BOND ISSUE FOR PAVING?

Do the people of Wheeler as a whole want to see more paved streets in this fair little city? Is there anything you can think of that would add more to the progress of this fair little city than to have several blocks of streets paved?

STRANGE SOVIET SUGGESTION

The Soviet Government recently protested to the United States against the "warmongering" article in Newsweek Magazine, which, it asserted, violated a United Nations resolution condemning warmongering.

In reply, Secretary of State George C. Marshall pointed out that the United States Government had no responsibility for what it published in the American press because the Constitution guarantees freedom to the press. He pointed out that this is not the case in the Soviet Union where the press is controlled by the government.

An interesting sidelight to the diplomatic exchange is the point made by the Russian Government has no responsibility for what is the magazine violated a "United Nations resolution." While such resolutions do not have the power of law in the United States, it is somewhat surprising to find the Russians, who have shown no hesitation whatever in disagreeing with the conclusions of the United Nations, suggesting that the free press of a free country should obey the resolutions passed by the United Nations.

LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. No. 36
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an Amendment to Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties in this State beginning January 1, 1949; providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which

all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis"; and
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have published as required by constitution and laws of this State.

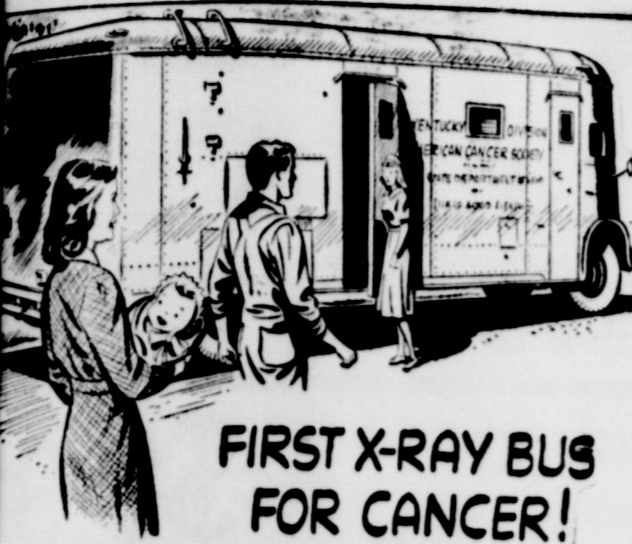

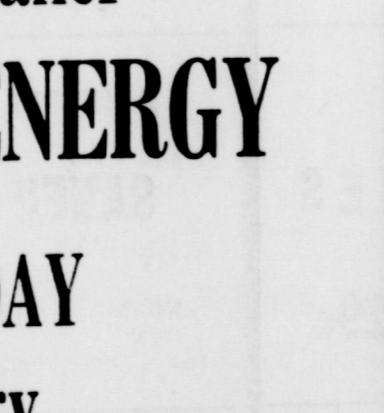

A post card request to this address will bring a copy of the official contest rules. The winner will be announced during National Dog Week, September 19-25. Many Army Vehicles Be Sold At Amarillo

Eleven sedans, trucks and other vehicles plus about \$10,000 worth of other government surplus miscellany will go on the bid block to veterans and the general public in a War Assets Administration sale to be held at Amarillo Air Base at 1 p. m. Friday, August 5.

The vehicles, including a bus, passenger cars, pick-ups, trucks and other types, will be offered to World War II veterans only. Sale will be by informal bidding on each vehicle, and veterans will need to present discharge or other proof of service at time of purchase.

In the assortment of other goods to be offered in bid lots without regard to priority qualifications will be vehicles, steel cots, nuts, bolts and screws, bunk beds and numerous other items in limited quantities. Awards to individuals commercial buyers and other groups will be made on a non-priority, high bid basis, for this part of the sale.

The field will be open for inspection on August 4 between the hours of 9 a. m. and 3:30 p. m., and on August 5 until sale time. Prospective purchasers will receive information regarding location of sale property by making inquiries at the main gate of the air base.

