COUNTY HEIFERS Farmers Report **Record Yields Of Cotton And Grain**

Ideal harvest weather has thrown the cotton and grain dairy heifers to the Tri-State Fair, sorghum harvest into high gear in this territory during the past two weeks and the "white gold" and feed have been flowing into the city in a steady stream. The crop is hardly half gathered and farmers are reporting record yeilds on both cotton and grain sorghums.

A survey on October first showed that Wheeler County gins had ginned 1,329 bales as compared with only 287 at the same time last year and the Trader's Compress at Sham-Pitcock, Harley Pond, C. O. poorer rural communities. Despite liberal state aid, only 68 of the 254 counties in Texas have a full nine months of schooling in every district. Two counties - Kenedy and Zapata - have no school district taxes.

All these serious deficiencies as well as many others are under consideration of the Gilmer-Aikin committee, the state educational commission named by the last Legislature and due to make its recommendations o the next Legislature. One can anticipate higher costs of public education in Texas. particularly through more state aid. Yet conditions on this assistance should be prescribed to require reasonable local support-of the

Likewise, the many dislocations, deies and the inequities in the statewide chool system of Texas are a clear temptation for federal aid to education in addition to the steadily rising state assistance. 



Health Department Will Help Crippled, Dr. Geo. Cox Says

In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has released the ollowing statement:

Every crippled child in Texas, inder 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are mable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this

Crippling conditions which may e treated are infantile paralysis, steomyelities, club feet, harelip and cleth palate, burns, curvature of the spine, arthritis, bow legs, rickets, tuberculosis of the bone, flat feet, congenitally dislocated hip, muscular dystrophy, supernumery fingers and toes, wry neck, elephantiasis, spinea bifida, brachial palsy, Potts' Disease, congenital anomalies, spondylelisthesis, amputation, webb fingers, epiphsitis, and sarcoma.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health

Full information about local groups and organizations throughout the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish their eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, "Handbook on Agencies."
