3,000 affiliates by accepting the first sheet of the 1947 Seals from Secretary of Commerce W. Averill Harriman at the White House.

The President's complete statement follows: "It is heartening to learn that the death rate from tuberculosis is continuing to decline in the United States, but this fact should not give us a false sense of security."

"Hard work has forced the death rate down. More hard work, based on intelligent planning, is necessary to keep it down. We need no other reminder of this than the spectacular rise in tuberculosis morbidity and mortality in Europe when controls were of necessity relaxed during the war."

"Even in this country we have no right to be too proud of our progress. I am told that 50,000 Americans die annually from tuberculosis. Yet tuberculosis is a preventable disease and we cannot relax our efforts to control it in the face of this needless waste of lives."

"All of us can contribute to the success of these efforts through buying Christmas Seals. These Seals, on sale from November twenty-fourth to Christmas, are the sole support of the National Tuberculosis Association and its affiliates in their year-round, nationwide campaign to control tuberculosis. We are effectively joining the fight against tuberculosis when we buy and use Christmas Seals."

Anyone wishing to donate to the local campaign to raise money for the Wheeler County Tuberculosis Association, which helps fight tuberculosis right here in Wheeler County, can make checks payable to County Judge G. W. Hefley, Wheeler, Texas.

## Wheeler County Placed In Pink Bollworm Area By Governor's Decree

The cotton farmers of Wheeler County received some bad news this week along with cotton farmers of Hall, Menard, Mason, Collingsworth, Childress and Gray Counties when these counties were proclaimed to be in a Pink Bollworm Regulated Area by Gov. Beauford H. Jester, County Agent W. K. Frey stated.

The greater portion of this season's cotton crop has already been harvested and marketed; so, the stopping of the flow of cotton and cotton products from Wheeler County will not hurt local cotton farmers too badly.

## SHAFFER URGES FARMERS VOTE PEANUT QUOTA

If complete information is available to farmers, they can make decisions and run their own programs better than anyone else, is the belief of Gene Shaffer, chairman of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Committee. He refers specifically to the peanut referendum to be held December 9.

"We have been getting a lot of facts and figures about peanut marketing quotas," says the chairman. "So all peanut growers can have a basis for deciding whether to vote for or against quotas on the 1948, 1949, and 1950 crops. I am glad to report every indication is that the farmers in this county are studying this information carefully."

The chairman, who is a farmer himself and whose place on the county committee traces directly to the votes of his farmer neighbors, believes that the success of a democratic operation like the peanut referendum rests on widespread understanding of the problems facing growers and of the program to be voted on. The chairman invites every farmer who still has unanswered questions to write, telephone, or visit the county ACA office. "We want every farmer," he says, "to make sure in his own mind that he knows all the important facts about peanut marketing quotas; the county office will be glad to furnish all the information it has to any farmer at any time."

The referendum on peanut marketing quotas will be held in all communities where peanuts are grown, on Tuesday, December 9 as follows: Kelton, at high school gym; Wheeler at AAA office, Mobettie at high school gym, Pakan at schoolhouse, and Shamrock at Chamber of Commerce.

## Health Officer Advises Immunization Against Diphtheria At Early Age

All children should be immunized against diphtheria at a very early age, according to a statement on the subject released this week by the Texas State Department of Health, explaining that toxoid, which can be administered easily and without danger, can safeguard youngsters against this serious and killing disease of childhood.

Dr. Geo. Cox, State Health Officer, urges all Texas parents to have their children, who are not already protected, immunized at once.

"The administration of toxoid can save a child from serious illness or even death and those who have not been safeguarded against this danger should be inoculated immediately," Dr. Cox said.

"Babies should be immunized by the age of eight or nine months," Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose is usually given later."

To maintain complete immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the need of one. Children who enter school or kindergarten this year without this additional safeguard or without ever having been immunized certainly should be protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared.

Mrs. P. H. Schaub has been ill with the flu but is said to be improving.