182 Cases Of Typhus Have Been Reported

Statistical information compiled by the State Health Department shows a total of 182 cases of typhus fever so far this year. During the week between July 17-24, seven new cases were reported, one-half the seven year median of fourteen for the week of July 24.

The disease reaches its peak in the month of August, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

Over a five year period from 1943 to 1947, typhus fever has been responsible for 273 deaths. The death rate has been reduced from sixty-three in 1943, to thirty in 1948.

"Typhus fever as we know in Texas is transmitted by the fleas of infected rats," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "It can

be controlled by the simple expedient of consistently maintaining a program of rat poisoning, rat trapping, and rat proofing."

Typhus fever is marked by a severe headache, chills and fever. A reddish mottling appears on the skin, and a hacking cough develops. The headache is the outstanding symptom because of its severity. Illness may last from 5 to 14 days.

The greatest outbreak of typhus fever, or Brill's Disease, was in 1941, when there was a total of 733 reported cases.

The Health Officer added that it was a sad commentary on our position as the most health minded nation on Earth if we allow the disease to flourish when the means for its control and eradication is right at hand.

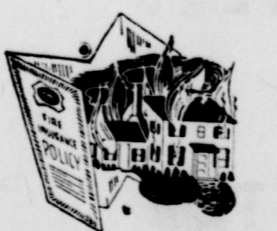

9-oz. can crushed pineapple
1 package strawberry gelatin
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup Pet Milk
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
2 eggs, separated

Drain pineapple, saving juice. Add enough water to juice to make 3/4 cup. Heat to boiling. Stir in gelatin until dissolved. Add pineapple, 1/2 cup powdered sugar, the salt and lemon juice. Chill until thoroughly cold; then stir in milk. Chill until syrupy. Meanwhile, grease a deep 9-in. pie pan. With back of spoon, press 3/4 cup crumbs on bottom and sides of pan. Put butter into bowl; work remaining 1 cup of powdered sugar into butter. Beat in egg yolks. Spread carefully over crumbs in pan. Chill. Fold stiffly beaten egg whites into syrupy gelatin mixture. Pour into prepared pan. Sprinkle remaining 1/4 cup crumbs over top. Chill until firm.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and

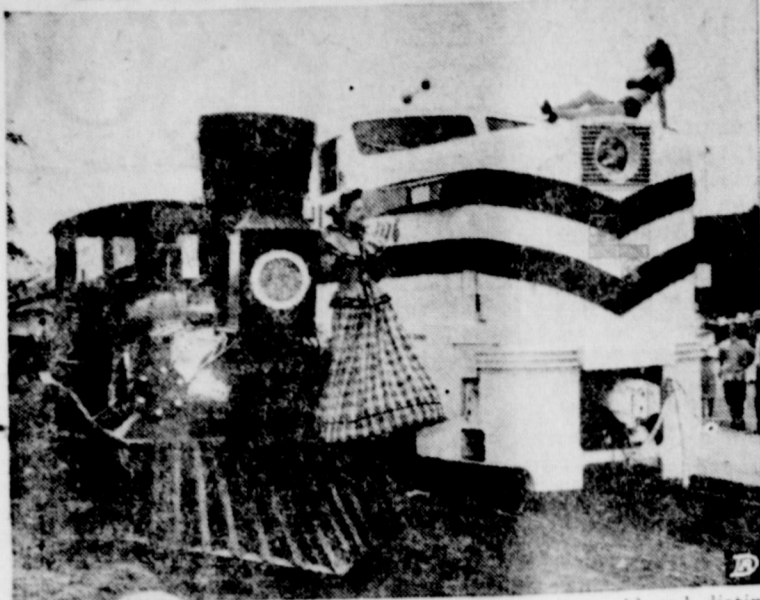
premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948 at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment in counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. 33-4tc.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State. 33-4tc.

