The event starts at 7:30 o'clock Tuesday evening. Shelby Pettit will auction the boxes.




## FORMER LOCAL AGENT HONORED

With 80 per cent of the funds remaining at home, it is estimated that at least \$2,000 worth of Seals must be purchased by Wheeler county residents to set up the organization and launch the fight.

### \$74,000 SOIL WORK OKAYED

A total allotment of \$74,238 in agricultural conservation for 1946 of the Wheeler County ACA committee, according to V. B. Hardcastle, administrative officer of ACA.

Erosive control and soil-buildraces, \$3,000; dams, \$11,300; wells, \$4,500; strip crop, \$4,500; summer fallow, \$750; contour listing, \$2,-200; contour farming, \$15,100; seeding on contour, \$750; leaving stalks as protection against erosion, \$22,700; deferred grazing \$1,890; seeding pasture grasses, \$590; plowing fireguards, \$75; harvesting legume seed, \$700; seeding winter cover crop, \$2,483; and green manure cover crop. \$3,700.

At the meeting of ACA committeemen, all 1946 cotton insurance yields on individual farms were checked and approved and vields approved for farms not having a five year average production

Regarding the erosive control and soil building work, Hardcastle said the money to be paid by each individual farmer is determined by the number of acres of cropland and pasture in the farm. He said in 1946 farmers must have the written approval of the county committee before carrying out any of the approved practices.




