MRS. BRITT IS LAID TO REST

Mrs. S. P. Britt, pioneer Wheeler County resident, died at her home in Shamrock Wednesday afternoon at 4:35 o'clock. Mrs. Britt had been in ill health for several months.

Mrs. Britt, who was 77 years old at the date of her death, was born in Warren County, North Carolina on March 8, 1871. She moved to Texas with her family at the age of 10 years and settled in Hays County. Her family moved to Childress County in 1888 where she met and married Mr. Britt on February 14, 1894.

The Britt's moved to the Britt Ranch north east of Wheeler in May of 1913 and in 1927 they established a home in Shamrock and since that time had divided their time between the Britt ranches here and in New Mexico and their home in Shamrock.

Besides the widower, S. P. Britt of Shamrock, she is survived by two sons, Tom of Wheeler, and Buck of Clayton, N. M., one daughter, Mrs. E. K. Caperton of Shamrock, six grandchildren, one great granddaughter, three sisters and one brother.

Mrs. Britt joined the Baptist Church in girlhood and at the time of her death was a member of the First Baptist Church of Shamrock. She was also a member of the Merry Wives Club of Childress, a pioneer organization whose membership is rapidly diminishing. Mrs. Britt was also a Daughter of the Confederacy.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist Church of Shamrock at 3:00 o'clock today (Thursday) afternoon with Rev. Edward C. Derr, pastor, in charge. B. F. Risinger was in charge of the song service.

Interment was in the Shamrock Cemetery with Clay funeral home in charge.

Pall bearers included: Gordon Stiles of Wheeler, Rufus Dodgen, Walter Pendleton, Jr., Lyle Holmes and M. A. Whitehurst of Shamrock, and Clyde Sherwood of Childress.

FRYE TO SPRAY CO. PASTURES

C. G. (Clint) Frye, whose planes and ground crews have been busy engaged for the past 3 weeks in spraying sagebrush and weeds in pastures in Donley, Gray and Collingsworth counties, was able to take a much needed rest in Wheeler last Tuesday as a result of the rains Monday and Tuesday.

Clint has sprayed 1,000 acres of pasture in Collingsworth County, 3,000 acres in Donley County and 800 acres in Gray County and between 3,000 and 4,000 in Hemphill County.

Mr. Frye has just finished spraying about 1,000 acres here in Wheeler County when the rain stopped his operations. He has between 2,000 and 3,000 acres more to do here before moving on to Hemphill County and Lipscomb County.

Clint is using 2, 4-D in spraying these pastures. 2, 4-D is a plant growth regulator, and when there is sufficient soil moisture and the weeds and shrubs are growing rapidly at this time of year, the 2, 4-D causes the plants to use up all the stored energy in the roots. Actually the plant grows itself to death.

County Agent W. K. Frey asked Clint Frye where he thought he would get the best kill—in Collingsworth and Donley Counties where he made earlier applications or in Wheeler County where the pastures had had more time to lose their moisture. Clint Frye stated that he had observed that in spite of the fact the Wheeler sprays were 2 to 3 weeks later than those in Collingsworth and Donley Counties, he had more

HOPPER CONTROL DEMONSTRATED SAT. AFTERNOON

The County Agent will give a demonstration of grasshopper control next Saturday, May 29. All who wish to see this should be at the courthouse Saturday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. and go with the group to see the demonstration along one of the roads outside Wheeler.

Young grasshoppers are now swarming in the ditchbanks, along the fence-rows, turn-rows, roadsides, railroad right-of-way and around edges of fields and pastures.

They have not invaded cultivated croplands as yet, but unless we get onto them soon, they will, according to County Agent Frey.

"During recent years grasshoppers have been controlled with bran-sawdust-sodium fluosulfate bait poisons, but this year farmers are turning to the new insecticide (chlorinated camphene), Chlor-dane, and Benzene hexachloride (BHC). Sprayed or dusted along the edges of fields, ditchbanks or fence-rows, these poisons give a quicker control and continue to kill longer than the standard bait poisons. And one of the main reasons is that the poison is up on the grass where the hoppers are and not down on the ground.

As with nearly all poisons, there are a few precautions to take when dusting or spraying these insecticides. It is not a good idea to feed dairy cattle forage that has been treated with these sprays or dusts because there is a chance

JUDGE LUMPKIN VISITS WHEELER

Judge James G. Lumpkin was a visitor in Wheeler on Friday, May 21 in the interest of his candidacy to remain as an Associate Justice of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo.

Judge Lumpkin is a native of Amarillo, is the son of the late Dr. A. F. Lumpkin, one of the Panhandle's pioneer physicians. He graduated from the New Mexico Military Institute and the University of Texas. Prior to practicing law, he taught for four years at Amarillo College.

At the time he entered the military service in 1940, he was an assistant district attorney at Amarillo. After serving with the 36th Division, he returned home and was three times elected District Attorney. Judge Lumpkin has been on the Court of Civil Appeals for more than a year. He is a member of the Amarillo Lions Club.

