

It should be noted that the initial I act of registering did not mean that the men would be compelled to become belligerents and that, during the last war, conscientious objectors served the nation in other ways.

A group of 400 clergymen and other persons from thirty-six states have signed protest, alleging that the conviction of these men throws into doubt our heritage of religious freedom. In addition, the signers of the protest intimate that the young men should be signally honored for "faithfully following their consciences."

This is an interesting argument. As to religious freedom, one should understand that this is not an excuse to violate the law of the land. As the late Alfred E. Smith declared, there is no power in the institutions of any church "to interfere with the operation of the Constitution of the United States or the enforcement of the law of the land.

Certainly, as to the following of one's conscience, we must admit that this is an ideal policy for every individual but it is nowhere guaranteed, in statutory law or Holy Writ, that this can be done without be ing subjected to prosecution or penalty. I one is conviced that a law of the land i wrong, one may well disregard it as a matter of conscience but with the full knowledge that the state has the right to enforce its penalty provisions for any violation of its
