FARM PROSPERITY FOR TEN YEARS

Farm prosperity for eight to ten years is predicted by Chairman Clifford R. Hope, of the House Agriculture Committee. Mr. Hope thinks that the increase of population and the fact that people are eating

more per capita than before the war make farm prosperity somewhat certain.

Referring to the fact that the nation has a bi-partisan farm policy and that agricultural assistance is no longer a political issue, the Kansas Congressman says that he knows "of no responsible leader in either the Republican or the Democratic Party who opposes the Farm Price Support Program."

The idea that the price support program and other policies to aid agriculture represent a dole to the farmers of the nation continues to receive some expression throughout the nation. Those who jump to such a conclusion overlook the fact that the protective tariff gives to industry an advantage which cannot be given to agriculture. Consequently, farmers buy what they need from manufacturers whose prices are protected by tariff walls and then have to sell their products on a market where the price is fixed by the world price. The fact is abundant justification for everything that the Government has done for agriculture.

While we favor the present farm policy of the country, we are not prepared to assert that it should be continued if, in the course of world affairs, there is a gradual and effective reduction of tariffs. After all, the development of freer trade between the peoples of the earth, with everybody selling in the best available market and buying where things are cheapest, will be fair to all and eventually build up the standard of living everywhere.

Hints On How To Make Washday Easier, Given

Here are some hints from Gladys Darden, assistant home management specialist of the Extension Service at Texas A. and M. College, for making the wash-day job a little easier.

Hang the clothes on lines located near the laundry area to save steps and time—and save your energy by placing the clothes basket on a laundry cart or the youngster's wagon. An apron with large pockets or a bag hanging on the line will keep the clothespins in easy reach.

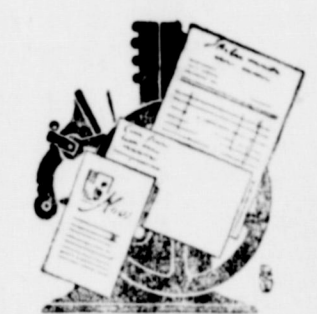
Hang the cup towels, pillow cases, and towels one-third over the line so you won't get dog-eared corners. The same goes for sheets and table cloths, except they should be doubled with the hems together.

By grouping the napkins and handkerchiefs together and hanging them over the line like other flat pieces, quite a bit of space can be saved. But don't hang them by one corner. They'll get dog-eared that way. Pin the shirts up by the tails, and hang the dresses, gowns, and pajama tops by their shoulder seams. Trousers, shorts, and pajama bottoms should be hung by the waist—and to make ironing easier, try using pants stretchers.

Hang the slips by the underarm section—and fold all flat clothes as they are taken from the line to reduce wrinkles as they are put in the child's wagon or the laundry cart, says Miss Darden.

It's highly important for dairy calves to get plenty of good roughage early in life. They need the iron that's in it.

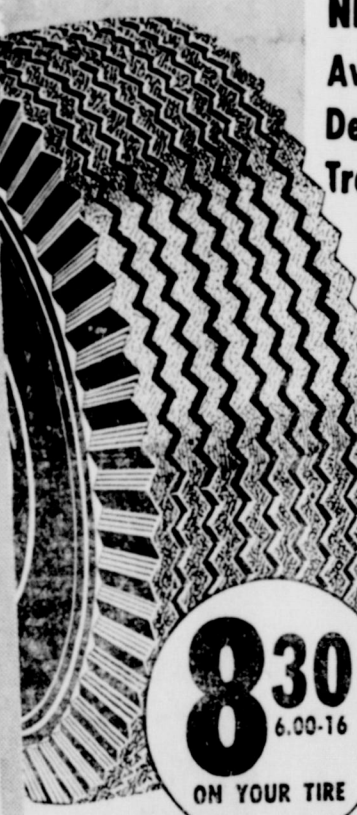

When well mixed, drop 2 inches apart from a teaspoon onto well greased and floured baking sheet. Bake 20 minutes, or until lightly browned. Remove from pan while warm and shape into balls with fingers. Makes 3 dozen.

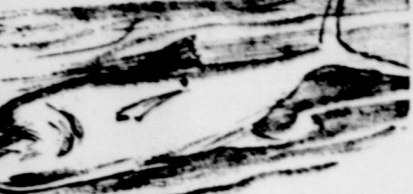

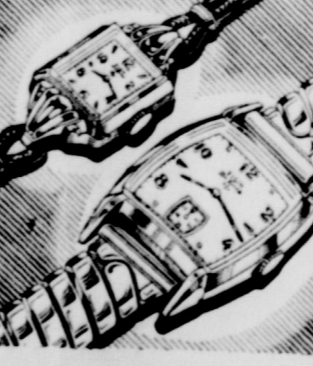
