**Editorial**  
**NEW SCHOOL PROGRAM**  
**A PUBLIC CONCERN**

The announcement that the Gilmer-Aikin  
 plan will afford state aid of \$129 per pupil  
 in the next scholastic year is further cor-  
 roborated that the public schools of Texas are  
 hardly to be classified as underprivileged  
 tax-supported institutions. With the addition  
 of local support, the year's cost of the Min-  
 imum Foundation Program for the schools is  
 estimated at \$181,593,637.

State sponsors of the program report  
 that state aid will be \$35 per child higher in  
 the coming school year than in the previous  
 nine-month scholastic period. The last per  
 capita apportionment was \$55 exclusive of  
 supplemental state aid for certain schools.  
 The progress of the public schools financial-  
 ly may be gauged by the fact that the ap-  
 portionment was \$22 in 1939, \$17.50 in 1929,  
 \$8.50 in 1919, and \$6.75 in 1909.

Creditably the Gilmer-Aikin law pro-  
 vides that state aid will be based on estimat-  
 ed average daily attendance of 1,009,757  
 pupils rather than the scholastic census of  
 1,500,000 children. The latter figure includes  
 those children who go to parochial or private  
 schools or no schools at all. Basing state aid  
 on scholastic population rather than average  
 attendance was an abuse that should not  
 have been tolerated so long in public educa-  
 tion.

Other salutary features of the new  
 school program include the provision of  
 better pay for teachers, more teachers and  
 supervisors and the opportunity for nine-  
 month's schooling for every child in districts  
 participating in the Gilmer-Aikin plan. So  
 far only about 265 school districts of a total  
 of 2,600 have failed to qualify for foundation  
 funds.

The law now requires properly that  
 local support for the public schools is a pre-  
 requisite to state aid. This community par-  
 ticipation in financing is estimated at \$45-  
 000,000, which does not include school build-  
 ing programs in many parts of the state.

The people as taxpayers will make lib-  
 eral provision for public education this year  
 in Texas. The public schools, with costs of  
 about \$200,000,000 a year, an attendance of  
 over a million and 44,495 classroom units,  
 fall into the category of "big business" as  
 well as "big government." In view of the  
 state and local provisions, it hardly seems  
 proper that federal aid for education be  
 sought.

The object of public education should  
 not be obscured by its immensity, scope and  
 cost. As in 1909 when state aid was \$6.75  
 per child, the goal still is the training and  
 preparation of the pupil for life. This task  
 embraces the development of good citizens  
 to understand life as well as to earn a liveli-  
 hood. The test of the system is its finished  
 product.

The opportunity for public education is  
 greater this coming school year than in the  
 past, if cost is any barometer. The responsi-  
 bility is correspondingly greater. A part of  
 the process of education is enlightened criti-  
 cism in the interest of reform. The public  
 in view of the importance of an expanding  
 educational system should take more inter-  
 est in the public schools as a vital segment  
 of society.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram

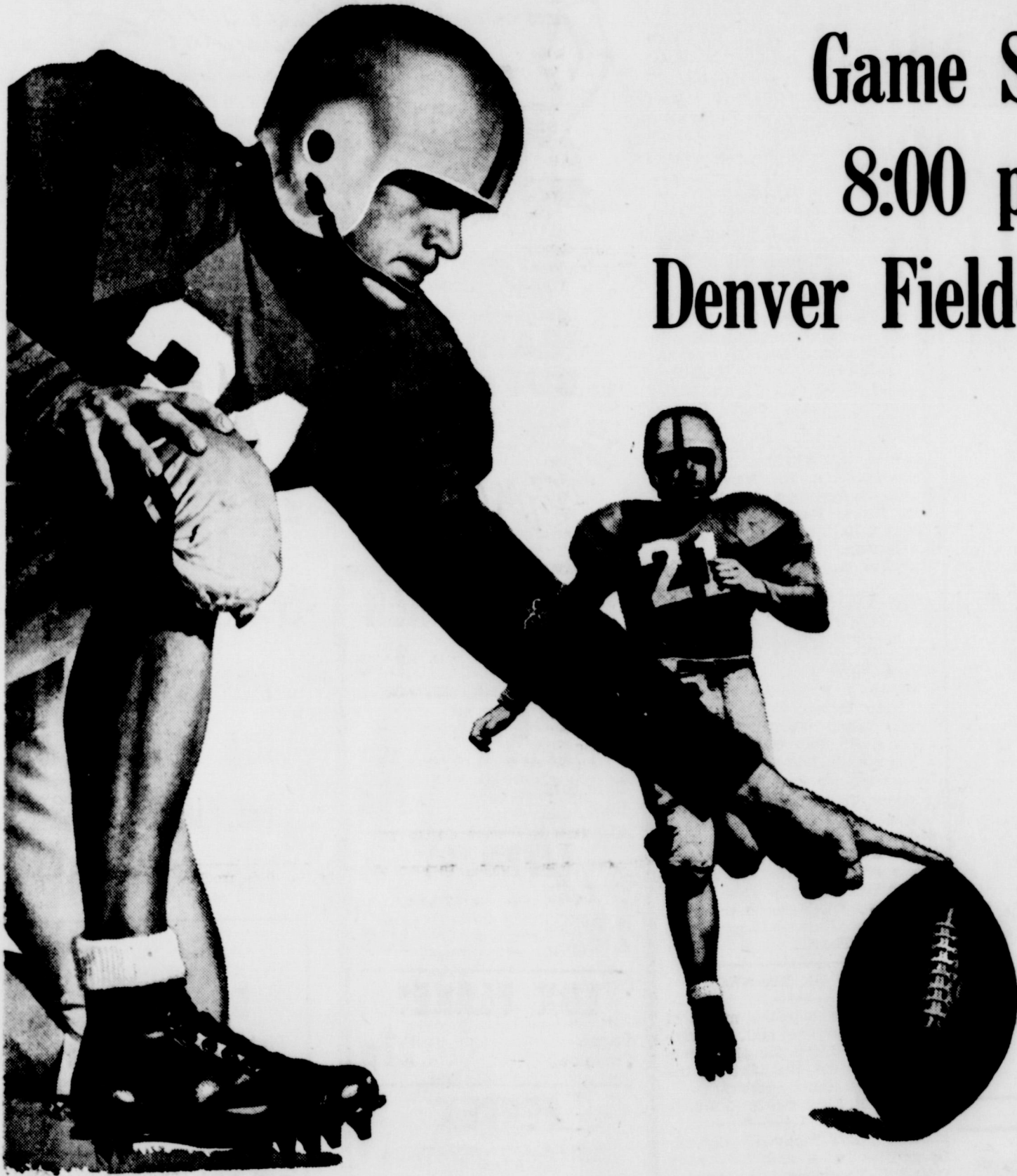

# Election To State School Board Be Held November 8

Election of substantial, high caliber lay citizens to the new twenty-one member State Board of Education was urged here by Joe C. Humphrey of Abilene, president of the Texas State Teachers Association.

The association took an extremely active part in the successful campaign to enact new laws which drastically revise the state-wide school system.

Humphrey urged selection in the twenty-one districts of high type citizens in an announcement of details of filing procedure to be followed by persons interested in running for the board.

Qualified citizens must file for places on the ballot with the secretary of state here between September 9 and 19. Applications will be accepted prior to September 9, it was said today at the office of the secretary of state. Those reaching his office after 5:00 p. m. September 19 cannot be accepted. There is no filing fee under the new laws.

No person shall be elected a member of the State Board of Education who has not attained the age of 30 years with five years continuous residence in the district prior to his election. One hundred resident voters may by petition place the name of any qualified person on the ballot as a candidate.