## Shaffer Urges Farmers Vote Peanut Quota

Frey stated that Pink Bollworm has been found in Wheeler County. Representatives of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine have turned up PECTINOPHERA GOSSYPIELLA (Pink Boll Worm to you) at gins in Wheeler County, and as a result—Wham! the gates are closed to free coming and going across our county borders with cotton or cotton products.

In a proclamation signed by the State Governor on November 19, 1947, Wheeler County is proclaimed a Pink Bollworm Regulated Area, and as such the growing of cotton and the movement of cotton and cotton products from Wheeler County are subject to the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 4, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925.

Boiled down, the law states simply that pink bollworm is an injurious and dangerous pest of cotton production, and that if the pink bollworm is found at any gin, cottonseed oil mill, cotton seed warehouse, compress or transportation vehicle, the Governor shall quarantine the location and prohibit the movement of any cotton or cotton products from the quarantined district.

This means no cotton or cottonseed may be transported out of the County.

This emergency quarantine will remain in force until the Pink Bollworm Commission certifies that the condition of menace no longer exists—that is until the County is free of Pink Bollworm.

County Agent Frey says the early destruction of cotton stalks is the way to control the pink bollworm. All cotton trash should be covered to a depth of more than six inches to aid in preventing the carry-over of the pest to a succeeding crop. Pink Bollworms covered to a depth greater than six inches will seldom find it possible to make their way to the surface.

If pink bollworm gets bad enough here, the County Agent's office points out, we can be prohibited from growing cotton here at all by the commissioner of Agriculture.

So, it looks like our only way out is to harvest our cotton early and plow under our stalks deep to control this pest. The sooner we get rid of the pest the sooner the quarantine will be lifted, County Agent Frey points out.

## EMPLOYERS NOT ELIGIBLE FOR SS

It has come to the attention of the Social Security Administration that some employers are reporting wages for themselves as well as their employees, according to J. R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration.

"Employers in unincorporated businesses who have reported wages for themselves should file for a refund of the tax which they have paid on their own wages. The application for refund should be filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue before the expiration of four years after the payment to the Collector of the Tax," he continued.

"At present, old-age and survivors insurance benefits under the Social Security Act are limited to wage earners. Excluded, therefore, are many persons who work for their living. They are the self-employed—owners of small stores, farmers, insurance agents, and others. The Social Security Administration has recommended that the old-age and survivors insurance system be extended to all self-employed persons," Mr. Sanderson said.

**SUCCESSFUL MARRIAGES**  
The great number of divorces leads many young people who contemplate getting married, to ask how they can avoid the chance of such a separation. Some young people do not take marriage seriously enough and some may think that if they do not get along well in their wedded life, they can always solve the problem by getting a divorce.



Such a separation is likely to cause great sorrow and regret. They would better be sure, before taking the fateful step of marriage, that the ties of love are strong enough to reconcile possible differences.

Many persons show up the most attractive sides of their nature in social life and in days of courtship. Yet there is the chance in some cases, after they get married and settle down to the trials and annoyances of ordinary life, that some less attractive traits may develop.

There are nearly 600 people to the square mile in Puerto Rico and most of them live off the land.

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**Dairy Cows Should Be Cared For In Winter**

Dairy cows like cold weather if they are properly fed and well housed.  
Tight, dry dairy barns are about as good a substitute for grain in the winter time as any. G. C. Gibson, extension dairy husbandman at Texas A. and M. College points out.  
Elaborate, expensive shelters are not necessary. But patching of roofs and walls with scrap lumber or tin will keep out rain and cut down cold drafts which lower milk production.  
Cows which have to work their way through muddy lanes and feedlots use up energy which would otherwise have produced milk. That's where a slip or fresco comes in to make feed go

further by draining off standing water and building up low spots. Dairy men won't save any grain by cutting down on the milk cow's ration, Gibson says. The cow is going to take care of herself first and if her feed is cut, she'll cut the amount of milk she gives. Always give cows all the

roughage that they will daily and feed hay and milk production to get return.
