**TOO MANY PUPILS  
OUR BIG PROBLEM**

School enrollment in the nation is now 24,373,000. It will increase to 31,393,000, or 30 percent, by 1955, according to data from the National Education Association. The higher enrollment will come from the unexpected upturn in the national birth rate. The present public school teaching staff of 870,

000 must be increased to 1,170,000, states NEA, and an expenditure of ten billion dollars for new school buildings will be necessary. The NEA bulletin goes on to argue for Federal Government support of schools.

Just a few years ago the same government agencies that are now telling us of the rapid increase in population from a higher birth rate were assuring us that the birth rate would continue to decline and that the population of the country would become static about 1960. This is not saying that the projected graphs of the government statisticians were wrong, on basis of data they had, in either 1935 or 1948, although the findings are exactly contrary to each other. But it does mean that the statisticians quoted by the NEA today may be wrong as the statisticians of a few years ago.

Undoubtedly there will be a temporary increase in school enrollment because the war period has seen an increase in births. There must be provision for increased schooling. But, if the long downward trend of the birth rate is to be resumed after the "war baby" upsurge, then there should be wariness in any enormous expenditures to provide permanent facilities for a temporary increase. Despite the crowded conditions in many schools today, there is not efficient use of facilities. School buildings stand idle during a large percentage of the normal working hours of the year.

Maybe it would be better to spend a little less for new buildings and a little more for teachers' salaries and for operation of present schools through longer, staggered working hours and school terms.

The NEA is a perfectly normal professional organization in constantly calling for "more adequate funds" for its working people. And it must be admitted that its people have been just about as inadequately compensated as any profession or trade in the country. Still, NEA would help its cause by mixing in a little propaganda on behalf of "more adequate" service from school personnel and facilities. It has an opportunity to do so in meeting the present unexpected problem of a school enrollment increase as effectively as possible. —From Dallas News

**Refrigerator Food Storing Hints Given**

The refrigerator is one of the coolest items around the house these hot, sunny days. And it's a good thing, too, because it keeps food fresh and wholesome, if the food is put in the refrigerator properly.

Maybe you didn't know it there was a proper way to put things in the refrigerator, says Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College. Some people just put things in and shut the door. However, here are some ideas on the proper way to store food.

The coldest spot in the icebox is nearest the freezing cabinet. This is where the most perishable foods go—such foods as fresh and cooked meats, poultry and fish, meat broth, gelatin dishes, milk, milk-and-egg dishes like custard and cottage cheese. These foods need a temperature of around 40 degrees F. or slightly colder.

Take a look at modern refrigerators. They are built to store these foods near the freezing compartment. Tall shelves for milk bottles are beside the unit, and a

meat compartment is nearby. Keep perishable foods covered or taken out of the refrigerator and put in the freezer compartment of the icebox.

Don't crowd foods together because this stops the circulation of the cold air around them. Let cooling air get into the refrigerator by putting it into the refrigerator with the door open. Mrs. Claytor says don't want to leave it longer, for it may spoil.

## TIME TO PLANT WINTER CROPS

It's about time to begin planting winter grain crops again, so E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A. and M. College, has two big things he wants to remind small grain farmers of at this time.

One is to be sure you have cleaned all the weed seeds out of your small grain supply. Weeds won't do your grain crop any good, so the time to get the weeds out is right now before planting time. Weeds take up moisture and plant food that could otherwise be used by the small grain.

And the second big thing that Miller wants to remind grain growers of is the idea of planting chemically treated seed. If you're going to plant a small grain crop, plant the best seed so you can expect the best crop.

Chemical treatments will protect your seed from grain smuts, seed rots and seedling blights. Stinking smut struck hard at the 1948 wheat crop, so it is doubly important to plant treated seed this time. If there are any smut spores on the wheat kernels, they will germinate about the time the wheat will and grow up with the plants. Then just about the time

you figure you have a good crop of wheat, most of it will be smut spores where the kernels should be. About the only way to tell whether or not smut is present in your wheat crop is by the foul odor and the slightly darker green heads of wheat. During the com-

binning operations the smut balls break open and scatter millions of the black spores over the healthy seed. And that's about the end of a good wheat crop. Loose smut of wheat leaves the grain heads empty and black. If this was your trouble last season, get this season's seed from grow-

If you're in a quandary over something different to serve, why not try curry baked eggs for a change? Hard cook and season the yolk with real mayonnaise, and curry powder. Stuff and bake in a white sauce till well heated - about 30 minutes.

ers who did not have loose smut in their fields. There isn't much in the way of chemicals that will stop loose smut, but a difficult hot water treatment will do the job. So it's easier to start out with smut-free seed.