 tainer in thawing.
 Disadvantages of glass jars in
 general are: they are breakable;
 because they are round, they take
 up more space in freezers than
 rectangular paper containers; they
 become frosty on the surface
 when removed from the freezer so
 are slippery to handle without
 tongs.
 The new "freezer jars" are more
 convenient than ordinary glass jars
 because the sides are straight so
 that food slips easily after slight
 defrosting.
 My second choice is the square

 easy.
Cold Pack Tomatoes Preferred
 The cold pack method of prepar-
 ing tomatoes for home canning
 has won a "tasters' victory" over
 the hot pack method—a matter of
 interest to homemakers who will
 be canning millions of jars of
 tomatoes this summer.
 In tasting sessions, at the Bu-
 reau of Human Nutrition and
 Home Economics, U. S. Depart-
 ment of Agriculture, experienced
 food judges from among the re-
 search scientists observed, smell-
 ed, and tasted tomatoes especially
 canned and stored for tests. To-
 matoes that were packed raw in
 jars and then processed in a water
 bath canner were rated higher on
 every count—flavor, color, texture,
 odor, and general acceptability—
 than tomatoes that were heated
 before they were put into jars and
 processed.
 One advantage remains to the
 hot pack method, say the Bureau's
 home canning specialists. More to-
 matoes can be put into each jar,
 which is a point to consider if jars
 or storage space is limited.
Under Water
 At this season when eggs are
 still in good supply and many are
 being hard-cooked for picnics,
 lunch boxes, summer salads and
 main dishes for the family, house-
 wives may be interested in a fast
 and easy shelling method suggest-
 ed by poultry marketing specialist
 of the U. S. Department of Agri-
 culture.
 Shell eggs under running water,
 the specialists advise. As soon as
 the egg is cooked, cool it immedi-
 ately under running water to
 loosen the shell, prevent overcook-
 ing and make handling easier.
 Crack the shell by tapping against
 a hard edge or with a spoon. Then
 loosen it by rolling the egg be-
 tween the hands. Hold the egg
 under water and begin peeling at
 the large end where there is an air
 space under the shell. The cold
 water helps ease off the shell and
 washes away any bits left on the
 white.
 Prompt cooling in water after
 cooking has another advantage. It
 helps prevent the dark ring which
 sometimes appears around the
 yolk of a hard-cooked egg. The
 ring can be prevented entirely by
 cooking at low temperatures, not
 overcooking and chilling thorough-
 ly afterwards.
 Since most of us will take a trip
 this summer study these tips on—
Clothes For Travel
 Clothes can do so much to make
 or mar a vacation that it pays to
 choose a travel wardrobe with
 great care, says Clarice Scott,
 clothing specialist of the U. S. De-
 partment of Agriculture. Choose
 right and you can "travel light"
 yet be well and comfortably dress-
 ed with the minimum of washing
 and ironing, Miss Scott says.
 The mainstay of a travel ward-
 robe usually is a suit, preferably
 of dark or mixed colors which do
 not show easily. Faille is a good
 suit fabric because it resists wrin-
 kles—rayon faille, or for cool weath-
 er wool faille. For hot weather
 seersucker has the advantage of
 being cool, crease resistant, easy
 to wash, needing no ironing. The
 new sheer one-denier rayons are
 cool and can be ironed dry. The
 new gingham in practical colors
 designed for "tour suits" also are
 good choices.
 For children cotton knitwear is
 comfortable, easily washed, needs
 no ironing.
 For semi-dressy wear consider
 a silk or rayon print. Prints show
 soil and wrinkles less than plain
 colors. Nylon slips are recommend-
 ed because they do not wrinkle,
 dry quickly after washing and
 need no pressing.
 Even though frills are promi-
 nent in fashions this year, fussy
 styles are poor choices for travel.
 Miss Scott suggests, because they

