Figures newly gathered by the Department of Commerce furnish enlightenment on this point. They also may contain an element of surprise. For the figures show that private investments by United States citizens in foreign areas outstrip credits extended by the federal government.

Government credits to other nations at the end of 1947 aggregated \$12,100,000,-000. But United States private investment abroad totaled \$16,700,000,000. If there were no Marshall Plan, if the \$3,750,000,000 British loan never had been made, if government aid had been withheld from Greece, Turkey and China, the American funds working for the economic recovery of war-ravaged nations still would be at a multi-billion dollar

SUPREME COURT TACKLES DIVORCE LAW CONFUSION

The confusion that exists in the United States in connection with divorce laws is apparent in the effort of the U.S. Supreme Court to grapple with the questions that aavoid the decree of the State courts.

Recently, the Supreme Court ruled that no State could overthrow a divorce granted in another State if both husband and wife agreed to the decree and that no State could set aside or alter alimony payments previously allowed under another State's divorce laws.





A mobile X-ray unit will be set up in the High School Gymnasium by the State Health Department, and will be available for use to Wheeler County citizens over 15 years of age. No charge will be made for having X-ray pictures taken. It will require about two minutes to take the picure, and no person will be

asked to disrobe. A record will be made of each picture, which will later be examined. If this picture shows a suspicion of tuberculosis or any other chest condition, the case will be referred to the person, who in turn may contact his or her family physician for proper treatment.

This movement is state-wide, and is being taken to eradicate as far as possible the spread of tuberculosis. It is an opportunity for each and every individual of this county over 15 years of age to have a test made that may mean checking or healing diseased lungs.

MEMO FROM THE SURGEON GENERAL:

It is my hope that every person in the United States over 15 years of age will have a chest X-ray to make sure he is ree of tuberculosis. If, within five years, we discover and follow up the great majority of tuberculosis cases, we can eliminate the disease as a public health hazard."







The mobile unit will be in Wheeler Monday and Tuesday, September 20 and 21 and will be in Mobeetie Saturday, September 25. Free X-ray examinations for the purpose of detecting active cases of tuberculosis will be given.

The unit will be set up at the High School Gymnasiums both Wheeler and Mobeetie.

All citizens of Wheeler County 15 years of age or older will be given the opportunity to take advantage of the free examinations. The State Health Department will assist any persons found to be suffering from tuberculosis to obtain treatment if they are unable to obtain it from their private

Records of the results of the examinations will be made. Those persons whose X-ray pictures show suspicion of tuberculosis or postive cases of the disease will be notified. A public health nurse will visit the positive cases to determine what can be done to treat the disease.





WASHING machines have taken most of the drudgery out of washday. But the time and steps involved in preparation for the job still make it the longest and heaviest day of the week for many homemak-

Easy to Convert

Seven days a week the automagic machine is a dishwasher. On washday a simple exchange of drums converts it to a washng machine for clothes.
In this new laundry plan the

breakfast dishes fit smoothly into the washday schedule. When breakfast is over, the dishes go into their racks in the dish drum and are washed and rinsed in only five minutes.

Complete service for six is washed and rinsed in only six quarts of water and a small quantity of detergent. Since the dishwasher uses water hotter han hands can stand, dish saniation is assured.

While the dishes are drying in the machine, the laundry is sort-ed out for washing. The dry dishes are then returned to the cupboard and the dish drum re-placed by the clothes tub. Both ightweight units are easily

Often it is necessary to train the horns on your animals in order to give them a good shape. Many people use fire and mechanical devices. These are recommended by nearly everybody that uses

About a week before the show is the time to give the horns a final dressing. Smooth down the rough outside surface with a rasp or horn scraper. Finish off the job with emery cloth. Then apply pumice stone or sweet oil. Polish the horns with a woolen cloth just before showing the animal in the

Trim the overgrown hooves to make them shapely and comfortable. Levelness on the botton is essential, and most of the weight should be on the outside wall of the foot. You can do a fine job with a file from time to time, and keep the hooves in pretty good shape. Maybe you can pick up some extra points in the ring by cleaning the hooves and rubbing them with oil.
