Good Cooking Tricks to Know

THERE are tricks and little touches in cooking just as there are in everything else, from painting to pressing.

Take the matter of jellied marmalade, which can be either very insipid or very inspired eating.

To serve 4, soften 1/2 lb. gelatine in 1/2 c. cold water. Simmer together 4 c. fresh or canned tomatoes, 1/2 cup. fortified margarine, 2 bouillon cubes, 1/2 tsp. pickling spices, 1/2 onion finely minced, and salt and pepper to taste. Strain. Pour over softened gelatin; stir until dissolved. Chill until jellied.

When ready to serve, brown 1/2 c. dried bread crumbs in 2 tsp. butter or margarine over low heat. Add grated cheese to suit, and a few grains cayenne pepper. Sprinkle over jellied soup.

For something special, serve garlic bread.

Add a little garlic powder, or a cut garlic clove, to 1/2 to 1/4 c. butter or margarine, melted. Slice French or Italian loaf into inch-thick slices, but don't cut right through the loaf. Pour melted butter over cut sides. Toast in oven. Grand with soups and some salads, and specially fine with stews.

For a one-dish meal of Spanish Rice, place 4 tsp. shortening, salad oil, butter or margarine in a large frying pan. Fry one c. uncooked rice 5 min. until brown. Add 2 tsp. salt, pepper, and paprika to taste. Then add one small chopped onion, 2 chopped stalks celery; cook for 5 min. more. Add 4 c. canned tomatoes, one c. leftover diced meat and one c. stock or boiling water to which tsp. gravy bouquet has been added. Lower heat, cover, and simmer until rice is tender (about 25 min.), stirring occasionally. Uncover and brown in hot oven for 15 min. Serve in casserole.

Cholera Scare

The main symptoms noted in the mild form are reddish, diamond shaped eruptions (diamond skin disease). The losses in this form of the disease are very low.

The symptoms which have been present in hogs in Wheeler County that made it appear that they had cholera were: staggering, soreness and stiffness of joints, especially in the hind quarters, reddish purple discoloration, and high temperature. These are also the symptoms of swine erysipelas. Symptoms which hogs did not have here, and that are usually typical of hog cholera are inflamed eyes that exude a whitish discharge and often glues eyes shut, and diarrhea following early constipation, in addition to those mentioned before.

The incubation period of hog cholera virus (the length of time it will take for an exposed animal to take on the symptoms) is seven to ten days.

County Agent Frey advises that any who suspect they have hogs with cholera should get in touch with a veterinarian. If a veterinarian cannot be obtained, and there is doubt as to whether it is cholera or erysipelas, swine-erysipelas serum should be administered to suspected animals. If the animal has cholera, the serum will kill the animal almost immediately (cholera would have killed it anyway) and if the animal has erysipelas, the serum treatment repeated at 24-hour intervals at double the prevention dosage should bring the animal through in good shape.

Remember: B.T.V. or crystal violet or other similar blood tissue vaccines are safe, and will not put the live virus on your place. Get your veterinarian to administer this new and improved cholera vaccine to all your hogs to produce immunity against cholera. The vaccine should be given again to breeding stock the next year.

ARRANGE BATH FOR COMFORT

It's fun to bathe the baby—but it's more fun and easier on mother and child, if the bathroom is arranged for the convenience and comfort of both.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist of Texas A. and M. College, says that built-in cabinets and a dressing table will save time, steps, stooping, lifting and carrying. They can be built in the average-size bathroom at a small cost.

"Plan the equipment at a comfortable working height for the mother," Mrs. Claytor suggested. "Put all the supplies within easy reach and sight. If the mother is right-handed, arrange the built-ins so that she will work from right to left."

One of the handiest built-ins, Mrs. Claytor says, is a canvas covered frame which makes a safe, comfortable, economical bath table. A shelf below provides space

Editorial

REVISING THE CONSTITUTION

Those who realize Texas' need of a new constitution can look hopefully upon the beginning that has been made at Austin. They can be hopeful, but also they must be patient, for it is not going to be easy to get the job done.