Judge Lumpkin said he expected to call on as many voters as possible between now and the July 24 primary. The court on which he serves has jurisdiction in civil cases over 46 Northwest Texas counties. It is composed of three members, one chief justice and two associate justices. Judge Lumpkin is one of the associate justices.

Heavy Rainfall Is Boone To Crops In Wheeler Territory

Farmers, ranchers and dairymen in this area were rejoicing this week over the bountiful rainfall which has been falling gently and intermittently since about 5:15 p. m. Monday afternoon. Although there is no rain falling at this writing, the skies are still overcast and it appears more rain might fall.

Some farmers lost cotton seed which they had just planted and some may have to plant some feed over, but, other than that, the rainfall was a boon to all sorts of agricultural and grazing activities. The moisture will not hurt the wheat and perhaps will cause some of it to turn out a much higher yield than had been expected. Alfalfa crops and pastures are already showing the effect of the moisture.

The fruit crop which is one of the major sources of revenue for some local residents has been aided considerably and the yield will be much higher and quality will be much better although the fruit had not begun to suffer considerably for water.

MOBEETIE TO PLAY MEMPHIS

The Mobettie baseball team will wind up its first round of play in the Red River Valley League Sunday as it meets the undefeated Memphis nine in the seventh contest of the current season of the Mobettie diamond. The Mobettie team is also undefeated for the season and beat the Memphis club out for the championship of the league last season so Sunday's affair promises to be one of the hottest battles of the year.

This year's Memphis team is sporting several of the Mobettie lads of last season including its star pitcher and hitter, Metz Lafollet, but manager Frank Cocke of the Mobettie nine believes that barring bad breaks the two teams will play on comparatively even terms Sunday.

City Improvements?

Late in the summer last year the American Legion and the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce got together and tried to work up a project to get some more of the streets in Wheeler paved and finally got a large number of property owners signed up to

have the paving done, but by the time the contractor could get around to the work it was so late in the fall that he advised against doing the work at that time because he was afraid it would not stand up properly and give the service desired if it were put down during cold weather.

NOW there are contractors in this area again doing a job up at Briscoe and one over in Hemphill County and working on the Highway 66 job over in the south part of Wheeler County and one of these firms, Cooper and Woodruff, is willing to come to Wheeler and pave any number of streets the residents of this city wish paved providing there is a minimum of four (4) city blocks contracted for.

THE WHEELER AMERICAN LEGION under the direction of Post Commander Dr. Harold Nicholson is planning to contact property owners in Wheeler in the near future and discuss the matter of having this paving done this summer while the weather is right and while we can get a contractor to do this work at a very reasonable fee.

The Cooper and Woodruff firm have made a price of 85c per square yard of paving built of 6-inch caliche base compressed to 4 inches and coated with a ceiling, a coat of asphalt and a coat of gravel. The above specifications and price is for streets in the residential section of the city. Any streets which are to be paved in the industrial section of the city, where traffic is heavier, would have a 9-inch caliche base compressed to 6 inches and the cost on this type of paving would be \$1.00 per square yard.

Members of the Wheeler American Legion post are anxious to see improvements made in the city of Wheeler and are willing to do their part in any program for the betterment of the city. If you want to see this paving project go over in a big way and help add several blocks of paved streets to make Wheeler a better town, you are urged to get in touch with Dr. Harold Nicholson right away and discuss this project with him.

We would at least like to see Main Street and the street immediately west of main paved from the school house to the south edge of town and then we certainly would like to see the street running east and west in front of the school property paved and some of the connecting east and west streets.

CIRCUS CLARET LEMONADE

1 1/2 tsp. lemon juice
1 tsp. sugar
4 oz. Roma claret
Ice cubes

Dissolve sugar in lemon juice. Add chilled claret and pour over ice cubes in tall glass. Add chilled sparkling water or plain ice water to fill. Decorate with lemon or orange slice and serve with straws.



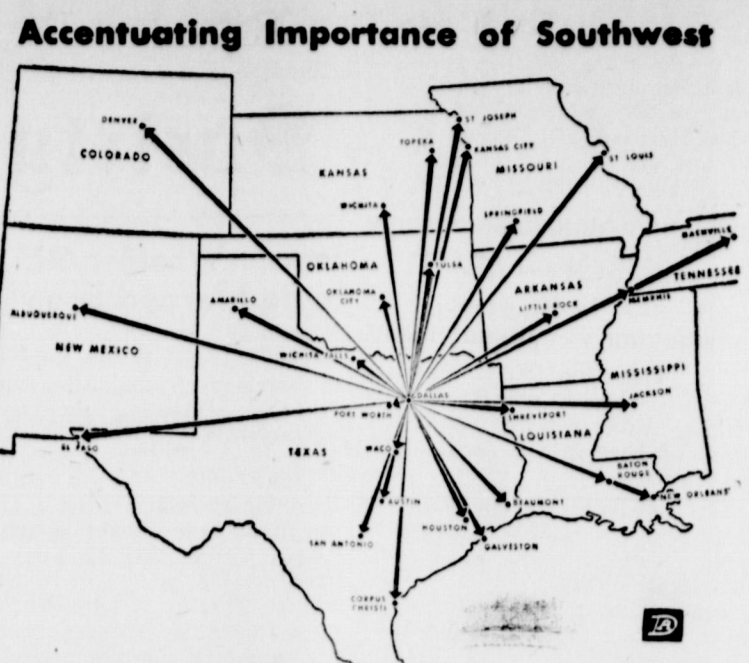
"Unless we have the essentials of health in our daily habits of living, we are sure to pay the penalty of impaired health, sickness and early death as we are of cause and effect in other situations," Dr. Cox continued. "We should ask ourselves, 'How long do I expect to live?' How long can I retain my efficiency, both in work and play?' Do I want to become incapacitated soon after middle life?"

