Editorial

REFORM OF TEXAS PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM

Public attention has been directed to serious aspects of the rural school problem in Texas by Sam Kinch, Austin correspondent, in a recent issue of the Morning Star-

Telegram. Mr. Kinch pointed out that, while there have been more than 3,000 school district consolidations in the last 18 years, more such mergers are needed in the interest of better education. One common school district in four did not operate last year, but farmed out its pupils on contract to another district. Seventy-three independent districts pursued the same course to a limited degree. Texas still has 1,825 one-teacher schools.

Although Texas has 1,500,000 children of scholastic age which are the basis for state aid to the local districts, the average daily attendance is only 1,000,000. Not only are some schools deriving more aid than they deserve, but also they are guilty of borderline ethics in thereby taking advantage of the letter of the law which should obviously be amended.

Another evil inherent in the state aid system is shown in the fact that 280 districts collected no local taxes whatever but operated only on the per capita apportionment. Disparity in assessed valuations also means some districts pay more for local support of schools than others. The cumulative effect is to increase state aid which steadily has risen through the years. Thereby a trend toward centralization of authority over local education is fostered.

Some consolidations are prevented by the fact that the district limit for rural or supplemental aid is 1,500 scholastics. However, restrictions are necessary to curb the undue expansion of this supplemental aid which initially was devised to serve the poorer rural communities.

Despite liberal state aid, only 68 of the 254 counties in Texas have a full nine months of schooling in every district. Two counties — Kenedy and Zapata — have no school district taxes.

All these serious deficiencies as well as many others are under consideration of the Gilmer-Aikin committee, the state educational commission named by the last Legislature and due to make its recommendations to the next Legislature. One can anticipate higher costs of public education in Texas, particularly through more state aid. Yet conditions on this assistance should be prescribed to require reasonable local support of the schools.

Likewise, the many dislocations, deficiencies and the inequities in the statewide school system of Texas are a clear temptation for federal aid to education in addition to the steadily rising state assistance. That expediency, while augmenting revenue for public education in Texas, nevertheless would bear with it a federal control of the schools to a comparable degree. Sponsors should guard against that danger by beginning reform at the community level.

1. It is probably not necessary until the last six weeks or two months of the growing period. Such a separation makes the birds more docile, they grow better, and there is less bruising or skin-tearing as the result of fighting.

2. Lights should be turned on when the days begin to get shorter than 12 hours, in order to provide a 13 to 14 hour day. November 1 is the usual starting date, but it will vary according to the latitude.

3. According to the Program for Dairy Cattle published by the Ralston Purina Company, in general any mature cow which can't give 300 lbs. of butterfat a year will never make

much money. Many cows giving less than this, though, could reach this money-making point if fed properly balanced rations in the right amounts. Here is what 300 lbs. of butterfat a year equals in milk:

Good Meat-Stretching Recipe

By ALICE DENHOFF

EVEN in the summertime, the family, especially the menfolk, want meat. And with prices what they are, providing meat dishes takes some doing for many of us.

A good method of stretching the meat supply is with a skewer or stew dish. Grand for outdoor cooking is that old Near-East favorite that has become so at home here, Shish Kebob. For an authentic Syrian touch serve this recipe for the skewered lamb together with a tangy Syrian Salad.

For the lamb, have one lb. boned lamb shoulder cut in one-inch cubes. Combine 1/2 c. salad oil, 1/2 c. malt vinegar, 2 bay leaves, 1 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 1/2 tsp. paprika, 1/2 c. onion finely crushed and one crushed garlic clove. Heat mixture to boiling point. Cool liquid. Marinate meat cubes in dressing overnight, if possible, for 24 hours. Drain meat on absorbent paper. Place on skewers alternating with tomato slices, onions or mushrooms. Broil under hot flame for 20 min., turning to

brown on all sides. Serve garnished with lemon wedges and dill pickles.

Tangy Salad

For the salad, cut one head lettuce and 3 tomatoes into wedges. Blend 1/2 c. salad oil, 1/4 c. cider vinegar, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. paprika and mint flavoring, or, better still, chopped fresh mint leaves. Toss lettuce and tomatoes in this dressing, then chill for about 1/2 hour before serving.

No matter the time of year, the menfolk seem to enjoy Hungarian Goulash, and its heavenly aroma while cooking, proves a mighty potent lure. This recipe, which uses ground meat, to make for easy, quick preparation, is a good version of the authentic Hungarian Gulyas, with its onions and paprika. Brown one lb. ground beef or veal, 1/2 c. chopped onions, 1/2 chopped green pepper, one chopped garlic clove, 1/2 tsp. paprika in skillet. Add an 11-oz. can condensed cream of tomato soup diluted with an equal quantity of water. Simmer for 15 min., stirring occasionally. Add 3 large potatoes, cooked and diced; simmer for 10 min. longer. Serve in deep bowls or individual casseroles.