At the Austin meeting it was decided to ask the 51st Legislature to create a special commission "to study the need for revision." It is quite possible that the legislature will defeat this proposal...

Our guess is that within 10 years, Texas will have a new constitution. In most of the states whose constitutions have been revised in modern times, the first efforts at revision failed, and that is likely to happen in Texas.

One trouble with the undertaking is the disposition to put into the constitution provisions that belong in the legislative field. There are those who feel that if a measure is desirable, it should be put into the constitution, where repeal or amendment of it is difficult.

When the 1874 constitution was written, Texas had just been through experiences that shaped the document. Under the something regime, the powers of government had been unwisely used, with both corruption and tyranny manifesting themselves.

If a new constitution is written now, a different problem will appear. The need today is for a government strong enough to deal effectively with big business and with big labor. The remarks of Tom Tyson of Corsicana, in his speech here Thursday, were apt ones of this need.

Increased governmental powers for cities and counties are another obvious need. The 1874 constitution was written at a time when Texas had no city as large as 15,000. The wide diversity of interests in Texas, the interplay of so many social and economic forces, selfish and unselfish, and the traditional reluctance of voters to tamper with the constitution, combine to make the task of constitutional revision a long and difficult one.

Farm Facts



1. Yes. Lack of exercise frequently leads to disappointing results at farrowing time. The general belief is that exercise has marked effect on the general thrift and health of pregnant sows, the ease of pigging, and promptness of recovery after farrowing. See that breeding stock gets regular exercise.

2. There are a number of good preparations on the market for worming hens. Most of them call for the individual capsuling of the birds. Many poultrymen prefer the simpler method of mixing a worm powder with the mash for a week. This method is practiced at the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company where it has been 93% effective.

3. The ten year average lamb crop for the United States is 85%. The 1946 lamb crop has equaled the record of 89.5 lambs for each 100 ewes one year old and over, established in 1941. Many flocks will have more than 100% lamb crop, because twinning is common in sheep.

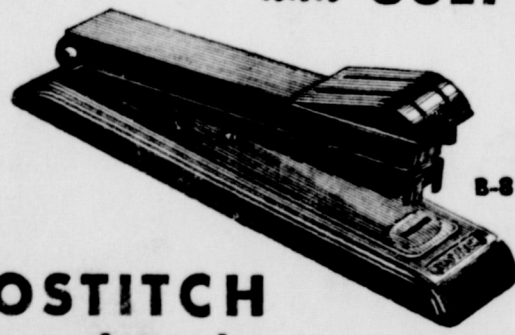

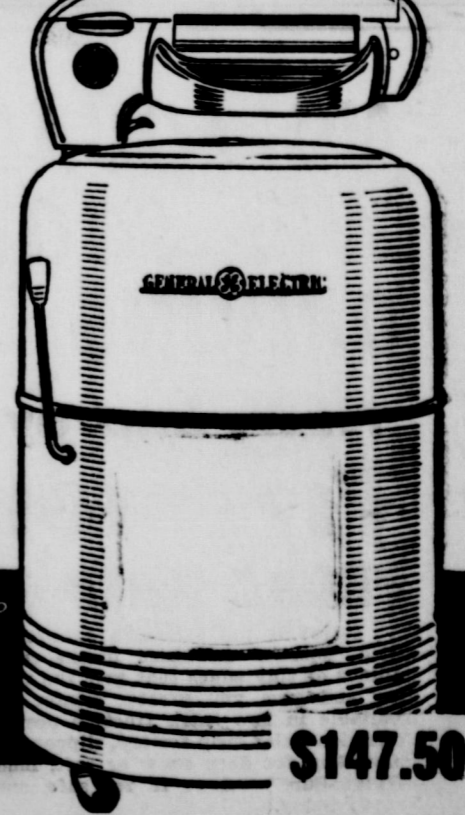
