National Shoot-to-Retrieve Field Trial This Weekend

The Sweetwater Creek Bird Dog Club of Wheeler, will host it's first National-Shoot-to-Retrieve Field Trial of the year at Greg Smith's place, 2 miles North and 1 mile East of Wheeler (the old John Conner place), on Saturday and Sunday, August 20th and 21st. Trial chairmen Greg Smith and Bill Morrison, extend a welcome to all spectators and bird dog enthusiasts to join the local club for this trial.

There is no charge; and food and cold drinks will be available on the grounds.

The trial will begin at 8:00 a.m. both days, with trophy and prize presentations for the winning dogs and handlers at the conclusion of each days running. This is one of many NSTRA trials held in this area, with entrants coming from as far away as Dallas, Abilene, Lubbock, Amarillo, and Oklahoma, trying to qualify their dogs for the NSTRA National Invitational Dog of the Year Trial held at Amo, Indiana, annually. Through competition, they can also earn championship points for their dogs, and qualify for the Trial of Champions, which is also held annually at Amo.

For those who have never witnessed this type of field trial, it was developed to match as closely as possible actual hunting conditions, with the handler walking behind his dog in the bird field. Mounted judges follow the dog and handler and judge the dog based on his ability to find, point, and retrieve quail that have been planted in the field, while keeping in mind the dog's style, intensity, ground race and obedience.

Todd Baize, 12-year-old son of Van Baize and Rene' Baize of Wheeler, was a competing athlete in the 1988 Pepsi Games of Texas at Texas A&M University in College Station, August 5-6. Todd represented Region IX (Panhandle) of the Texas Amateur Athletic Federation. Over 10,000 athletes competed in 25 separate events including track and field. Participants included both male and female ranging in age from four years to over 70.

One of the highlights of this year's games was the opening ceremony held in Olsen Field on the Texas A&M University Campus. After the Parade of Athletes on the field, other events included: aerial salute by TAMU Flying Club and "Six Pack in the Sky" famous free fall team; U.S. Black Belt Academy presentation; 10,000 balloon release; Lone Star Spectacular Laser Light Show; Famous "Torch Run" by Olympic Athletes; and topped off by a spectacular fireworks display by Zambellis International, who did the display at the Centennial Celebration of the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor.

Todd qualified for this state meet by placing first or second in three events at the regional level. He competed in high jump, shotput, and 400 meter dash. He placed fourth in high jump and seventh in shotput.

Wheeler Elementary Enrollment Dates

Wheeler Elementary students (K-8) will enroll on Tuesday Aug. 30th from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

All new students entering Wheeler schools will need to have immunization records with them.

Kindergarten students and new first grade students must have a copy of original birth certificate. (not hospital copy) This year records need to show social security number.

WHEELER ISD OFFERING REGISTRATION PACKETS

For parents of all kindergarten students and of students new to the district, Wheeler ISD is offering registration packets. These will become available Monday, Aug 22, and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office between the hours (on business days) of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Parents of returning students will only need to fill out the registration emergency card; these will be available in some location for parents who wish to fill out prior to Tue., Aug. 30, registration day.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration Emergency Card; 2. Student Health Information (a two page questionnaire, new this year); 3. Home Language Survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information (please use full legal names) before his/her child can be enrolled in school. Parents of students who attended pre-kindergarten at Wheeler do not have to fill out the Home Language Survey, as it is already in your child's permanent records.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "Traffic Jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day (Tuesday, August 30) are welcome to do so.

Kindergarten Schedule Alterations Are Made

WRITING TO READ PROGRAM IS ADDED

Wheeler ISD is extremely proud to announce the purchase of IBM's Writing to Read by Dr. John Henry Martin. It is a revolutionary, completely individualized program through which each student learns to write (compose) using a phonetic spelling system based on the child's personal pronunciation of each word in his/her vocabulary. Through being trained in this system he/she is actually able to compose stories using any of the words incorporated in his/her speaking vocabulary. This is far superior to the 200 to 500 word vocabulary (often highly impersonal to the child) provided in basal readers. Because the child learns to phonetically spell everything he/she can say, he/she automatically is able to read everything he/she writes. Wheeler County forage and beef cattle producers are invited to take part in the annual Wheeler County Range and Pasture Tour on Thursday, August 25. The tour is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service.

The tour will leave from the parking lot at Maxey's Steakhouse at 9:00 a.m. The first stop will be at the goldaster control demonstration plots on the Duncan Ranch southeast of Mobeetie. A shinnery control demonstration on the Finsterwald Ranch north of Wheeler will also be visited. Other stops will include week control in CRP plantings.