The election will be held November 8. Persons elected will serve until January 1, 1951.

have had a chance to elect members of the board. A nine-man board has formerly been appointed by the governor.

The guidance of the public schools of the state must be in very competent hands, especially during the next several crucial years, Humphrey asserted.

"We need substantial high caliber citizens on the board, men who have been successful in their own communities," the Teachers Association president said.

"The important functions of the new board are numerous. First, the board must carefully select a commissioner of education of top-ranking ability, who will administer the far-flung school system.

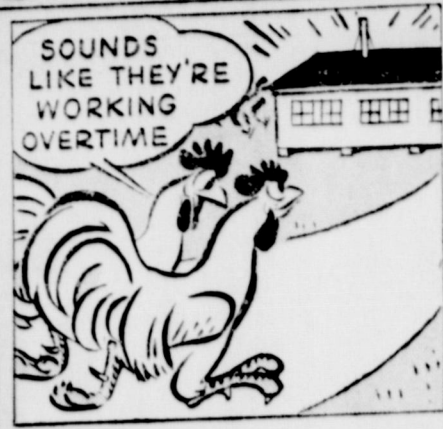
"The board must promote the board general policies under which the schools will function.

"The selection of proper textbooks upon a fair basis is of paramount importance."

Tremendous advances in education were made possible by enactment of the Gilmer-Aikin laws, but they must be properly administered or the state will slip back, Humphrey, a former leader in the state legislature, asserted.

Members of the State Teachers Association as school people are confidently looking forward to the citizens of Texas becoming interested in the right candidate in their respective congressional district."

### HEALTH AID TO PUPILS CITED

With opening of Wheeler county schools nearing, parents and teachers alike will be interested in a warning issued this week by the Texas State Department of Health regarding correct posture in school children. "Good posture is a sign of self respect and plans and important part in winning the respect of others," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

"Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childhood," he said, "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are born in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a high percent to be suffering from poor posture."

"Malnutrition and fatigue are productive of poor posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decrease the lung capacity. Abdominal organs may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be cor-

rected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards.

"School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical activities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest on the floor and the forearms and hands to rest upon the top without the shoulders being hunched up.

"Begin early in life to teach your children to stand straight and sit straight for health and self-confidence, and they should

grow into strong, well-built and women."

**GARDEN CLUB TO DISPLAY FLOWERS ON SEPTEMBER 13**

Progress was made this week by the Shamrock Garden Club on its plans for a Flower Show to be displayed in the Community Building Tuesday, September 13.

Besides the flower contest, which is open to members only, there will be an open house for the public.

The following is a complete list of the flowers to be judged in the contest:

**ROSE**—red, pink, white, yellow, two-toned. Exhibitor must furnish Coca-Cola bottle for the container of single specimen. The stem must be at least six inches in length.

**ROSE ARRANGEMENTS**—five roses of any color or variety is the minimum number of blooms which may be used in the arrangement. These are to be displayed in your own container.

**DAHLIA**—(1) Formal decorative. One single bloom completes entry, and must be eight inches or more in diameter.

(2) Informal decorative. One single bloom completes entry, and must be eight inches or more in diameter.

(3) Cactus. Minimum of three blooms for an entry.

(4) Poinsettia. Minimum of five blooms for an entry.

(5) Single. Minimum of five blooms for an entry.

(6) Balls. Minimum of three blooms for an entry.

**MARIGOLDS, large.** Each entry must contain a minimum of 12 blooms.

**MARIGOLDS, small.** Each entry must contain a minimum of 18 blooms.

**Zinnias, large.** Each entry must contain a minimum of 12 blooms.

**ZINNIAS, small.** Each entry must contain a minimum of 18 blooms.

**ASTERS.** Each entry must contain a minimum of seven blooms.

**PETUNIAS.** Arrangement of any variety, color or number of blooms.

**NASTURTIUMS.** Arrangement of any variety, color or number of blooms.

**VERBENA.** Arrangement of any one color or colors, and any number of blooms.

**VINCA (or Periwinkle).** Arrangement of any one color or mixed colors.

**TITHONIA.** Arrangement of 12 blooms or more.

**STRAW FLOWERS.** Arrangement of any color or variety.

**937 Peace Officers Attend Safety School**

Nine hundred and thirty-seven Texas peace officers participated in law enforcement training programs conducted by the Texas Department of Public Safety Training Division during the 12 month period ending August 31st, according to an announcement today by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Public Safety Department.