Oats and barley are often attacked by these two diseases—loose and stinking smuts. And it's easier to spot in these grains because you can see the black, barren stalks in the field. For every bushel of seed, treat with one-half ounce of the new improved ceresan or the new ceresan M.

Either of these ceresan treatments will also stop the disease of oats that the scientists call helminthosporium blight. Victoria oat crosses including Fultex, Ranger, Rustler and Victor Grain varieties are especially hard hit by this disease. This blight causes weakening of the stems, which results in lodging of the wheat.

Treating grain seed is good insurance against losses from reduced yields by smut and other diseases, says Miller, and a further lowering of profits from dockage on the market.

A good jelly should be bright, of good color and clear. And when taken out of the glass, it should keep the shape of the mold.

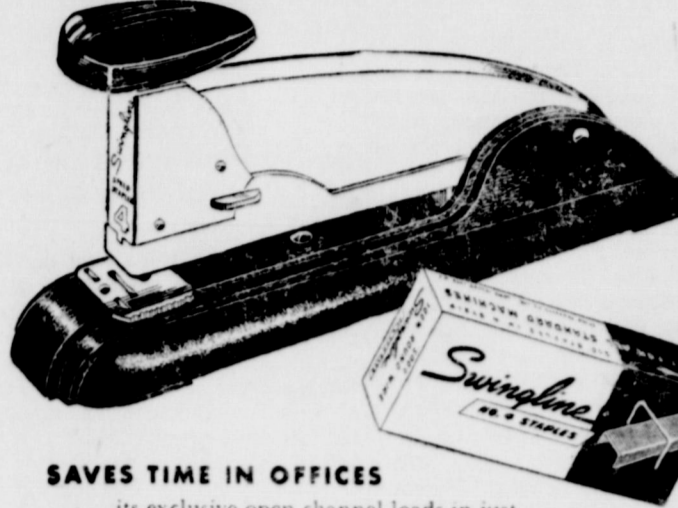
If you get an electric shock from a metal lamp stand, a washing machine or a food mixture or if you have lots of static on your radio, try reversing the plug in the wall outlet.

Ascorbic and citric acid can be used by homemakers to prevent the darkening of fruit surfaces during freezing of peaches, pears, and light colored cherries.

It's almost time again for planting small grain crops. Before you start planting, be sure you have cleaned the weed seeds out and treated the seeds chemically for protection against grain smuts, seedling blights and see rots.

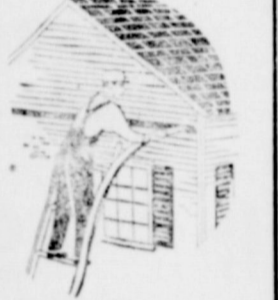

When producing sand has been reached, the drill stem is replaced with casing lowered to the bottom of the hole and cemented into place. Small holes are shot or blown through the casing with a perforating "gun."

Small diameter tubing is lowered to the bottom of the hole and the heavy "mud" which is present all through the drilling operation is displaced with water to allow the well to come in.

Gas or oil enters the perforations at the bottom of the tubing and flows to the collection of valves at the head of the well called a Christmas tree. Here a man has complete control of the volume of gas or oil that flows from the well.

**Infant Mortality Rate Lowest Level Ever**

Infant and maternal mortality in Texas are at their lowest in the history of the state, according to figures released by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Health Department. Infant mortality has reached a low of 4.6 deaths for every 1,000 live births compared to the figures for

1940, this represents a reduction of more than 39 percent. In that year, there were 197,023 live births and 8,685 deaths. But despite these gains, Texas still has the sixth highest infant mortality rate in the United States, with forty-two states reporting lower rates. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, attributes the reduction to the increase in public response to the educational efforts of the Texas State Department of Health. "We have reason for pride in

our reduced infant and maternal mortality when it is realized that the reduction means in excess of 5,000 babies are being saved annually which would have otherwise died," Dr. Cox said. "In addition, the birth rate is higher than the 1940 figure by more than 71,000."

