Richardson received a fractured skull, three fractured ribs and other injuries in the accident and his condition was termed as critical from the time of the wreck until his death Saturday morning.

Funeral services for Mr. Richardson were conducted from the First Baptist Church here Monday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock with Rev. H. C. Lonis, pastor of the Briscoe Assembly of God Church, in charge and assisted by Rev. Lester of Mobeetie. Special music was rendered by the Helton sisters of Briscoe.

Richardson had been a resident of Wheeler County for the past 38 years having lived in the Locust Grove community, near Briscoe and Wheeler.

Everett J. Richardson was born in Smith County, Texas on January 17, 1900 and passed away at Wheeler on December 4, 1948 at the age of 48 years, 10 months and 17 days.

**HIGHER WAGE LINE
VS. LOWER PRICES**

The United Auto Workers Union "would rather have a rollback in prices than a raise in pay," says Walter P. Reuther, president. "I mean it when I say we don't care about dough—but what will it buy."

What we are looking for is a wage that will give us a 1944 standard of living. We don't care how we get it, by a rollback of prices or wage increase. We would prefer a price rollback, however, because we believe that lower prices would help everyone."

It is not difficult to see that Mr. Reuther now sees that a mere increase in wages for his people will leave the rest of the country worse off than before, whereas lower prices will leave his people better off, along with everybody else.

If you know anything about price relations, you realize that the biggest element in prices today is wages. Gray market profiteering in certain items still figures in heavily, but less so than last year or the year before. But it is possible to have high wages and low prices—provided the production content of the wage dollar goes up.

Labor is going to have to give more per wage dollar if it gets more per price dollar. More automobiles at the present total payroll mean lower prices for automobiles. That doesn't mean longer working days or longer work weeks, but it does mean fewer interruptions by strikes. And it does mean an honest hour's work for an honest hour's pay. And somewhere the inequities of absurd overtime pay schedules will have to be straightened out.

Full production plus competition will bring down prices. But labor and the white-collar man have got to give more in exchange for more. The farmer can't expect to bear the burden of price rollback. Food will have to come down. But so will farm costs have to come down. Any price rollback will have to start with assembly line performance. —From Dallas Morning News

GERMAN PILOTS READY TO FLY

The declaration of German labor leaders that they can provide enough German pilots "willing to lay down their lives for the air lift" is interesting and, as far as we can see, should be accepted. If the German pilots are ready to undertake some of the task of supplying the people of Berlin, there is no reason why the pilots of Great Britain and the United States should do the job.

The whole air lift has been a morale-builder for the Western democracies. Imagine the population of the German capital looking hopefully into the skies to see Allied planes on the wing. This is quite a contrast with the war days and nights when the last thing the Berliners hoped to see was an Allied air fleet.

The use of German pilots could be accomplished without building up German militarism, and we presume the deployment of pilots would be properly handled.

Must Have Security Number

Santa Claus must have a security account number if for a local store," stated Sanderson, manager of

the Amarillo Social Security Administration office. "All extra season workers employed for the holiday season must have social security account numbers," he continued, "and Saint Nick himself is no exception."

With the Christmas rush now in full tide, Mr. Sanderson urges each person who has a job or who expects to be employed, part-time or full-time to get a social security account number immediately, if he does not already have one. He should show it to his employer at the time he is entered on the payroll.

"Employers," said Sanderson, "are required to report quarterly to the Collector of Internal Revenue the correct amount of wages paid to each part-time and regular worker with his or her social security account number. Both the worker's name and the social security number are needed to give the proper wage credit on the Social Security Administration's records. If this is not done, the worker may lose credit for the wages he has earned."

Time For Steamed Pudding



Cranberries are behind the fine flavor comes to the table steaming hot and topped with a hard sauce.

Fruity, moist, and rich—that's the steamed pudding, ideal for desserts all through the winter. Americans add cranberries to the mix for a fine flavored dish that takes well to hard sauce.

After combining the ingredients for cranberry pudding, put them into a well greased large mold, such as a coffee can or a tube center pudding mold. Individual molds may also be used. Set the molds into a pan that has a good cover so that the steam from the simmering water is kept in. Do not let water come more than two-thirds way up the side of the mold so that it will not seep into the pudding. Leave the cover of the steamer on until the time is up, then turn pudding out and serve hot with a hard sauce.

Vary the hard sauce occasionally by adding a little lemon juice and lemon rind, or orange juice and rind to it.

