The annual county-wide fund raising drive for the American Cancer Society will begin Monday, April 12. Harris B. Zeigler, Wheeler County Chairman, announced today.

Wheeler County has been asked to raise \$582.00 to aid in the fight against the disease that kills one person every three minutes. Zeigler stated that a direct mail campaign would be made with letters of appeal going to everyone whose address can be obtained. No personal solicitation will be made, the chairman said.

In stressing the importance to our home people of the fund drive, Zeigler pointed out that 23 persons died of cancer in Wheeler County during 1947, and that the dreaded disease has claimed the lives of three local residents so far this year.

On the other hand, thanks mainly to research and development made possible through the American Cancer Society, eight apparently successful operations were performed last year on Wheeler County people suffering from cancer.

At least 15 active cases of cancer are now being treated by Wheeler County doctors and the physicians estimate there are many more cases unreported.

The letters appealing for funds to carry on the fight against the death dealing disease will be mailed from Zeigler's office Monday. Enclosed with each letter will be a self-addressed envelope which the public will find convenient in mailing their contribution back to the county chairman.

If you fail to receive one of the letters and do not wish to wait until you get one, go ahead and mail your donation to Harris B. Zeigler, Box 427, Shamrock. The drive ends April 30.

FARM RECORD SET IN 1945

Enough agricultural products to support himself and more than 13 others was the record chalked up by each farmer and farm worker in wartime 1945. In 1920, one farmer supported only 30 (counting himself), and in 1820 only a little more than four.

The figures are cited by Gene Shaffer, chairman of the Wheeler County Agricultural Conservation Committee, to indicate what technology—applied science—is doing for agriculture. He points out that in 1945 every man-hour of work meant 44 per cent more gross production than in 1917-21. Half of these savings in hours per unit of product resulted from mechanization. Other developments, mainly increases in yields of crops and livestock, were responsible for the other half.

Farm horses and mules have rapidly replaced by tractors, trucks, and automobiles during the last third of a century. A modern tractor and its equipment now save 850 hours of man labor compared with the time required to do the job with the animal power and equipment used a generation ago. What's more, mechanization has made possible more timely operation, and this has helped increase farm production especially when adverse weather delayed the preparation of land and planting.

The increase in food supplies for feeding an increasing population from 1920 to 1942 came about in this way: 30 per cent came from acreages released by the decline in horses and mules; 70 per cent from increased crop and livestock yields and from decreased exports.

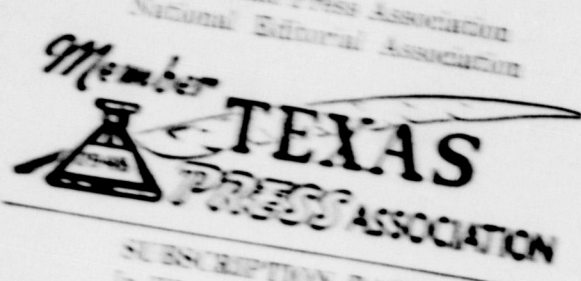
There will also be some amateur entertainment and square dance numbers on the program.

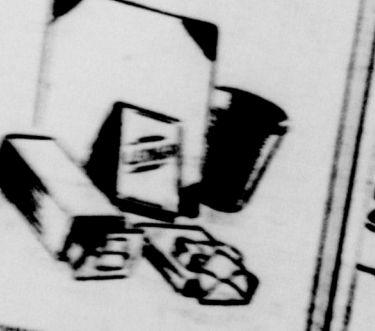

Intersection Is Bad Place To Learn Rules

(Eight of a Series)
If you insist upon learning traffic laws by accidents, the best place is at an intersection.

The most frequent law violation in business and residential area traffic accidents is failure to yield the right-of-way at an intersection, according to W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The Texas Highway Patrol is cooperating with a nationwide "Learn and Obey Traffic Laws" program in an effort to familiarize the public with traffic regulations and how they save lives.

Of the traffic accidents which involve two vehicles occurring at intersections, Captain Peck by of the Amarillo District emphasized the law concerning right-of-way

at stop streets. The points to remember are:

1. The octagonal sign that says "Stop" means just that.

2. After stopping at the sign, you must yield the right-of-way to vehicles on the through street, unless they are far enough away

that you can safely cross.

3. When you are on the through street, you must yield the right-of-way to a car which has stopped at the sign and then proceed to cross in the gap in the traffic ahead of you.

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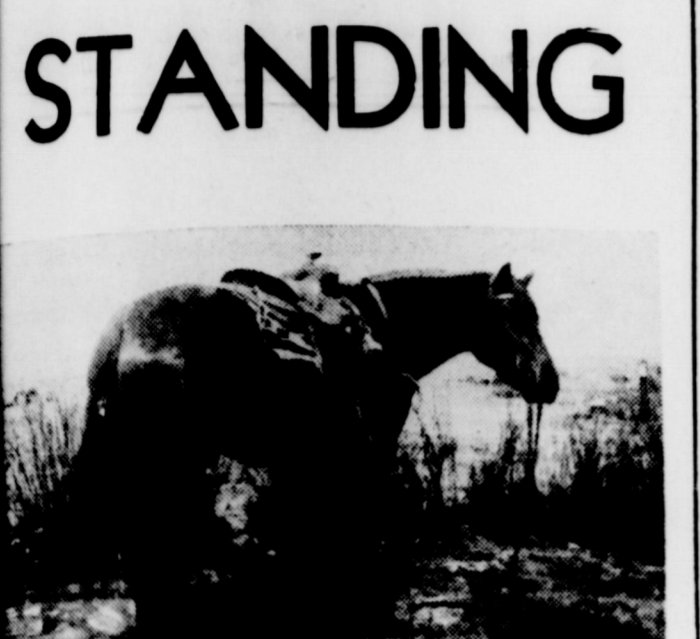

Public Health Week Is April 11 Through 17

The State of Texas is planning to observe national "Public Health Nursing Week" April 11-17, as proclaimed by President Harry S. Truman. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges high school graduates to consider public nursing as a career.

"Public health nursing offers young women opportunities for lifetime career which are highly useful and satisfactory. The demand for professional nurses now exceeds the supply in public health and other fields of work," Dr. Cox said. "Possibilities of travel, worthwhile service, income, and

other features of the nursing profession compare very favorably with those open to women in other careers."

Education for nursing is available in 33 schools in Texas and enrollment is now under way for fall classes, which open about September 1. All schools still have vacancies. Applicants should be graduates of high school or have some college credit, with a record of good scholastic standing, be in good physical condition, and of high moral character. An interest in people and their problems, also ability to work well with one's hands is necessary.

Details regarding nursing education can be secured from hospitals, physicians, nurses organizations, and local health departments, as well as the Texas Department of Health.

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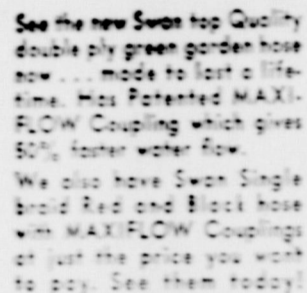