The comparison between the live births figures for 1940 and 1947, shows white births up 22,707; Latin American births up 7,186; and Negro births up 3,297.

The report also shows maternal mortality has been reduced over 65 percent. In 1940, the rate was 4.6 for every 1,000 live births as compared to 1.6 for 1947.

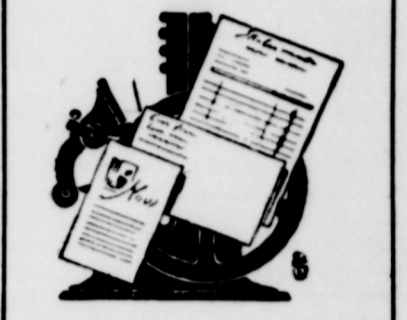

**Six Million Persons Get Security Payments**

John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Administration office, has announced that more than six million persons are receiving cash payments under the several provisions of the social Security Act. It was just 13 years ago, on August 10, 1935, that President Roosevelt signed this Act into law.

This law, which was designed to provide a measure of financial security to the people of the nation, was considered by President Roosevelt as one of the outstanding achievements of his administration. Improvements and extension were made by amendments in 1939 and again in 1946. Further improvements have been considered by each succeeding session of Congress.

- This law consists of four main parts:
1. A Federal system of retirement and survivors insurance for workers and their families—based on employer-employee contributions.
  2. A Federal-State plan for payments to the needy aged, needy blind, and dependent children.
  3. A Federal-State plan for providing for the payment of unemployment benefits to unemployed workers who lose their jobs through no fault of their own.
  4. Federal aid to the States for maternal and child health, public health, and vocational rehabilitation.

### Full Name Should Be On Security Returns

Full names, not nicknames, should appear on social security returns, J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office said today. Employers should insist on seeing the workers' social security cards and copy the name and number from them. Nicknames are convenient among friends, but they lead to confusion in keeping social security records, continued Sanderson.

Many times employees when going to work give their employers their nicknames or an abbreviation of their real names. When this incorrect name is reported on social security returns, the social security office has to make a check because its file shows the correct, legal name of the wage earner and the social security account number assigned to that name.

The result is that thousands of letters per year are mailed out to employers asking the names of workers as they appear on their social security cards. Identification is completed in most cases by correspondence. In others, personal visits are needed to effect identification. Despite all efforts, a small percentage are never identified. This means smaller social security benefits for those whose accounts are not completed.

## Easy Steps to Furniture Care

HIGH REPLACEMENT costs of furniture today makes care of our household furnishings especially important.

Regular shampooing for upholstered furniture and polishing and waxing for wood furniture, pays rich dividends.

Furniture that is used daily is subject to blemishes and scars that should receive immediate attention. Sometimes professional treatment is required, but most of these minor repairs can be made by any homemaker.

A bottle of carbon tetrachloride is your best friend for spots and stains on upholstered furniture. This has little or no effect on fibers or color of the fabric. However, it is always best to test the upholstery in an inconspicuous spot before proceeding.

Moisten a clean soft cloth to sponge the spot, working from the outside of the spot toward the center. After each application blot with a clean white blotter or absorbent cloth, to take up the dirt.

Cleaning fluids with a carbon tetrachloride base are particularly effective for grease or oil spots.

Wood furniture surfaces damaged by white water marks, alcohol stains, heat marks, scratches and occasional burns should be treated as promptly as possible.

White watermarks may be removed from a waxed surface by removing the old wax (do this by applying bottled liquid wax freely and wiping up while still wet). Then apply a fresh coat of wax.

For other finishes wring a cloth out of water to which a few drops of bottled ammonia have been added and rub spot lightly.

Alcohol stains from perfumes, beverages or medicine should be wiped up immediately with an oiled cloth. If stains have been neglected apply a mixture of rottenstone or powdered pumice and bottled lemon oil.

