**GOODBYE, GAS**

The frantic search for new oil reserves to keep the nation's motor vehicles supplied and take care of national defense needs is seriously handicapped by the steel shortage. Pipe is especially scarce, and many drillers

are paying sky-high prices for what little they are able to corral.

Nevertheless, it was announced a few days ago that a new high-pressure natural gas pipeline costing \$140 million and using up a lot of steel, would be built from Texas oil fields into the eastern states.

For some time it had been rumored that some Texas gas being piped east was being used to re-pressure some of the broken down fields of older oil-producing areas. Commenting on the new pipeline, the New York Times observes:

"The Appalachian and Midcontinent fields must be integrated for economic and military reasons. . . This means the depleted areas of the Appalachian field must become storage reservoirs for gas piped from the Midcontinent field. The Federal Power Commission is clearly right in insisting on the provision of storage at a time when the national security is uppermost in the country's mind."

The Times then goes on to speak comforting words to coal miners, who have opposed the building of gas pipelines to the east. Never mind, the Times says, this natural gas won't last long enough to do any real harm to the coal mining industry. "It is dead right here, at least," comments the Dallas Morning News.

Nobody in Texas, and particularly the legislature, seems excited about the ruthless draining off of the Texas natural gas supply to compete with coal elsewhere. When it's gone, every Texas industry and every Texas household using natural gas will be left holding the sack. This irreplaceable natural resource is going away from Texas without even the comfort of knowing that it has first been made to yield an adequate tax return.

Using Texas gas to re-pressure dead oil fields to compete with Texas petroleum is adding insult to injury.

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**Environment Is Factor In Quality Of Eggs**

Quality of eggs is affected by environment. In the case of "environment" means that eggs are handled from the time they are laid until the housewives get them at the table.

F. Z. Beamblossom, poultry marketing specialist at Texas A. and M. College, says the greatest enemy of high quality eggs is heat. Eggs should be cooled several times a day and small heat reduced as soon as possible. All eggs should be stored at 68 degrees F.; higher temperatures break down the egg.

As a matter of fact, says Beamblossom, quality may be lower in eggs three days of improper storage than in eggs which have

been properly stored for as long as six months.

Quality egg rules for the flock owner include: Keep hens in the laying house until late afternoon on rainy days; put ample clean nesting material in the nests; remove broody hens from nests; remove male birds from the flock; cover dropping pit with wire; gather eggs three to five times a day; cool eggs promptly after gathering and store them in a cool place.

For business firms: Handle eggs carefully; store eggs in good cases with clean flats and filters; keep eggs at proper refrigeration and away from strong odors.

For the housewife: Keep eggs in clean containers, under refrigeration in the hot summer months and away from other foods which have strong odors.

**CANADIAN WILL HAVE BIG RODEO**

CANADIAN, June 30 (Special)

Canadian, home of the original rodeo, is planning for its biggest post-war rodeo celebration over the long Fourth of July weekend.

A two-day show on Sunday and Monday, July 4 and 5, will feature three performances at the rodeo grounds, a gigantic Pioneer Parade, an Old Settlers Reunion, and dance.

Two thousand dollars in cash prizes are being offered this year to riders and ropers in the two-day rodeo. Opening performance will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The celebration will really get underway on Monday morning, when old settlers will gather for an all-day reunion at the Canadian American Legion Hall. Square dancing, old-fiddlers contest, and prizes for oldest settlers are on the program.

At ten o'clock Monday morning, the big parade will wind its way through Canadian, featuring floats carrying the pioneer days theme, and hundreds of mounted riders.

The second performance at the rodeo grounds will begin at two o'clock Monday afternoon, and the final show gets underway at 8 o'clock Monday night.

Following the rodeo Monday night, the celebration will be climaxed with a public dance, featuring Bobbie Burns and his orchestra.

Canadian is already taking on holiday dress for the big celebration. Thousands of visitors are expected to throng the city for the 1948 edition of Canadian's famed Fourth of July Rodeo Celebration.

**Old Folks In Cities Can Vote In Primaries**

Old folks in the city will have the same voting privileges in the July 24 Democratic primary as the old folks in small towns and rural areas of Texas.

This in effect was the ruling of the Texas Supreme Court in an opinion handed down last week. By a vote of 6-3, the state's highest tribunal held that all persons over 60 years of age who failed to obtain poll tax exemption certificates before February 1 may vote in the elections this year.

Voting on the side of the old folks were Chief Justice J. E. Hickman, Associate Justices Graham B. Smedley, James P. Hart, W. St. John, John Garwood, John H. Sharp and W. M. Taylor.

The case originated in Howard

County, and involved the legality of an amendment to the exemption certificate law, passed at the last session of the Legislature.

The lawmakers had passed a bill that required all persons over 60 must renew their permanent exemption certificates annually, if they lived in cities of 10,000 population or more. The amendment did not change the exemption procedure of old folks living in small towns and rural areas, who are not required to make renewals.

The Supreme Court in ruling in favor of the old folks said that the Legislature did not intend to deprive any qualified voter of his right to vote, and reversed lower court opinions by holding that the amendment failed to set out a penalty.

