If you know anything about price relations, you realize that the biggest element in prices today is wages. ington, D. C. In general, the supply of electrical household equipment seems ample. While there may be shortages in some localities, the supply of much equipment has been sufficient to make good progress in filling the backlog of demand.

"Prices continue to increase," Mrs. Claytor says, "but the rate of increase is slower. The demand for household equipment is greater since the end of the war than ever before, and that demand is expected to keep prices high for some time."


Rural power systems are expected to expand at the fastest rate in history in 1949, and this will mean a great increase in demand for electrical equipment, she says.
