The local Agricultural Conservation Association of Wheeler County has just been notified that the allocation for encouraging soil conservation practices for 1949 is \$65,000.00, according to Bill Rushing, secretary. This is approximately a \$20,-000.00 increase over the 1948 allocation. Wheeler County is classed among the counties where both wind and water take a tremendous toll from all the cropland. This \$65,000.00 allocation will be used to the best advantage in controlling these men-

Committees, elected by the farmers, set up practices to be carried out to earn this money and any land-owner, tenant or share cropper is entitled to use up to \$750 in the conservation practices listed below:

Terracing, Strip-Cropping, Subsoiling, deep breaking, leaving stalks, managing crops residue, contour listing, contour seeding drill crops, control of bindweed, drilling water wells, construction of earthen dams, mowing, deferred grazing, constructing fireguards, establishing or improving pastures, planting legumes, application of phosphate and soil sulphur and control sagebrush.

Referring to the fact that the nation has a bi-partisan farm policy and that agricultural assistance is no longer a political issue, the Kansas Congressman says that he knows "of no responsible leader in either the Republican or the Democratic Party who opposes the Farm Price Support Program.'

The idea that the price support program and other policies to aid agriculture represent a dole to the farmers of the nation continues to receive some expression throughout the nation. Those who jump to such a conclusion overlook the fact that the protective tariff gives to industry an advantage which cannot be given to agriculture. Consequently, farmers buy what they need from manufacturers whose prices are protected by tariff walls and then have to sell their products on a market where the price is fixed by the world price. The fact is abundant justification for everything that the Government has done for agriculture.

While we favor the present farm policy of the country, we are not prepared to assert that it should be continued if, in the course of world affairs, there is a gradual and effective reduction of tariffs. After all, the development of freer trade between the peoples of the earth, with everybody selling in the best available market and buying where things are cheapest, will be fair to all and eventually build up the stand- Fourth Sundays. ard of living everywhere.
