The public should insist upon a cafe being free from roaches, flies, and other insects: cracked dishes should never be used; tables and linens, as well as dishes and silverware should be scrupulously clean, and milk should be served in the original container, with the cap intact. They should note whether or not a cafe displays a placard stating that its standards of sanitation have been approved by

local or State health officials.

"Obviously the best in sanitation can be had only through close cooperation between the public, and health officials. As long as the public approves and accepts insanitary conditions in eating establishments, they will continue to