Spiced pecan squares are good to serve with refreshing soft drinks when temperatures are high.

No fuss or frills are necessary, since the cookies are cut in self-decorating shape. To make these tempting diamonds, bake the cookies in an eight-inch square cake pan. When baked, cool before cutting. Then make diagonal instead of straight cuts to form diamonds. The corners will be triangles for the cook to sample, or to give little Johnny a promise of good things to come.

- SPICED PECAN BARS**
- 1/2 cup sifted enriched flour
  - 1/2 cup chopped pecans
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1/2 cup shortening
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar
  - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 3 tablespoons molasses
  - 1/2 teaspoon cloves
  - 2 eggs, beaten
  - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and spices. Add nuts. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add molasses and eggs, mixing thoroughly. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with milk and flavoring. Mix to a smooth batter. Bake in greased eight-inch square cake pan in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes. When cool, cut in two-inch squares.

**Deaths Due To Cancer Have Increased During The Past Five Years**

An increase of more than 18 percent in Texas cancer deaths during the five years between 1943 and 1947 has been announced by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Texas mortality tables compiled by the Texas State Department of Health show 1943 cancer deaths at 3,537, as compared to 6,770 for 1947.

"The greater part of this tremendous increase in cancer deaths is attributable to needless delay in seeking treatment, once a person has reason to suspect he has a cancerous growth," Dr. Cox said. He added his belief that advertising of patent medicines and so-called cancer quacks puts dangerous and misleading information before the public, thereby adding to the cancer mortality rate. This is because people are lulled by such propaganda and do not receive proper diagnosis and treatment until too late.

Dr. Cox said that almost two-thirds of all cancer cases rely on surgery to remove the cancerous tissue, while the other third may respond to X-ray or radium treatment.

"These three methods are the only means by which the disease can be treated," he said. "Self-

The Health officer pointed out that the greatest defense against cancer is an early diagnosis and competent treatment by a reputable physician. He urged special attention to any unnatural bleeding from any body opening, lumps in the breast, ad skin sores which fail to heal normally.

### Newspaper Clippings Sometimes Unlock Door To Security Payments

Newspaper clippings are often the keys that unlock the door to social security payments for young widows and their children, according to J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration.

Few days pass during which the Amarillo office fails to receive one or more letters enclosing a newspaper clipping. In other instances the widow brings the clipping to the office. What she wants to know is, "Does this mean me? Can I get benefits?" In a large number of cases the social security office is able to tell her. "It does mean you. You can get benefits for yourself and your children."

Sanderson said his office had long recommended that every worker tell his family about the survivors' benefits in the Social Security Act, and that the family get in touch with the nearest office, in case of the worker's death. There are still, however, some widows and other survivors who do not realize their rights until a newspaper item calls social security to their attention.

"Social Security," Sanderson concluded, "can do the greatest good for the greatest number of people, when everyone has a full understanding of his rights and duties under the law. The newspapers of this area are playing a very important part in making this general public understanding possible."

### LEAVES GREEN

Spread a vegetable mulch four or five inches deep around the shrubs to keep their roots from drying out when the temperatures soar this summer. The mulch holds the moisture in the soil where the plants can get it. The mulch, spread over an area of several square feet and several inches thick, will gradually work itself into the ground.

Several different things can be used for mulching plants. Compost, grass cuttings, straw or any other kind of decaying plant material are all good. The grass cuttings are good plant materials furnishing nitrogen and other plant foods. Another advantage of grass clippings is that they help make the soil acid, making iron available to the plant.

### THE OLD HOME TOWN



Most of the Texas soils have enough iron in them, but sometimes it is combined with other minerals and cannot be used by the plants. However, when the soil is made slightly acid, the iron is released and taken up by the plant.

In the blacklands, limestone regions and other areas where there is much lime in the soil, the iron may also be present but in combination with lime. This is another case where the iron is not available to plant use. However, ceniza, guajillo and some of the other plants common to west and southwest Texas need alkaline or lime soils, says Miss Hatfield.

### GARDENS PAYING LARGE PROFITS

Texas gardens are paying off. Even with drought in some areas, heavy rainfall in others and even hail in a few places, Texas gardens are making money. When the grocery store sells tomatoes at two-bits a pound, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. and M. College, these free ones out of the home garden sure do taste good.

All the rest of those fresh vegetables taste good too... the free sweet corn, new Irish potatoes, squash, lettuce, green beans, mustard and cucumbers. If you get most of the meal from your garden, it really makes a big difference in the grocery bill.

If you are in one of the dry areas and the soil doesn't have much moisture, then a little water wouldn't hurt the tomatoes—especially if the plants appear wilted during the day. And watering the tomatoes will prevent blossom end rot of the fruit, too.

For the best quality, pick the tomatoes just as they begin to turn pink on the vines. Then spread them out in the shade a few days until they get that deep red color. At this stage they are at their best.