Steamed puddings are hearty desserts for hungry folks, and supply good nourishment in the enriched bread and flour, cranberries, egg, and milk.

Choose Plants For Landscaping Carefully

When it comes to picking out flowers and shrubs for landscaping the home, it's a good time to be choosy. You can afford to be, says Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. and M. College, because some plants look better in certain areas than other plants.

The colors in flowers or the berries or blooms on shrubs may clash with each other, and produce a gaudy appearance rather than an attractive one, says Miss Hatfield.

There's one thing that will help decide for the home shrub grower just what plants to choose, and that is the soil on which the plants are grown. For example, people in East Texas will have much better luck growing gardenias than those in other parts of the state. That's because East Texas has an acid soil and plenty of moisture.

Centiza makes an attractive screen or windbreak, but again it has to be on the right type of

soil—in this case, a basic line soil. Another good thing the centiza is that it has few insects and diseases that

Some flowers and shrubs to have careful attention time. It doesn't take long some to become choked weeds and grasses, or for or diseases to knock them

Hardly, well-established will fight off these pests through the hard times.

If it's the green color looking for, plant some evergreens. They don't die during the winter months is an evergreen, and so a pfitzer juniper, cherry yaupon.

Good, sturdy plants your area will make for landscaped yard and an at home, says Miss Hatfield.

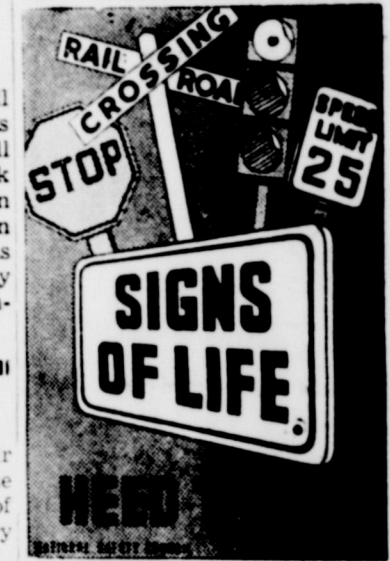

Household Appliances To Be More Plentiful

The picture for household equipment is a little brighter for 1949 than it has been for the past several years.

That's the story Mrs. Bernice Claylor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, brought back from the Outlook Conference in Washington, D. C.

In general, the supply of electrical household equipment seems ample. While there may be shortages in some localities, the supply of much equipment has been sufficient to make good progress in filling the backlog of demand.

"Prices continue to increase," Mrs. Claylor says, "but the rate of increase is slower. The demand for household equipment is greater since the end of the war than ever before, and that demand is expected to keep prices high for some time."

Rural power systems are expected to expand at the fastest rate in history in 1949, and this will mean a great increase in demand for electrical equipment, she says.

The production of home freezing units has increased greatly and the supply seems adequate, Mrs. Claylor says. The quality is better, but shortages of materials affects the quality of the equipment, and the initial cost is high, unless the family freezes a large percent of its food supply.

Automatic washing machines are quite popular and many families are replacing old machines with the automatic; however, community centers with laundry facilities put some check on the demand for washing machines.

As for refrigerators, Mrs. Claylor concludes, the demand is slowly leveling off, with the trend of purchasers to buy standard rather than deluxe models.

