for farm products. The situation developing in the national economy today seems to be paralleling that which developed during the Church Calendar twenties. There were some erratic upsurges approximation and in the state of the st of farm prices during that period but, as a whole, the farm industries suffered a consistent deflation throughout the entire time of stock market boom prosperity.

It is more difficult to maintain a seller's market for farm products than for any other class of American goods or services. The reasons are clear. We are a farm products exporting country. Normally we produce a surplus of most staple crops. More than any other country, we have the natural resources, the skills, manpower and machinery to

A crop surplus is a hard thing to argue with. We can go on increasing wages in a vicious circle. Eventually it will lead to disastrous inflation, but it can continue a long time. The same is true of the stock market if the public psychology is right, as it was during the twenties. The same can be done with practically all lines of services. The production of even industrial goods can be carried along on the flood. There is greater flexibility in both supply and demand of consumers' goods. But elevators full of wheat and warehouses choked with cotton can not

During the twenties we continued to inflate most industrial and commercial values while permitting farm values to deflate. The divergence between the two was one of the principal causes of the disaster that came in 1929. Since the war we have tried to prevent it primarily by government purchases of farm surpluses. We have about reached the end of this sort of expedient treatment. The necessary job is to hold other costs in line with what farm prices are going to be regardless of whether we will it or not. We will be getting nowhere with the problem so long as parallel newspaper columns tell of slipping hog prices and rising industrial workers' wages .- From Dallas Morning News