Rub on with a circular motion, wiping up immediately with a cloth moistened with lemon oil. Wipe dry with a clean soft cloth and polish.

For heat marks on varnish or shellac finishes call on the camphor bottle from your medicine cabinet. Rub on with a damp



1. Light burns on wood surfaces can often be removed with scratch-removing furniture polish. Deeper burns require more elaborate treatment with steel wool, bottled turpentine, and shellac, finished with the bottled scratch-removing polish.



3. The camphor bottle from your medicine cabinet is a valuable assistant in removing heat marks from varnished or shellacked surfaces. Rub it on with a damp cloth and finish with your regular polishing procedure. For watermarks use bottled oil of peppermint.



2. Best antidote for scratches in furniture is a bottled polish made for the purpose. This scratch-removing polish incorporates a stain which makes the scratch invisible. For deeper scratches, apply a touch-up wood stain available in small bottles.



4. Spots and stains on upholstered furniture, particularly grease spots, should be removed as promptly as possible. Use bottled carbon tetrachloride rubbed in lightly with a soft cloth. Blot up excess with a clean white blotter. Continue this treatment until spot is gone.

cloth. When it has dried thoroughly, polish with bottled furniture polish.

A special scratch-remover furniture polish is effective for scratches on polished surfaces. For deep scratches, use a touch-up wood stain available in small bottles with a fine brush attached to the cap. When dry, polish in the usual way.

Furniture polish may also remove the effects of light surface burns. For severe burns, try rubbing with fine steel wool (grade 0). Brush away scrapings and rub on bottled turpentine with a soft lintless cloth. When it is dry cover with a thin coating of white shellac. Finish off with scratch-remover furniture polish.

The best quality spatulas are made of stainless steel. The blade should be flexible enough to bend at right angles, but near the handle it should be rigid.

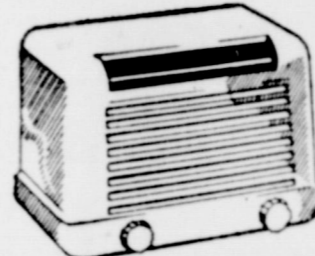

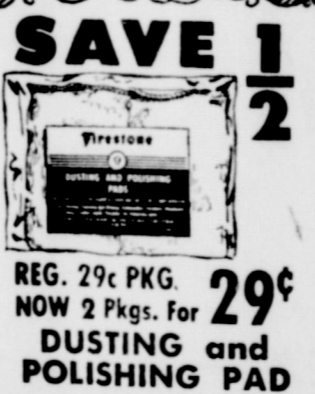

### New Twist in Biscuits



Orange twistlers are made from strips of biscuit dough, with orange rind and sugar rolled into the dough. After baking, the twistlers have a pebbly surface with a glisten of sugar.

Once a bride has learned to make good biscuits—and that skill is by no means as difficult as the cartoons would have us believe—she's ready for an advanced lesson that includes making orange twistlers. These crisp curls of biscuit dough have an orange flavor accented by a crust of sugar, and the shape is enough to turn them into a culinary triumph for the cook.

To form twistlers, first roll an orange rind-sugar mixture into the biscuit dough. Then cut the dough into strips, double each strip over and twist with one motion. For a variation, you might try braiding three shorter strips together, pressing the ends together firmly. Orange twistlers may be served wherever biscuits would be proper, and they may also accompany afternoon cups of coffee or tea.

#### ORANGE TWISTERS

2 cups sifted enriched flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 to 4 tablespoons shortening  
1/4 to 1/2 cup milk  
Orange Sugar

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk to form a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead one-half minute. Pat or roll out into eight-inch square about one-fourth inch thick. Roll Orange Sugar into the dough. Cut into strips about three-eighths inch wide. Double each strip over and twist. Place on baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 to 12 minutes.  
Yield: About 18 three-inch twistlers.

#### Orange Sugar

2 tablespoons sugar  
1 teaspoon grated orange rind  
Blend sugar and orange rind together.

### New Type Ant Killer Has Been Introduced

"There's a new ant killer on the market, which should be good news for the homemaker now, as this is the season when they are most likely to take over in the kitchen," V. A. Little, professor of entomology of Texas A. and M. College, says.