Lunch will be provided by Monsanto Chemical Co., manufacturers of Roundup.

Following the meal, there will be three presentations on range and pasture management.

Dr. J.F. Cadenhead, Extension Range and Brush Control Specialist, will discuss chemicals for range brush and goldaster control. Pasture fertility will be discussed by Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension Soil Chemist. Mr. Jack Lyon of Monsanto will cover the use of Roundup for week control in grass establishment.

Pork Referendum Set For September 7-8

Pork producers in Wheeler County will have an opportunity to vote in a special referendum Sept. 7-8 as authorized by the Pork Promotion, Research and Consumer Information Act of 1985.

Purpose of the referendum is to determine the continuance of the 100 percent checkoff program which provides funds for pork research and promotion to enhance the pork industry according to Don King, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The checkoff is at the rate 24 cents per \$100 on all hogs and pigs as well as on all imported hogs and pork products.

Referendum voting will be conducted in the county Extension office during normal business hours Sept. 7, 8.

Producers and importers unable to vote in person may request an absentee ballot from Dr. Bill Thomas, Extension Swine Specialist, Kleberg Center - Room 212, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843. Absentee ballots will be available from Aug. 1 until close of business on Aug. 26. Absentee ballot return envelopes, containing the ballot and registration/certification statements, must be signed by the voter and mailed so as to be received in the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence by close of business on Sept. 1.

All pork producers who produced and owned porcine animals in the U.S. for sale in commerce and who are subject to assessment during the representative time period of Nov. 1, 1986, through Sept. 6, 1988, are eligible to vote. Importers who imported porcine animals, pork or pork products during the representative time period also are eligible to vote. Also, eligible are 4-H, FFA and other youth who owned porcine animals and are subject to assessment during the representative time period.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will count ballots, determine the eligibility of challenged voters and ballots, and report referendum results, said King.

