Heavy Rainfall Is Boone To Crops In Wheeler Territory

Farmers, ranchers and dairymen in this area were rejoicing this week over the bountiful rainfall which has been falling gently and intermittently since about 5:15 p. m. Monday afternoon. Although there is no rain falling at this writing, the skies are still overcast and it appears more rain might fall.

Some farmers lost cotton seed which they had just planted and some may have to plant some feed over, but, other than that, the rainfall was a boone to all sorts of agricultural and grazing activities. The moisture will not hurt the wheat and perhaps will cause some of it to turn out a much higher yield than had been expected. Alfalfa crops and pastures are already showing the effect of the moisture.

The fruit crop which is one of the major sources of reenue for some local residents has been aided considerably and the yield will be much higher and quality will be much better although the fruit had not began to suffer considerably for water.

> + Rainfall was heavy all over the north portion of the county with many localities receiving as much as a total of four to five inches of moisture during the past three days. Rainfall was lighter in the south end of the county with
