Swink, Wofford Win, Anglin And Lee Are In Run-Off

(See Vote by Precinct Elsewhere)

Wheeler county voters re-elected Sheriff Jess Swink and County Clerk Harry Wofford by substantial majorities and made a change in two of the three contested county commissioner places in Saturday's Democratic Primary.

There will be a runoff in the third commissioner precinct, number 1, in which Incumbent Lloyd Anglin ended only one vote ahead of Frank Lee in a 4-cornered race.

W. E. Mason, former commissioner, defeated Incumbent S. B. Davis in precinct 2, by a margin of 226 to 206, and Don P. Rives unseated H. S. Sims, commissioner in precinct 4 by a vote of 651 to 563.

Sheriff Swink led W. Z. Baker by 412 votes, almost 200 more than the margin the veteran incumbent held over Mr. Baker in 1946. County Clerk Wofford defeated Vernon Brown, 1,842 to 518.

The commissioners' races in the two north county precincts, 1 and 2, were the thrilling matches, being undecided until the last boxes were reported. Final unofficial count in precinct 1 was Lloyd Anglin 241, Frank Lee 240, W. L. (Shorty) Erwin 188 and Alfred M. Hill 91.

Six county officials were reelected without opposition: County Judge G. W. Hefley who polled 2640 votes; County Attorey Homer Moss, 2640; District Clerk Christopher McClain, 2638; Tax Assessor-Collector T. J. Daughtry 2,691; County Surveyor A. C. Wood, 2,556 and Treasurer Palmer Sivage, 2.691.

Apricot Cottage Cheese Pie



Truly a pastry for a party is this apricot cottage cheese pie.

Each serving is topped with whipped cream nests

crowned with an apricot half.

Want an extra-smooth dessert to make a debut at a special dinner? An apricot cottage cheese pie may take a little more fuss than some, but the reward is pure pleasure. As the guest bites into a generous wedge of this luscious pie he will discover that beneath the whipped cream and apricot garnish lies a creamy layer of cottage cheese custard—and beneath that, a richly flavored apricot layer over

An important point to remember in making this pie is that the cheese custard must be baked at a rather low temperature to keep the milk and cheese proteins tender. Since the pie crust should be started in a very hot oven, only the apricot layer is placed in the shell for the initial baking. After ten minutes, take the pie from the oven and pour the cottage cheese custard over the apricot layer. Return the pie to the oven and finish baking in a slow (325 degrees F.) oven.

APRICOT COTTAGE CHEESE PIE

Apricot Layer 2 cups mashed cooked apricots

Mix ingredients well. Cottage Cheese Custard

1 cup milk 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Add sugar and salt to eggs. Mix and cheese. Blend ingredients

well. Add milk, vanilla extract thoroughly. 1 cup sifted enriched flour 1/3 cup shortening 2 to 3 tablespoons cold water

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening until mix-ture is crumbly. Sprinkle water over flour mixture and mix to a dry crumbly dough. Turn out on lightly floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll out about one-eighth inch thick. Line deep nine-inch pie pan. Trim and edge of pastry. Prick with fork.


Gold Star Lapel **Buttons Available**