The alternative, according to Dr. Cox's statement, is to adjust one's program of living to insure the fundamentals of health and thus, barring accidents, keep young and retain active efficiency to an age of 70 to 80, or more.

The essentials of health are simple: sufficient fresh air and sunlight, good food and food habits, regular exercise and adequate rest. Yet, in checking the health of thousands of individuals who considered their health good, it has been rare indeed to find a single person who did not habitually disregard one or more of these essentials. Therefore, no matter how good or poor our health, we should check our daily program of living for health habits that are essentially faulty but of which we may be unaware.

5,978 Social Security Cards Lost in 1947

In 1947 the Amarillo office issued almost as many duplicate social security cards as originals in the 26 counties of the Panhandle.

Last year, 5,978 duplicate cards were issued to persons who reported the originals lost or destroyed. John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Field office said.

During the same period 7,905 original cards were issued to persons added to the labor force of the Panhandle area.

Out of the 5,978 people filing for duplicate social security account numbers, there were doubtless several hundred employees who were delayed from going to work

on new jobs because of having lost their account number card.

The only time a person needs to have his social security card with him is when he is going to work on a new job. "After the employer has a record of the name and account number on his card, the employee should put his account number card away in a safe place," Mr. Sanderson said.

Farm Facts



1. How much head room is needed for broilers raised in batteries?

2. What qualities should the boar selected for the breeding herd have?

3. Why should cows be dried off 60 days before calving?

1. Head room depends, of course, upon the age of the chick. We recommend 11 inches of head room for starting chicks and 14 inches for chicks from six to 12 weeks of age. Broilers should not be left in batteries after they reach 12 weeks.

2. The major factors to consider in selection of the herd boar are:

- Individuality, or outward appearance.
- Ancestry, or the inherited ability to produce strong, healthy and desirable offspring.
- Performance record, or the test of production.

3. It is during this period that the unborn calf gains 2/3 of its birth weight. Proper conditioning of the cow during this dry period will increase milk production. Tests at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company show that 100 lbs. of extra condition (over the weight of the calf) during this 60-day dry period will mean approximately 2,000 lbs. of extra milk after freshening.

TRASH FIRES SHOULD BE WATCHED

Trash and grass fires are on the increase, warned Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

"With hot, dry weather upon us, even more losses from fires will be suffered in Texas unless precautions are taken with these two types of fires," he stated.

He stressed that both fires are extremely dangerous in warm weather as they spread twice as fast and have more to feed on.

After urging Texans to strictly follow city ordinances where no type of burning is permitted and a system of city garbage pick-up is used, he said that in other communities trash and rubbish should be burned in a covered metal or wire container or an incinerator.

"Even then, some should stand and watch the fire until it has safely burned itself out," he suggested. "A garden hose should be kept nearby in case the fire gets out to surrounding grass or weeds."

He emphasized the importance of calling the fire department first, the minute a fire gets out of control, and then fighting it while waiting for expert help.

Damage amounting to well over \$12 thousand was done in 37 grass and trash fires in March. In February there were 13 such fires and the loss figure was a little over \$3 thousand.

"Also increasing is the number of home and garage fires caused by exposure to grass or trash fires," Hall noted.

Flying brands falling on roofs has been the main cause of exposure fires, he said, in again stating the necessity for trash being burned in a covered container and someone standing by until the fire dies out. He urged that inflammable roofs be kept in good repair.

"Live cigarettes and matches being tossed into weeds or grass is the primary cause of the grass fires," said the Commissioner. "Vacant lots and alleys should be cleared of weeds and high grass to eliminate this hazard to surrounding homes."

A good method of shading small plants after transplanting is to set wood shingles in the ground two or three inches from the plant on the south side.

 that the poisons might accumulate in the fatty tissues and later be passed on into the milk and butter.

Beef cattle are not harmed to any extent with small doses of

these sprays or dusts on forage, but over a period of time the meat may become unfit for food. For the same reason, it is not recommended to spray the entire pasture since grazing cattle, in time might be affected.

Dusting or spraying around the edge of the pastures now will get a large majority of the small hoppers that will later invade the pastures. The County Agent suggests that you don't spray or dust chlordane or toxaphene on fruits or leafy vegetables when they are to be used for food, unless you can wash or strip off the residue. Also avoid applying these insecticides to legumes when in bloom or at the time of day when bees are active in the field, since these sprays and dusts are poisonous to bees.

If we will hit the hoppers heavy now with poisonous sprays or dusts there will be little or no damage to crops later on when we begin to count up the profits.