wrinkle badly, take extra space in
 luggage, need so much pressing.
 As for hats, usually a travel
 problem, Miss Scott recommends
 packable hats—halo hats which
 open out flat and can be made of
 fabric to match dresses, or flat
 berets. No cumbersome hat boxes
 are needed to carry these hats.
 Luggage need not be overload-
 ed with shoes, Miss Scott says, if
 clothes are planned which do not
 call for different colors in foot-
 wear. One "must" for every trav-
 eller, however, is one pair of real-
 ly comfortable shoes.
 Finally, Miss Scott advises,
 packing clothes with tissue paper
 between all folds to prevent creas-
 es and save pressing.
 During the summer all women
 like washable cottons so select
 those—
Made To Launder
 How well a wash dress washes
 and irons depends on how it is
 made as well as on the fabric,
 clothing specialists remind women
 who are buying or making sum-
 mer dresses. To stand up under
 frequent laundering a dress must
 be sturdily made, yet its seams and
 other finishes should be flat and
 lightweight for easy ironing. Look
 for simple lines, the specialists
 advise, and for strong but not
 heavy finishes, for flat fastenings
 and simple sturdy trim.
 Dresses of simple design usual-
 ly wear and launder best. The
 fancier the trim and the more in-
 tricate the cut, the more time the
 dress will take on the ironing
 board.
 Washing and ironing are hard
 on seams. Seams need to be strong
 but not thick so that it is difficult
 to get them dry in ironing. Be
 sure skirts are not cut on too much
 of a diagonal so that seams stretch
 and break the stitching. Avoid
 seams or other finishes that must
 be clipped out underneath and
 thus weaken for washing.
 Hems also should be firm but
 not heavy. Hems on closely woven
 material usually hold well enough
 with only one turn, if the edge is
 trimmed with pinking shears, and
 then "cat-stitched" to the back of
 the skirt. On sheer material, it is
 best to machine-stitch the first
 turn of the hem, then slip-stitch
 this to the back of the skirt.
 Avoid belts with pasted-on back-
 ing which will come apart in
 lightweight for easy ironing. Look