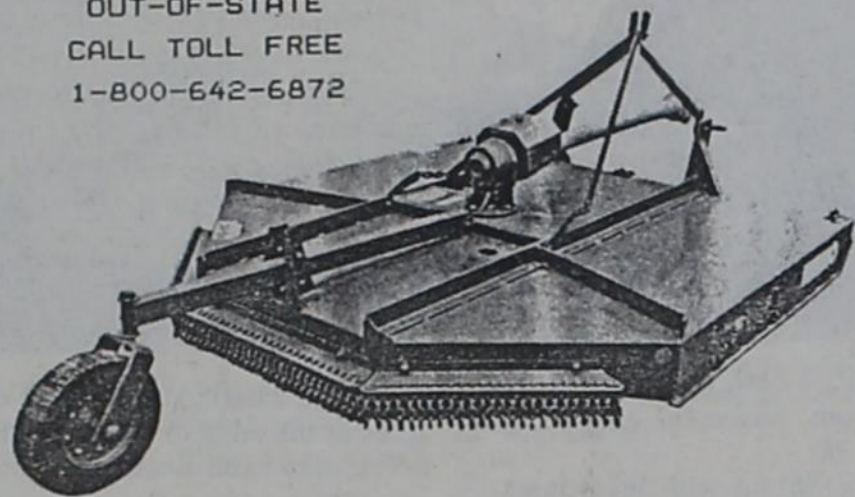

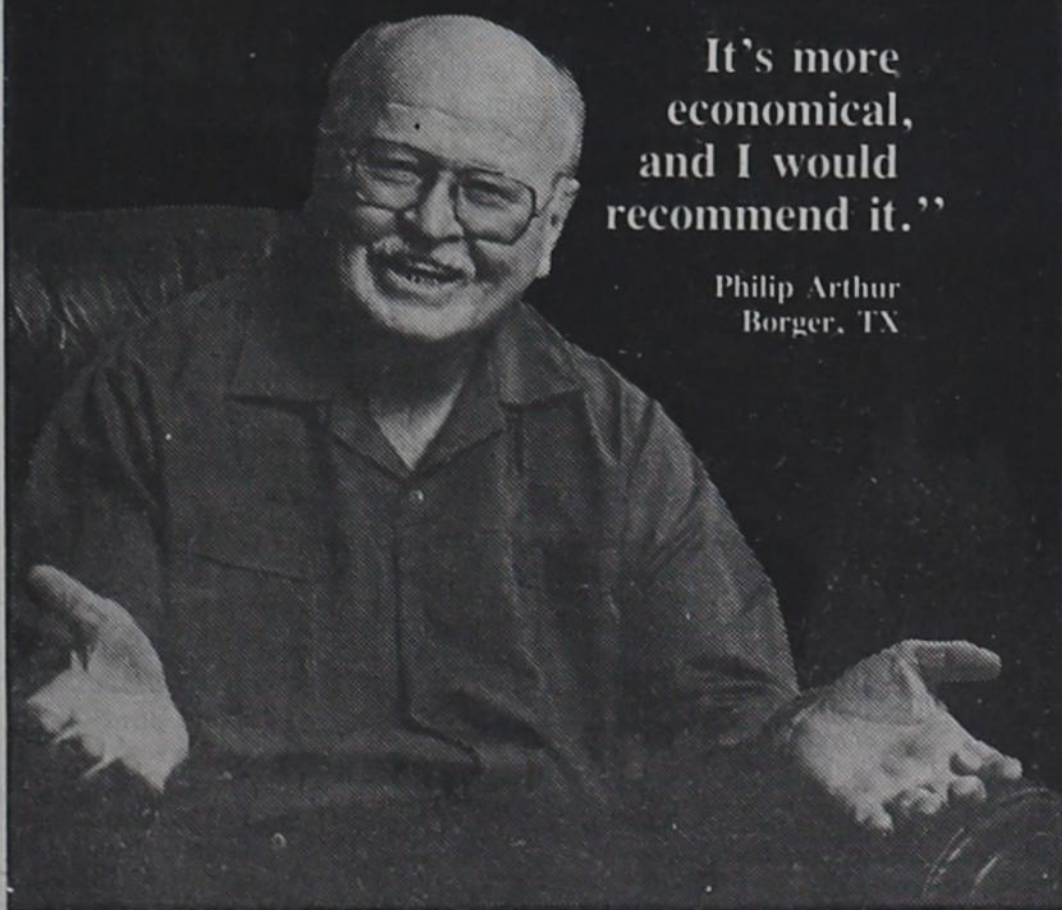

From The Minister's Desk:

In his play, *Murder In the Cathedral*, T.S. Eliot warned about hypocrisy, saying: "The last temptation is the greatest treason - To do the right deed for the very wrong reason."

Mr. Eliot was not the first person to warn about hypocrisy. Throughout His ministry, Jesus warned about hypocrisy and severely condemned those people who were hypocritical. (Matthew 23)

But what exactly is hypocrisy? The dictionary defines hypocrisy as "a semblance of having desirable or publicly approved attitudes, beliefs, and principles that one does not actually possess." From this definition, two important observations can be made. These two observations are:

1. There is a difference between Christians who sin and Christians who are hypocritical. And this difference is sincerity -- not sinless perfection. Jesus did say: "...You are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48) But the Greek word for perfect is *teleos* which means, "Of full stature, of full age, of full growth, or of full development." It is maturity that Christians are sincerely striving to achieve.

And as they strive to achieve this maturity, their progress will be characterized by mistakes, errors, and sins. Such Christians are not hypocrites because as long as

Christians are in the flesh there will be a difference between the "is" and the "should" of their lives. (1 John 1:8-10)

The evidence of hypocrisy is insincerity - not imperfection.

2. Hypocrisy is rapidly becoming extinct. With such attitudes as, "Tell it like it is", and "Do your own thing", hypocrisy is becoming harder and harder to find. But this extinction should provoke regret and not pride.

Hypocrisy is said to be the homage that vice pays to virtue. Where there is no hypocrisy, where vice ceases to shroud or veil itself, a serious condition of wickedness exists. And there is much evidence that shows such a condition presently exists.

For example, women confess their abortions and urge other women to have one. Homosexuals boast of their lifestyle on television talk shows. Marriage is considered old fashioned and "living in a relationship" is acceptable. Pornography is openly available to children. Profanity is used by men and women in every aspect of a bluish society.

The extinction of hypocrisy is tragic. With its extinction, sin is openly advocated and practiced.

Hypocrisy is wrong. Christians sincerely do the right thing. And they do it for the right reason.

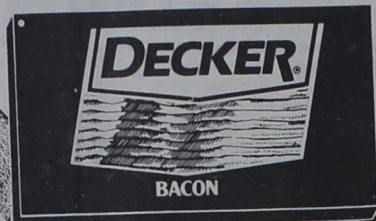