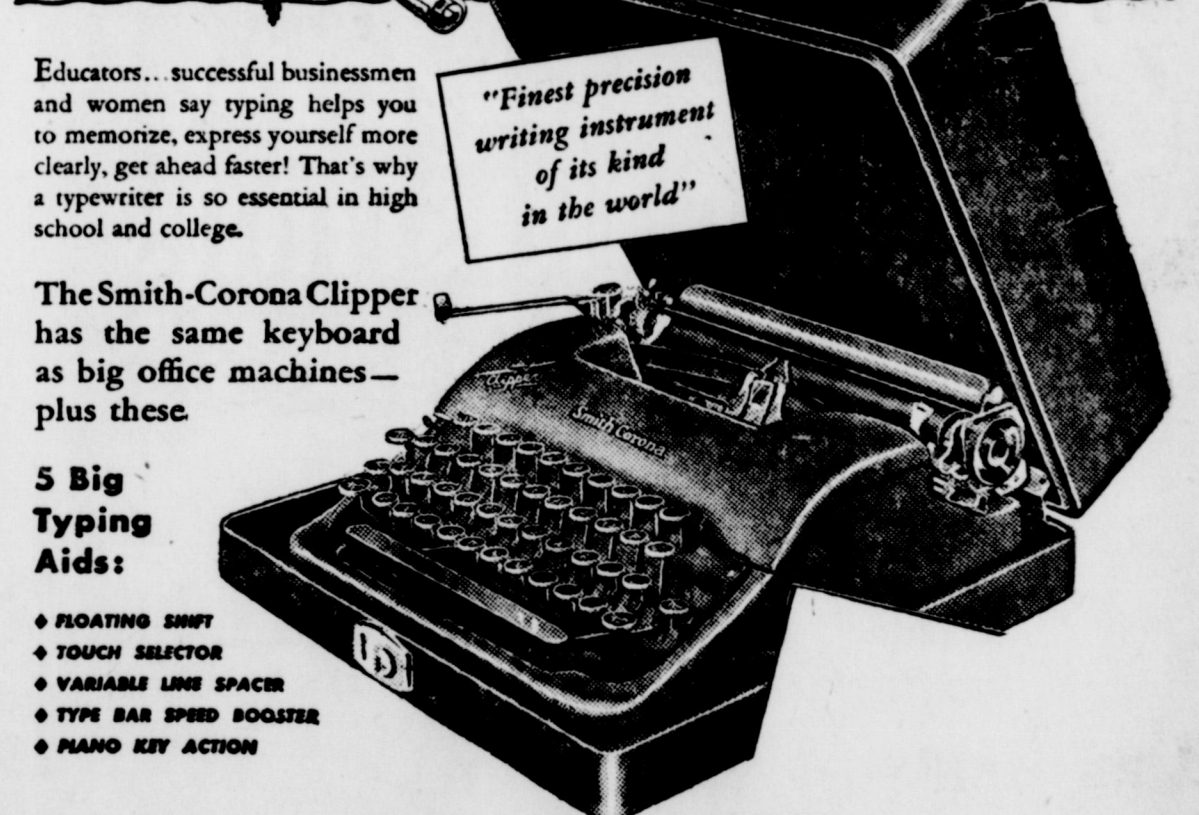

Jellied Fruit Salad

1 cup canned, sliced peaches*
1 cup peach juice
1 package lemon gelatin
1/2 cup bottled salad dressing
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup Pet Milk

Cut up peaches. Heat juice to boiling. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool thoroughly. Put salad dressing and salt into bowl. Stir into cooled gelatin. Chill until mixture is slightly thicker than unbeaten egg whites. Fold peaches into chilled gelatin. Put into 4 wet individual molds or a quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve on lettuce if desired. Makes 4 servings.

*Fresh or frozen peaches can be used if water replaces peach juice. Fruit cocktail and juice also can be used.

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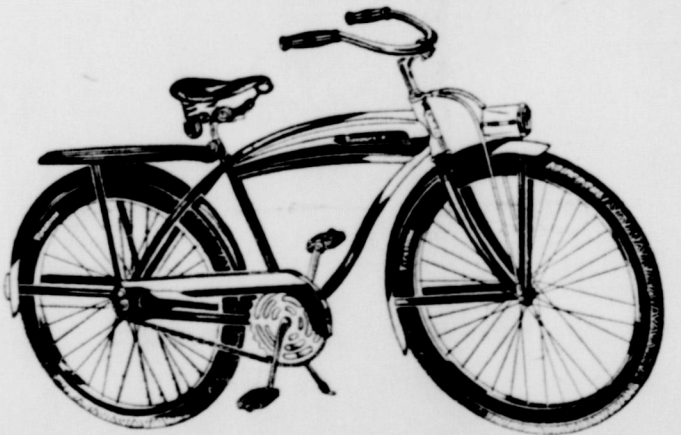

Farmers Are Expected To Plant More Cotton

Cotton planting time is still several months off. But Texas cotton farmers already have a good idea as to what they intend to do about cotton next year, says Fred Elliott, extension cotton work specialist of Texas A. and M. College.

This year's three and a quarter million bale crop that was grown on nearly nine million acres will probably be increased in 1949, says Elliott. This is especially true of the irrigated acres around El Paso, Pecos, Ft. Stockton, the Lower Rio Grande Valley and in the High Plains.

On August 1 of this year, the record shows a carryover of three million bales. Spinning will use close to nine million bales, and four million will be shipped out. There goes 13 million bales. Take that from the 15 million bale crop this year, and you get two million bales to add to the carryover. And come August 1, 1949, the carryover will have built up to five million bales.