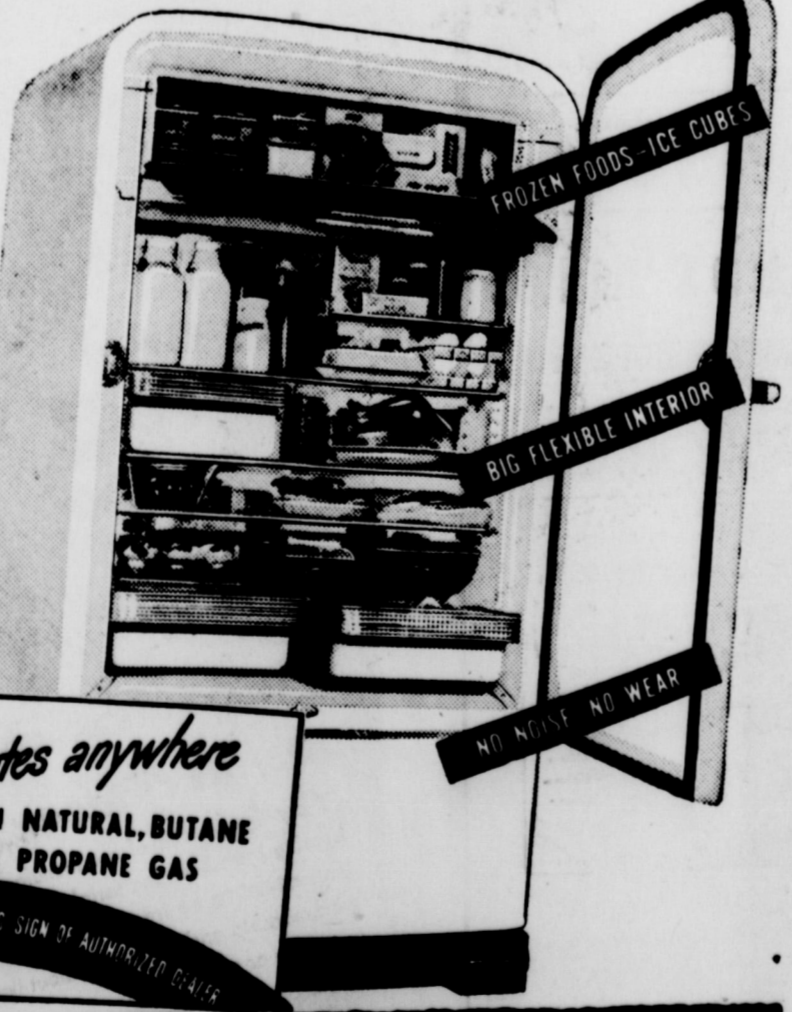

Unthrifty Pigs Likely To Have Roundworms

Pigs that are fed a good ration and still remain unthrifty are likely to have roundworms. Likewise, if you raise a litter of pigs on ground that was formerly occupied by pigs, there is a good chance that the second litter will have roundworms.

Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of Texas A. and M. College, says that these worms may be passed right on out through the body and onto the ground. An examination of the pig lot may show presence of these roundworms. They can be identified as being large, thick yellow or pink worms about lead pencil size.

Weaned pigs of any age may be wormed, but the best time to worm pigs is two to three weeks after weaning. Pigs are weaned at round 56 days of age, so when pig is two and a half months old, this is a good time to worm them. For best results, move the pigs to a concrete floor, worm them and bring them back to the pen or pasture after three days.

Another method is to worm them in the original pen, and later move them to a different pen, or out to the pasture three days after worming. Moving the pigs helps break the worm's life cycle, and thus reduces the number of worms.

Grain Losses To Pests Sometimes Very High

In the past, some farmers have lost as much as one out of eight bushels of wheat stored on the farm.

Stored-grain insect losses are lower if wheat is dry and the bins have been cleaned and disinfected, says Paul Gregg, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College.

But with dry wheat and disinfected bins, you haven't done everything to reduce the grain losses. This is only the beginning. Most important of all is to keep the insects out once you have rid the clean bins of them.

By inspecting the bins frequently, you can see whether any insects have flown or crawled into the filled grain bin. If you do find

newcomers, you can kill them with a mixture of three parts of ethylene dichloride to one part of carbon tetrachloride, or one part of carbon disulfide to four parts of carbon tetrachloride.

In steel bins, entomologists recommend three gallons of the 3 to 1 mixture, or two gallons of the 1 to 4 mixture for each 1,000 bushels of wheat. These dosages should be doubled where wheat is stored in tight, wooden bins.

Level off the surface of the grain at least six inches below the top of the bin before spraying the chemical evenly over the surface of the grain. If it is possible, the fumigant should be applied to the grain bins from the outside by means of a bucket pump or other type sprayer.

Gregg warns that these fumigants are poisonous to humans as well as to the insects, so persons

using these chemicals should use caution, and avoid breathing their fumes or spraying liquid on themselves or their clothing.

By inspecting the bins, sections and spraying when necessary, farmers will have their grain in better condition for the says Gregg.

because it is 90 percent or better effective, the cost is low. It is easy to get, and is not harmful to the pig if given as directed.

Dr. Banks suggests not to worm over six to ten pigs at a time. Directions call for one pound of sodium flouride mixed thoroughly with 100 pounds of dry feed. And if you don't have that many pigs, mix one level teaspoon with one pound of dry feed for every pig weighing 25 to 35 pounds. Some of the larger pigs may be given another pound 12 hours after the first dose. If a second worming is required, repeat the treatment in 30 days.

Two wormings will probably be enough unless the pigs are left on ground that is severely infested with roundworms. Important: keep in mind, says Dr. Banks, that sodium flouride is a poison, and if it is improperly mixed, or too much is used, the pigs may be poisoned.