The new killer is called chlordane, and it is a more efficient killer than DDT for ants and roaches, Dr. Little says, and directions for its use must be followed carefully, as it is poisonous.

"Of course, the best way to get rid of ants," Dr. Little points out, "is to follow the trail back to the colony or nest and put the poison there. However, this isn't always easy to do, as sometimes the insects nest in the foundation, walls or other hard-to-reach places."

If it is possible to find the ant colony, pour a small amount of a two or three percent oil solution of the chlordane in the entrance. Then check the nests about a week later, and if necessary, repeat the treatment.

In spraying in the home, an ordinary house spray gun may be used, Dr. Little says. Sprayer attachments on electric sweepers work fine, too. The baseboards, floor and window cases, around built-in fixtures and the drainboards should be wet almost to the running point with the spray. Give the cracks an extra dose. An oil solution of the same strength as that used for killing out ant colonies is recommended.

"Remember that chlordane is poisonous," Dr. Little warns. "Food, dishes, and cooking utensils should be taken out of the kitchen—or put where the spray won't reach them—until after the spray has settled. Follow the manufacturer's directions for its use, and it will be safe."

The chlordane works on outdoor ant colonies, too. For ants in the lawn, a dust of five percent chlordane is good, while red ant colonies can be killed out with a teaspoonful of two or three percent solution. One treatment is generally enough to kill the nest, Dr. Little says.

### Named to Head March of Dimes



E. S. Stewart

Mr. E. S. Stewart, prominent Abilene business and civic leader, has been appointed Texas State Chairman of the 1949 March of Dimes, Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced today.

The March of Dimes, conducted nationally each January, is the sole support of the National Foundation and its 2,800 local county chapters. Funds contributed to the annual drive pay costs of medical care and treatment for polio victims and finance the scientific research and professional education programs sponsored by the National Foundation. The 1949 appeal will be held January 14-31.

Mr. Stewart, born in Waco, Texas, has been long active in community fund raising and welfare work. A west Texas food broker for 17 years, he is now owner of the Abilene Candy Manufacturing Company. During the First World War he served overseas with the U. S. Army Engineers. Mr. Stewart is past president of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club and in 1943 and 1944 was director of the American Red Cross War Fund in Taylor County.

Mr. O'Connor, in announcing Mr. Stewart's acceptance of the March of Dimes chairmanship, revealed that when complete incidence figures for this year are tabulated the toll of infantile paralysis in the United States from 1943 through 1948 may well exceed 100,000 cases.

"While the final answer to the mystery of poliomyelitis—the discovery of a cure and a preventive for the disease—lies in the research laboratory," Mr. O'Connor said, "the generous support of the American people is now more vital than ever before if victims of polio, children and adults alike, are to receive the care they must have to achieve maximum recovery."

### CHEST TYPE VS. UPRIGHT HOME FREEZER

Families who are thinking of buying a home freezer often ask which is the better choice, the upright or the chest type. The upright or vertical style opens like a refrigerator and the chest type which is often called the horizontal style has a lid which opens from the top.

Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says each type has some advantage over the other. The upright type is more convenient for some families and others find the chest type more satisfactory. One of the advantages of the upright freezer is that it takes up less floor space than the chest type of the same capacity, but you must allow for space in front of the freezer for the door to swing out. However, although the upright freezer doesn't take up so much space, it does put more weight on each square foot of the floor than the chest type. Sometimes it is necessary to put extra supports under the flooring to take care of the weight.

At a first glance, the upright type seems to offer the same convenience in reaching stored food

that a refrigerator does. But when the freezer is full so that all the shelves are packed, you have no convenient place to put the packages in front while getting those from the rear.

Some of the upright home freezers have drawers to overcome this difficulty but drawers take up storage space. And some of the chest types have baskets for lifting out food. These baskets are handy unless they become too heavy to lift out easily. And, like the drawers in the upright freezers they too take up some of the

storage space.