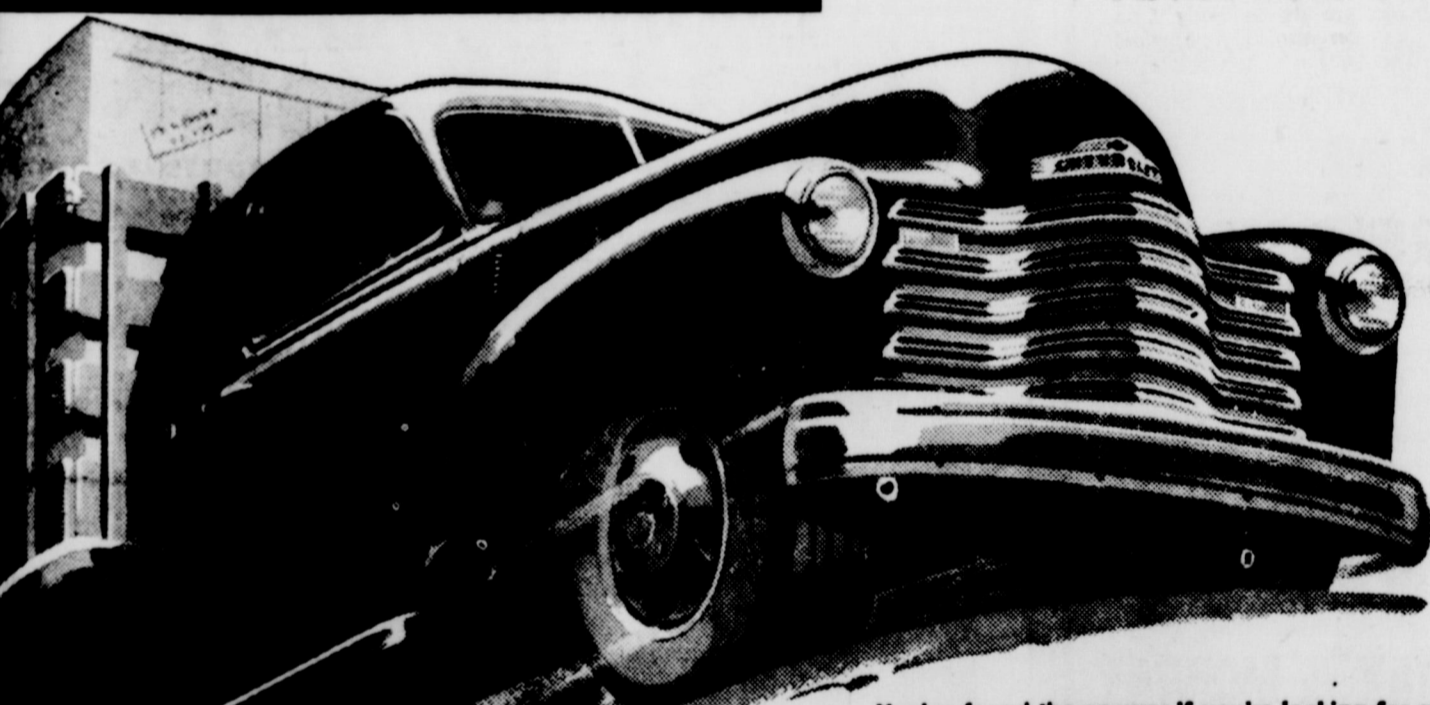
