Worley Promises To Wage Fight War Fund Campaign Less Than Fourth Subscribed For Postoffice

In a telephone conversation with The Wheeler Times, Congressman Gene Worley promised he would do everything possible to have Wheeler added to a list of eight Panhandle towns that will get new postoffices under a program recommended to Congress by the Public Buildings Administration of the Federal Works Agency and the Post Office Department.

"There is a hard and fast rule that an office must have gross receipts of at least \$10,000 before it is considered eligible for a new government postoffice building,' Worley said. "In other words, if the receipts are not as much as \$10,000 the department says the government is not justified in spending the money to construct a new building."

He said the records show Wheeler's receipts were \$9,405 but that he "would continue to do everything I can to help because in my opinion you need a building very badly.

Worley has wired and written the newspaper since the telephone