Because cold air is heavier than warm air, a freezer that opens on top has a natural advantage over one with the side opening, in holding the cold air and thus saving fuel. In trying to overcome this disadvantage manufacturers of upright freezers have had to construct them differently from chest freezers. This generally makes the initial cost of a properly constructed upright freezer higher than that of a chest freezer of the same size. However, Mrs. Claytor points out that the opening costs

of both the upright home freezer and the chest type is said to be about the same.

Finally, Mrs. Claytor advises taking measurements before buying a home freezer to make sure not only that the freezer will fit the place chosen for it, but also that you can get it there. Be sure it can be moved through doors, halls or around corners where necessary. And be sure the floor is strong enough to support it when filled to capacity.

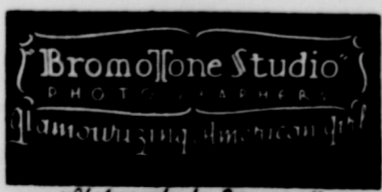
From where I sit, it's that great American trait of tolerance—respect for individual tastes and liberties—that makes this country strong. Let's never lose it!

### Plow Up Of Stalks Kills Many Insects In Cotton Fields

The sooner Texas cotton farmers plow up their cotton stalks, the more weevils and pink bollworms will starve out and freeze during the winter. C. A. King, associate extension entomologist of Texas A. and M. College, says it's a job the cotton growers can make money on by doing it early. And it's something they'll have to do later on anyhow to have a good crop next year—without the insects.

It has been tried before. Let's take a look at the record. Since 1943, the Lower Rio Grande Valley has had cleanup campaigns ranging from very poor in the fall to excellent in early August. After a very poor cleanup in the fall of 1944, 51 percent of the squares were punctured by the boll weevil. But when they had an excellent cleanup in early August of 1946, only 3 percent of the squares were punctured the following season.

And up in Central Texas, Williamson county had a county-wide stalk cleanup program completed September 30 last year. This year on July 16, only 9 percent of the squares were punctured. A week

later the county total was 12 percent punctured, and on July 30, there was a 27 percent puncture total.

Right next door, Milam county didn't have a county-wide stalk destruction campaign last year. This year a July 16 check showed 45 percent of the squares punctured, and on July 23, 59 percent had the tell-tale weevil holes. A week later, the county total amounted to 63 percent.

Those figures meant profits for Williamson county, but losses for Milam county. Besides killing the insects, turning under the stalks makes your soil richer by returning organic matter to the soil and increasing next season's yields.

So the earlier you turn under the cotton stalks, the longer the starvation period will be, and the better the insect control next season, says King.

### Rural Electrification Helps Appliance Sales

With the steady increase in rural electrification, a new and very large electrical appliance market has opened. As soon as the farm or ranch house is wired for electricity, the average family starts to buy electrical equipment.

The Rural Electrification Administration says that the rural housewife first invests in better lighting equipment, such as floor and table lamps. Then an electric iron, a radio or a radio-phonograph. Refrigerators and washing machines come next—these are items that are more expensive and usually take a little budgeting.

The installation of an electric water system in the home is usually planned next. Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says the electric water system is one of the greatest time and labor savers for the rural homemaker, even though its installation usually comes after the purchase of other items.

Mrs. Claytor points out that with new electrical appliances in the home, care must be taken to prevent plugging too many into one outlet. It pays to have enough

outlets, as overloading cuts down on the current means less power, dim lights and may blow a fuse.

Plenty of conveniently placed outlets will cut down on potential accidents, too, she says, as there will be no need for long extension cords, which are unsightly, inconvenient and dangerous. The best time to install the outlets is when the house is wired.

Direct benefits to veterans of all wars in the Southwestern Area of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1948, amounted to \$498,509,000, the Veterans Administration reports.

VA's Dallas Branch Office, which supervises the tri-state area veterans' programs, said it issued 6,582,371 checks during the fiscal year for benefits ranging from education to disabilities.

Largest amount reported was \$225,903,000 in subsistence to World War II veterans going to school or taking on-the-job training. Schools and educational institutions training the veterans received \$85,834,000 for tuition and other fees.

Next largest amount disbursed by VA to Southwestern veterans was \$111,459,000 for disability compensation or pensions. These payments were to veterans of all wars.