The early plantings of mustard, radishes and lettuce have gone to seed by this time. Bright yellow flowers mark the rows of the careless gardener. Don't leave these old vegetables standing in your garden. They are carriers of disease, thieves of soil moisture, and hiding places for insects. When a garden vegetable is through producing, plow it up and leave the soil fallow.

If you keep the old vegetables plowed out, the garden soil is always ready to be planted again when favorable conditions permit, says Rosborough.

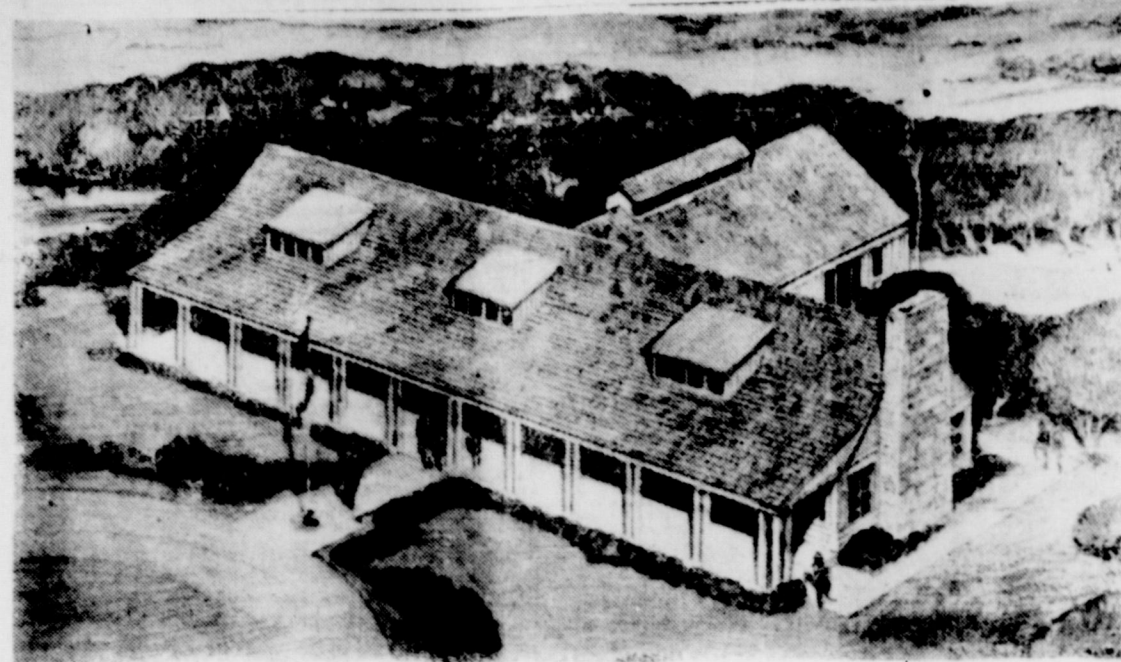

**CAMP KI-O-WAH BUILDING FUND PLANS GIVEN**

W. B. Weathered has been appointed chairman of the Camp Ki-O-Wah Building Fund Committee, according to Rev. E. Douglas Carver, president of the Adobe Walls Area Council, Boy Scouts of America.

Working with Mr. Weathered as vice-chairman will be M. K. Brown and Frank Carter. Other members of the committee include Carl Fisher of Phillips, C. A. Huff, Farris Oden, and Rev. Carver of Pampa, W. E. McClellan of Spearman, and W. W. Grooms of Goodwell, Oklahoma.

The building campaign will be for the purpose of raising funds to provide adequate facilities at Camp Ki-O-Wah for camping several hundred Boy Scouts each summer. The campsite, recently purchased by the Council, is about one mile from Lake Marvin in Hemphill County, and includes 35 acres of heavily wooded land which is ideal for Scout camping.

More than 400 Boy Scouts camped at Ki-O-Wah this summer, and it is expected that with expanding facilities, this number will be

greatly increased next year.

Projects included in the building program are a dining hall large enough for 160 campers, water supply, 10 campsites, showers, kitchens, entrance gateway, and an outdoor chapel for devotional services. All of the projects will be built under the supervision of the Camp Development Committee of which A. W. Paris of Phillips is chairman. Serving with Mr. Paris are Noble Truesdell, John Caylor, and T. D. Wiggins of Canadian, and W. B. Weathered, John Pitts, Hugh Burdette and George Thompson of Pampa.

The Adobe Walls Council includes Sanford, Odintree, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, and Hall Counties in Texas, and Beaver, Texas, and Cimarron Counties in Oklahoma. All of this area will participate in the campaign and community chairmen are now being selected.

Farris Oden, District Chairman of the Santa Fe District which includes Gray and Carson Counties, will be in charge of the campaign in the communities within these counties.

In accepting the position of Chairman of the Building Fund Campaign, Mr. Weathered stated that the Adobe Walls Council has every reason to be proud of the camping record at Camp Ki-O-Wah but that the improvements

planned will make it possible to do an even better job of interpreting the Boy Scout Program and of safeguarding the health and welfare of the Scouts who attend camp in future years.

If the present campaign for funds is successful, it is expected that all of the projects included in the development plan will be completed before next summer's camping season.