Death pension checks mailed to beneficiaries or dependents or dependents of deceased veterans amounted to \$28,994,000 while another \$20,370,000 was received during the year by GI insurance beneficiaries of veterans in the tri-state area.

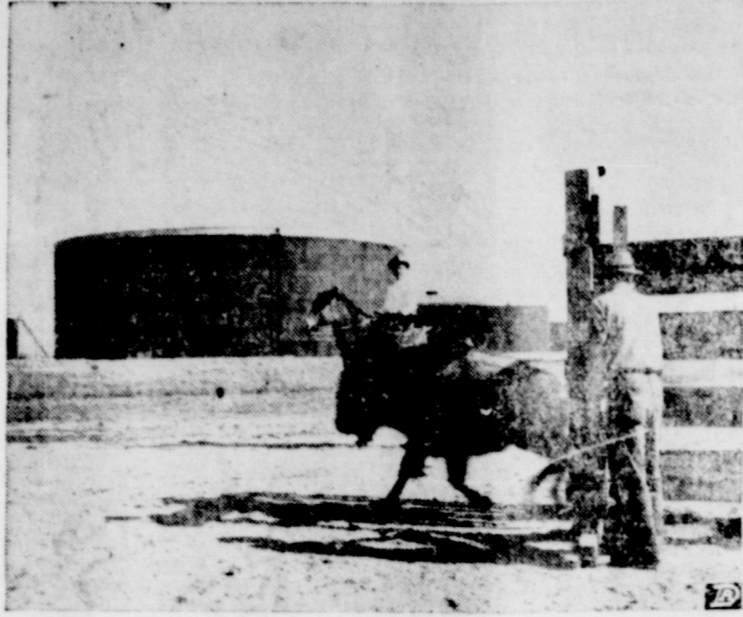
An estimated 1,400,000 veterans of all wars are residents of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

More than 1,400,000 World War II veterans in the United States obtained GI loans for homes, farms and businesses by August 1, the Veterans Administration says.

Ninety per cent, or 1,266,000 bought or built homes; 47,000 purchased farms and farm equipment, and 97,000 went into business.

**PANTEX LANDS MAY BE LEASED**

Four thousand two hundred and twenty two acres of the Pantex Ordnance Works near Amarillo are available for leasing on a yearly basis, with letter bids acceptable until September 14, according to announcement today by the regional office of War Assets Administration.

Present leases on the 15 tracts involved will expire September 30, the WAA said. Bids will be considered on each of the parcels separately, or on all or any combination of the tracts, for agricultural or grazing purposes.

Eleven of the tracts presently leased, containing 3,955 acres, are located within the main reservation of the Pantex plant, whereas four other tracts, embracing 667 acres, lie within the area known as the Pantex Disposal System, now serving the Amarillo Army Air Field. Plot plans are available on request to WAA's Grand Prairie office, and an area map may be inspected at the office of R. V. Derrick, WAA Plant Facility Manager at Pantex, who will also furnish information about the lands.

In some cases, the WAA said, it may be possible to provide water to some of the tracts on a fee basis.

To qualify for consideration, each bid must state the amount offered per acre per year and designate the area and acreage. Rentals will be payable semi-annually in advance, and the leases are subject to cancellation on a notice of 30 days.

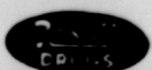

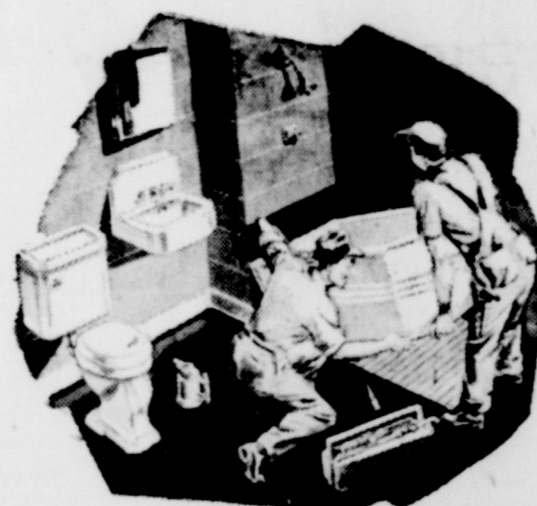
